COUNTY COUNCIL

(Continued from page One.)

On motion Mr. Stapleford was heard in favor of Hallet. Not financially interested—only with fair play for people of Carleton.

I have lived in Bath for some 1 years—am conversant with facts. As a free ferry it was not successful. It was bought because not run satisfactorily. It was bought back by Mr. Kearney and service was no better. It was haul out at first indication of ice. Best proof that Hallet ferry is wanted is that Mr. Kearney has lost his business.

Coun. Estey—Mr. Hallet got the business by reducing the prices.

Mr. Stapleford—Every merchant with one exception, in the village of Bath has signed this petition.

Coun. Estey—The ferry was run all right. Mr. Hallet has given extra good service. I have nothing to say about this, but the Councilors in the parish should have something to say about it.

Coun. Kinney—Councilors from other parishes have by their attitude intimidated that parishes interested are not capable of running our own business. We don't propose to leave this to Coun. Melville and others to tell us what to do. We have no objection to Mr. Hallet.

Couns. of Kent and Wicklow are the men to look after this business. We are willing that Mr. Hallet run this ferry—we want it. I am not against this ferry. There is ample traffic to supply both ferries. I do object to Mr. Hallet cutting the price, but I am proud of his energy but don't think for a moment that Mr. Hallet's ferry is the only one entitled to run in this County. We can run the business in Kent and Wicklow. They have got representatives they are not ashamed of.

Coun. Melville—What are you kicking at me for?

Coun. Kinney—We are not narrow men, we are broadminded men.

Coun. Melville—I am glad Mr. Kinney favored my motion which I

shall press.

Coun. Kinney—I have given Mr. Hallet all that is due him.

Coun. Estey moved an amendment that the petition be received and that the license be left to the committee of the councilors in the parishes affected.

Seconded by Coun. Gallagher (Kent).

Sec'y-Treas.—The bye law provides the means of granting a license.

Coun. Melville—I don't want to take business away from the Councilors interested but if a license is not granted the ferryman is liable to a fine of \$20.

Coun. Kinney—I never knew Coun. Melville to have the right end of a story. We are proud to give Mr. Hallet a license, and we will give him license regardless of the Councilors of Peel, but we don't want Mr. Hallet to cut prices. The lower ferry must have license and we are going to use these gentlemen as citizens of this County.

Coun. Gallagher (Kent). Coun. Melville intimates that councilors of Kent will not grant Mr. Hallet a license. We have nothing against Mr. Hallet. Mr. Stapleford did not tell us why the ferry was sold—Why did he not give all the facts. With my colleague, Mr. Kinney I am here in the interests of our parishes, regardless of politics. We want to protect ourselves. We feel that Mr. Hallet should put his price up. There is no doubt but Mr. Hallet will get his license.

Coun. Tompkins—If both can be granted license it will probably be worked out satisfactorily.

Coun. Estey—We only object to Coun. Melville taking any rights of Couns. of Wicklow and Kent.

Coun. Melville—Will you grant the license?

Coun. Perry—Councilors of Wicklow and Kent have no grievance against us, they brought this matter here themselves. How do we know they will grant Mr. Hallet a license? Coun. Kinney has admitted that Mr. Hallet must raise his rates. If it is to the peoples interest let Mr. Hallet reduce his rates.

Coun. Kinney—I have not insinuated that Mr. Hallet should charge a certain price. We don't care what Mr. Hallet charges, its none of our business. We said we will grant Mr. Hallet a license. Why don't you? I know Mr. Hallet better than you do, Mr. Melville, and we are only too glad to help him. What are you harping about.

Coun. Melville—You have not yet said you would give Mr. Hallet a license.

Coun. Kinney—We have repeatedly said so.

Coun. Melville—Until they make me some promise I will push the motion.

Coun. Carvell—I have never yet heard anybody say they refused a license. The Sec'y-Treas tells us the Councilors of the parish control it. I believe these men will

grant a license. Too much like child's play to exact a promise of this nature. It is only fair that the matter be left to the councilors of these parishes. I don't care if they have four ferries.

Coun. Melville—Why did Coun. Estey move last session to fine a man for running a ferry without a license? They indicate by their attitude that they are not in favor of granting a license.

Coun. Estey—Why didn't Mr. Hallet come here himself and ask for a license.

The amendment was put the vote standing:

Yea—Couns. Bell, Gallagher, (Kent), Gallagher (Woodstock), Estey, Kinney, Kearney, Bell, Carvell.

Nay—Anderson, Moxon, Flemming, Hemphill, Lamont, Smith, Morgan, Melville, Perry, Tompkins.

The Warden read the following: January 16, 1917.

To the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council of the County of Carleton.

Gentlemen,

I would ask your attention to the matter of authorizing the expense of Consolidating some of the Record Indexes.

In 1886 the Counsel authorized an expense for Consolidating the record book indexes from the beginning of the County in 1832, down to and including 1882, taking in from Book A to Z, and from A No. 2 to and including Z No. 2. This book was completed and is now in use.

Subsequently another Consolidated Index was authorized and made, and takes in the books from A, No. 3, to Z No. 3 and this Index is now in use. This book runs from 1882 to 1899.

The report of the Scott Act Committee was read and adopted.

The Committee appointed to examine the Scott Act accounts beg to submit the following report:

We have carefully examined the accounts and vouchers handed us by the Inspector, and find them correct and satisfactory. Vouchers for account No. 19 has not been received, and we suggest that it be returned to the proper source for signature and filed on its return.

We view with satisfaction on the condition of affairs in our County, and recommend that the present Inspector be retained at a salary of \$500 per annum as received last year.

Should the Canada Temperance Act be repealed in this County before the close of ensuing year, we recommend that the Inspector receive his salary at the rate of \$500 per annum, monthly, for the period his services are required.

Coun. Morgan—Sorry that some Councilors want this salary reduced. The committee looked into matter carefully.

Coun. Smith read the following: Woodstock, N.B., Jan. 17, 1917.

Councillor Fred W. Smith.

Chairman of Special Committee of Council in regard to Consolidating County Record Indexes.

Dear Sir,

In regard to the work of Consolidating the Indexes, and the expenses in doing this work, will say that the labor of doing this does not belong to me as Registrar, for the years previous to my acceptance of the office.

I explained to the Committee just what the work comprises, and will also explain the same in this letter.

Taking the present Consolidated Index from 1882 to 1889 as a sample of what is to be done, for the Series of Books of Number Four, from A to Z, No. 4.

The work of compiling and arranging in alphabetical order, both as regards Grantors and Grantees as well, and both in regard to the given name and as well the surnames.

In this manner, any persons transfers either to or from him, will be shown at a glance, and following one another in regular order.

Then as soon as the Books call for another Consolidation, of the names that are now indexed in the Current Index, which is in series No. 5, and we are now working and copying in Book 1, No. 5, it will be in order that another Consolidated Index be made up, when we get to Book M, No. 5, and thus relieve the Current Index of that much.

I am prepared to undertake and complete the Consolidating of all the Indexes down to the time that my appointment was made, June 12, 1917, and in form, to be the same as the present Consolidated Indexes, for the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, the cost of paper and binding to be paid by the County; and will Consolidate the work after I took charge free and without any charge, other than paper and binding, as provided in the Registry Act. The work to be paid for when completed, and approved of by a Committee of the Council, in accordance with the above specification.

The Council went into committee of whole on bills and accounts.

The Sec'y-Treas explained the situation as regards the assessment of Patriotic Fund.

Adjourned till 10 o'clock.
