With Canadian Engineers—Enlist  
ed Here With 104th Battalion

An official telegram to Mrs. Robert Kennedy Monday notified her that her son William Kennedy had been slightly wounded in the knee and was seriously ill.

Pte Kennedy was a young Woodstock boy who answered his country's call, as soon as his age would permit, and enlisted in the 104th Battalion. After his arrival in England he was transferred to the 5th Field Co., Canadian Engineers. No particulars have been received but it is believed that he was in some of the at engagements.

## PREMIER FOSTER GIVEN GRAND RECEPTION IN VICTORIA COUNTY

Delegations Meet Him In Many Places—With Messrs Tweeddale, Dugal, Burgess and Carvell Address big Meeting—Startling Condition of Affairs in Public Works Department—Eight Days Before Election Smith Ordered Motor Trucks Costing \$120,000

Grand Falls, N. B., April 13.—Hon. Walter E. Foster, premier of New Brunswick, who is a candidate for the house of assembly in the county of Victoria, received a magnificent welcome from the people of that county today.

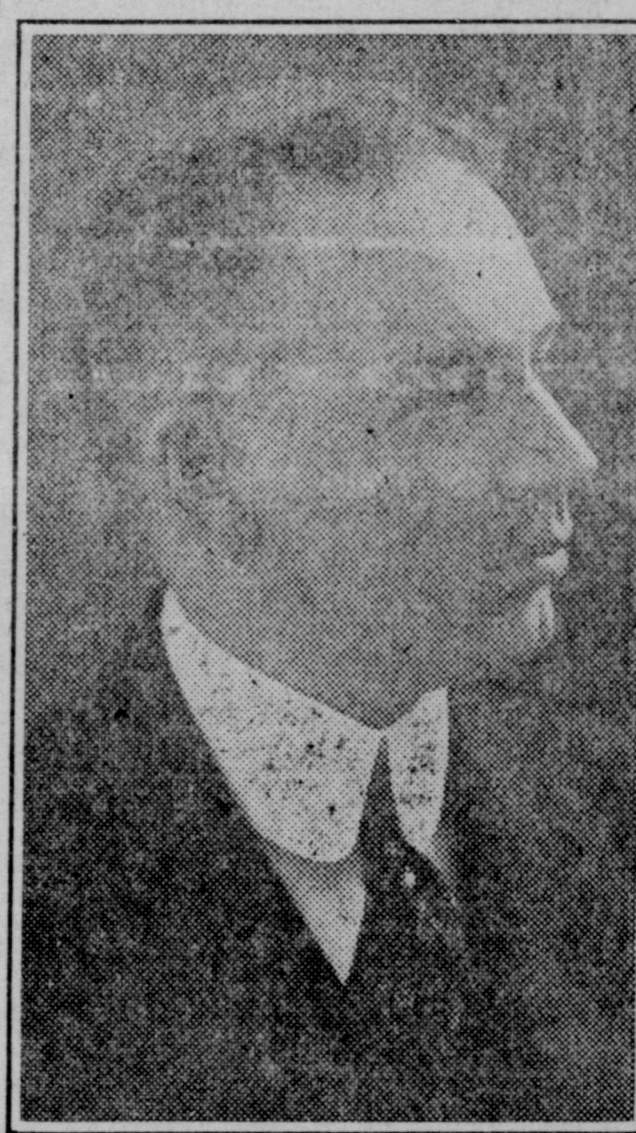
Not only was Premier Foster warmly received at Grand Falls to night, where he was one of the speakers at a Liberal rally in the Opera House but during his journey to this town today, he was greeted heartily at the principal places through which he passed. This was true not only of Victoria, but also of York and Carleton. At McAdam, Woodstock, Hartland, Florenceville, Bath, Perth, Andover and Aroostook Junction delegations met the new premier, who was made acquainted with a large number of the electors. In all places his reception was most cordial and indicated that New Brunswick's business premier has the people with him.

His Worship Mayor Collins took electors in the northern section of the chair at tonight's meeting. The audience, entirely filled the large theatre and gave the various speakers an attentive hearing. Those who spoke were Premier Foster, Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, minister of agriculture; James Burgess, ex-M. P. P.; Hon. L. A. Dugal, M. P., and F. B. Carvell, M. P.

Hon. Mr. Dugal spoke in French, in which language he is very eloquent and was given a magnificent reception by the audience.

Mr. Carvell also was given a great reception. There is every indication that there will be no opposition to Hon. Premier Foster and Hon. J. F. Tweeddale in this county.

Public opinion is decidedly against a contest and the only agitation for the nomination of candidates against them comes from a small clique of "die-hards" which is not representative of its own party. The openly expressed intention of the government supporters is to make any opposition candidate lose his deposit. Although the roads are breaking up

## HAS FOUR SONS AT THE FRONT

Interesting Letter Received by Sergt. Hooser—Father Proud That His Boys are Fighting—One Son Seriously Wounded—And Still the Country Has Slackers

Mr. Christopher Crocker, of Millerton, writing to Sergeant Hooser, says: "Your letter received in which you say you were acquainted with my son Clarence, and that you would like his address."

Did you know that he was very badly wounded again? He has been in four different hospitals and is now receiving the best of care from a Canadian nurse. He thinks that perhaps they will save his leg, but from the knee down, to the fleshy part of his leg, the flesh was all torn off. He has suffered everything a man could suffer and not die and says only the unremitting care of the nurses pulled him through. My son Harry is in France with the Cameron Highlanders. My other two boys are with the siege batteries over there. All of them are fighting now and I am very proud that they are.

Clarence went over with the first contingent and was in all the severe fighting of 1915 and 1916, being wounded in the latter year, and after recovering went out to rejoin his unit and was again seriously hurt. He was in the 8th New Brunswick battery with a lot of Woodstock boys and was well liked by all of them.

Attend tonight's meeting. Among prominent Liberals from other sections of the county who were in attendance were Robert Crawford, of Perth; R. W. Demings, of Aroostook Junction, and Judson Corey, of Tobique. James Burgess, M. P. P. the first speaker, informed the audience that the object of the meeting was to receive his resignation as representative of Victoria and to elect Hon. Mr. Foster in his stead. If Victoria would give to Premier Foster and Hon. Mr. Tweeddale in the case of a contest which was not likely, the same support which had been given the Liberal ticket on Feb. 24, the county would never regret its action.

## THE WOODSTOCK STANDARD EFFICIENCY CLUB

Promoters Encouraged and Sure of Successful Continuance—Must Have Sympathetic Support of Parents—Club Rules Trained to Advance Interests of Boys Cordial Invitation to Visit Rooms

Considerable interest is manifested in the Club, organized for the boys of Woodstock under the name of the Woodstock Standard Efficiency Club, and designed to advance the welfare of all boys between the ages of 13 and 19 by providing a moderate gymnasium outfit, and likewise to afford those boys who are interested in the work of the Canadian Standard Efficiency Tests a place to gather for lectures etc.

The hours set for the use of the rooms are especially chosen by the Advisory Committee so as not to conflict with the study hours of the younger boys who are attending school and are from 3 to 5.30 in the afternoon. During these hours school boys have the exclusive use of the gymnasium and are not permitted under the rules to make use of it at night; the reading room is open to them during the evening from 7.30 to 10 while the older boys are using the gymnasium.

The club rules have been subject to very careful consideration by the Advisory Committee with the idea of helping the boys to maintain the spirit of fair play and to place on him the responsibility of his own behavior.

Up to the present the Committee feels that their efforts to make the club success have not failed; it is, however, necessary for its successful continuance that every member of it, and also the parents of the boys, should regard in a serious and sympathetic light the endeavors of the Committee which form no small demand on their occupation and their time.

An invitation is cordially extended to the parents of all the members to visit the rooms of the Club and see for themselves what is being done in the interests of the boys of Woodstock.
