FREE COURSES IN AGRICULTURE

will be given at different points in New Brunswick during the months of February and March, 1917, as follows:

Agricultural School, SUSSEX,

February 5th to 9th, inclusive.
CHEESE AND BUTTER MAKERS' COURSE,
February 12th to 24th, inclusive.

Agricultural School, WOODSTOCK,

March 12th to 16th, inclusive.

CHATHAM, March 19th to 23rd, inclusive.

The aim will be to make each course as practical as possible and also meet local conditions.

This, it is hoped, will go far to insure a full attendance. As the courses will be short, those who purpose attending are urged to make a strong effort at the beginning, and remain throughout a course.

But if you cannot arrange to be in attendance during all of a course, don't let this prevent you from being present as much as possible.

The only expenses you will incur are for board and your railway fare at reduced rate. Purchase a single First-class Ticket and secure a Standard Certificate from the Ticket Agent.

Railway fares amounting to \$2.00 or over will be refunded by the Department of Agriculture.

As each course will be adapted to meet the conditions of the section of the province in which it is held, separate programmes, for the different courses are being prepared.

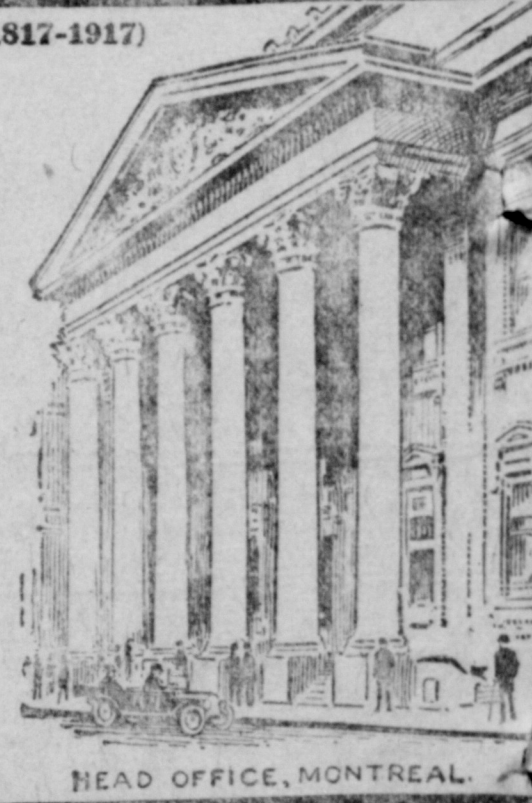

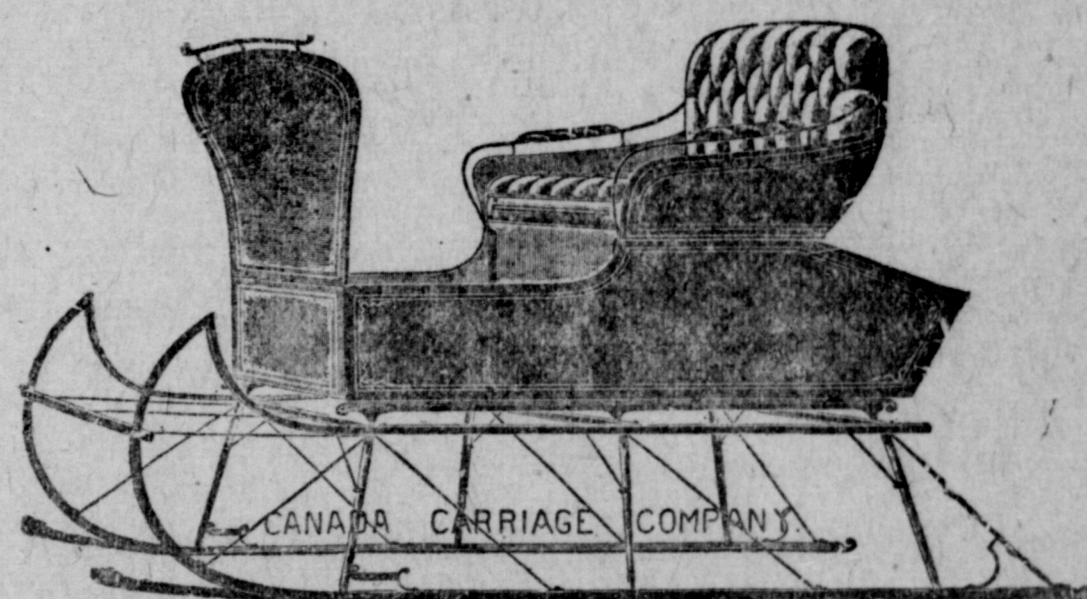
