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"MADE IN GERMANY."

The action of Sir Robert Borden's Government in introducing a Bill to disfranchise British subjects naturalized within the last fifteen years savors strongly of Potsdam. It is only in that centre of Kultur that such a travesty on British fair play could have been originated. "The idea was undoubtedly "Made in Germany" and exported to Canada for political purposes only. It is the very thing which, when Paul Kruger did it, caused the South African war. In no place was his action more severely criticized than in Canada and by no persons more than by the very party which now proposes to fasten this odious breach of faith on the fairest portion of the British Dominions.—Chronicle.

MR. CARVELL THEN AND NOW

Frank B. Carvell has discovered how hollow are the expressions of appreciation by Tory political leaders and Tory journalists. It seems that it was only yesterday, when they were trying to induce him to enter into Borden's cabinet, that they were most effusive in their admiration, but that day has gone. Mr. Frank Carvell, after a few moments of respectability in the eyes of Tory journalists has become one of the most objectionable of politicians. His character in their estimation does not compare with that of Fleming, John Wesley Allison, the men who robbed the Valley Railway treasury or sold white horses painted black for soldiers—these constitute the men placed on pedestals by the Tories for public admiration.

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Mr. Carvell was lauded as the ideal forthcoming minister of war, but the moment he pays a little attention to war matters and wants to initiate reforms upon which alone can a successful expeditionary force be maintained in France and England, he is the worst of men. A few days since in parliament he pointed out that in one military district there were no fewer than one hundred and seventy-six officers with the whole letters of the alphabet tagged after their names, who in bomb proof positions were drawing large salaries. Nearly all the Conservative doctors in the district were unmarried and employed in drawing their salaries. In New Brunswick he added that the number of officers drawing pay seemed to be legion. Although they were drawing pay for two or three years past, it would seem that they were rendering no military service whatever. It was a scandal. The majority of these officers were married and although



they did not go to the front, yet their wives were drawing large separation allowances. The wasteful cost for this one division to the military department was \$400,000, which with the separation allowance brought the total up to \$600,000. No wonder that Mr. Pardee, a conscriptionist Liberal, said with disgust at this revelation of the government's incompetence that there should be a reform and the saving of money go to our wounded soldiers.

It was a splendid suggestion thrown out by Mr. Carvell but shocking to the nerves of those conscriptionist military men who stay at home that the first thing the government should do under the conscription bill was to conscript as privates all the officers in these safety bases. The whole administration of the military department is a disgrace to the government and the sooner the people of Canada change the government, the sooner will they get rid of the disgrace.

If the Borden government carried their franchise policy to a logical conclusion they would make it a crime for any one suspected of being opposed to the administration to cast a ballot.

The Borden Government has not yet brought in a Bill to disfranchise all Liberals. But it may come to that.

FORD CARS.

R. L. Phillips Returns from Trip to Plant of Ford Motor Company of Canada.

Mr. R. L. Phillips returned yesterday from a trip to the plant of the Ford Motor Company of Canada. While away Mr. Phillips contracted for all of his old territory, which included the counties of York, Carleton, Sunbury and portions of Queens and Northumberland, and also a portion of Kent County, which he has not had before.

When asked if the Ford Motor Company were going to follow in the steps of every other manufacturer of automobiles and advance their prices, Mr. Phillips said that they have no announcement to make, but that they were not guaranteeing him cars at present for twenty-four hours ahead and that they would have the right to advance them any minute, but that he did not look for an advance before October 1st.

At the present time, owing to the great scarcity of material, every assembly branch is away behind with their orders and it is impossible to secure cars as fast as they are being sold.—Frederick Gleason.
