GENERAL FOCH. MAN OF THE HOUR

Is Giving Everybody the Utmost
Satisfaction

GERMANY TERRIBLY ANGRY

Over Her Defeat—More Surpris-
es in Store for the Enemy—Von
Kuhlmann and Peace

(Correspondence of the Globe)

PARIS, July 27, 1918.—It has been re-
marked that "General Foch is the man to
win the war." He is certainly giving ev-
eryone the utmost satisfaction in this re-
spect; all he needed was an opportunity
to prove his ability to defeat the enemy.
The last offensive of the Germans pro-
vided him with the opportunity he had
been waiting for so long. The enemy was
completely taken by surprise; it never ex-
pected that General Foch would have
turned out such a genius. By the French
commander-in-chief suddenly assuming
the offensive he has been able to inflict
terrible punishment on the Huns. The
latter have met with most serious disas-
ter, the same as did the Austrians a little
while ago at the hands of the victorious
Italians. The Franco-American advance
is irresistible, and the Germans admit that
they can do nothing else but retreat fur-
ther and further, in many cases in such
haste as to leave much valuable booty be-
hind. General Foch does not pretend that
the war is nearly over, but that the Ger-
mans can no longer make any serious
stand, much less resume the offensive for
several months to come is undeniable.
The fierce counterblows of the French,
Americans, British and Italians and Bel-
gians will continue now until the end, with
the utmost caution. General Foch does
not intend to give the Germans time to
regain strength, but drive them out slowly
but surely from all important positions
which they had recently gained at such
terrible costs. The Crown Prince and
Ludendorff have made irreparable blun-
ders, and they now stand greatly humiliated
in the eyes of their countrymen, and of
the world in general.

It is quite a pleasure to read about the
war today, especially as the brilliant suc-
cesses of the Allies on the western front
increase daily. Germany—

FEELS TERRIBLY ANGRY

at her defeat, the more so as her own al-
lies are laughing at her. Austria, which
empire has again met with a crushing de-
feat at the hands of the Italians, has no
intention to run further risks by going to
the assistance of an ungrateful country as
Germany. Bulgaria and Turkey—not the
best of friends of late—will also, prob-
ably, like Austria, think the present an ex-
cellent occasion for severing relations with Ger-
many. The eastern front is becoming
more and more active and threatening for
Germany; the Russians and their support-
ers are rapidly recovering, and are eager
to free themselves from the German yoke.
Germany was never in a tighter corner
than she is now; Ludendorff and the
Crown Prince are doing their best to ex-
plain the constant retreat of the German
armies, and make the people at home be-
lieve it was all a "planned affair." This
deception is no longer possible. The very
fact that the Germans are glad to fly be-
fore General Foch's millions is sufficient
proof for the German people that Ger-
many has lost the war. It was on this last
offensive that Germany depended for vic-
tory; now that it cannot possibly turn out
as the Crown Prince and Ludendorff as-
sured the Kaiser and his subjects and that
Germany must once more face Russia and
her allies on the eastern front, the Kaiser
will have to bow to fate before very long.
Besides, Germany cannot fight the world
alone.

General Foch, the "idol" of the hour,
has many

in store for the boastful Kaiser and his
satellites. The complete victory of the
Allies over the Germans on the Maine
must prove a very bitter pill for the Huns
to swallow; the latter have got themselves
into such a mess and muddle that they
hardly know what to do to regain their
prestige. For the greatest military power
in the world to have to admit defeat is a
terrible reflection on the German high
command; it has not as yet, candidly de-
nied, nor will it do so until forced. Nev-
ertheless its acts are superior to words in
the present case.

Retreat is unavoidable and that alone
is galling. The Kaiser felt certain that
he would have proclaimed himself "con-
queror," as the result of the last offensive.
Instead he is the "conquered." The Ger-
mans, after once more trying to reach
Paris, appalled at the cost of the march
on the French capital, they abandoned
that day-dream. Wilhelm II. had prom-
ised that victory was very near and that
this summer would see Germany victori-
ous and at peace. Things are not always
what they seem. All German in later

are but mouth-pieces of the Kaiser and
his generals. What then could have been
von Kuhlmann's object in recently telling
the world that peace was not in sight, but
that Germany was prepared to negotiate?
From the latest reports signs are not
wanting that much as Germany is anxious
and is prepared to carry on the war in-
definitely, Germany is nearing her tether.
She is doing all she can to retard revolu-
tion; the latter may not break out while
the war lasts, but as soon as the latter is
over, events will move rapidly. The peo-
ple of Germany are being told the truth
at last; that her last offensive was a sig-
nal failure and ended in complete defeat.
Germany professes to cherish the idea of
a long war; she boasts that her enemies
will be glad to surrender before she will.
Events of late have proved the exact con-
trary. Germany's numerous enemies will
not hear of a German peace at any price
and never were more determined to carry
on the struggle for another year or two if
necessary. Germany and her allies are
no longer a match for their opponents;
Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey admit this
and are prepared to submit to fate, as
they must do before very long.

PUBLIC NOTICE

FUEL ADMINISTRATION New Brunswick.

The Fuel Controller of Canada has ad-
vised me under date of August 8th, that
it is probable that the Maritime Provinces
will not receive 50 per cent of the normal
requirements of anthracite coal from the
United States for the coming winter. He
urgently requests that the consumers of
anthracite coal in the Province of New
Brunswick take immediate steps to pro-
cure a supply of bituminous or soft coal
to make up this shortage in anthracite,
and if they neglect to do this, they will
unquestionably suffer from cold in the
coming winter season. By ordering or
providing now, it will ensure a supply of
fuel. If neglected it means that in the
cold weather, when rail transportation is
difficult, and railways and equipment are
crowded with export and local goods, and
vast quantities of munitions are being
forwarded, that coal will not be moving
from the mines. By ordering now it
gives an opportunity to dealers to release
storage for new supplies, and thus make
room for coal demands which must come
later.

This statement is not made by the Fuel
Controller without full knowledge of the
facts, and it is to be hoped that this ap-
pel will not remain unheeded, and that
consumers of coal will take advantage of
the opportunities now offering for ob-
taining soft coal which may be denied
them at a later day.

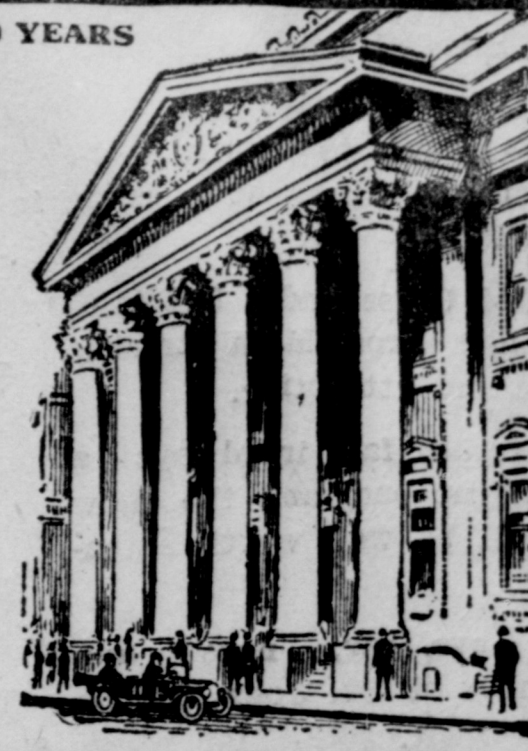
