THE MATTER OF TITLES

Plain Talk of Toronto Paper—The Real Milk in the Coconut

The Toronto Saturday Night has not much use for titles, hereditary or otherwise. It notes with approval the action of the Dominion Methodist Conference in putting itself on record as favoring the abolishment of all titles save those awarded for valorous and distinguished service on the field of battle. In referring to the Canadians in the King's birthday list, Saturday Night offers the following terse comment:

"It is a significant fact that when Sir Robert Borden bull-raged the House of Commons into not passing an anti-hour resolution, by threatening to resign, and thus bring on another war-time election, which no one desired, he at the same time had full knowledge of the honor lost which was to be sprung on the public coincident with the King's birthday. The Premier's warm personal interest in this matter, in which he went entirely beyond the realms of decency, was at the time a subject of much wonderment. It is that no longer; the list speaks for itself. George Foster is given another letter to his name as sort of a companion for old age; as it were, and possibly foreshadowing his retirement from public life. Then there is John D. Hazen, who was Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and is now Chief Justice of New Brunswick. He got a K.C.M.G., possibly for not kicking up a fuss over being turned out of the cabinet to make room for the Hon. Mr. Ballantyne.

"And then you come to the real milk in the coconut. Those entitled to use the initials C.M.G. after their names are, it is to be noted, Austin Ernest Blount and John William Borden. Mr. Blount was formerly private secretary and general handy man for the Premier, and also, we are informed, his business partner in numerous financial transactions. The John William Borden mentioned is, of course, a brother of the Premier, and he has been dying for his country at Ottawa for a considerable period as accountant and paymaster of the Militia Department.

"Thus it is that we see this pest of honors perpetuated in order that Premier Borden may pay some of his private obligations, look after his worn out political hacks and of course take care of brother John." While nobody begrudges the Chief Justice of New Brunswick the honor conferred upon him, surprise is expressed in some quarters that the name of the distinguished statesman who occupies the post of Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick was not included in the King's birthday list. All the good things that have been said of the Chief Justice would apply with even greater force and truth to the Lieutenant Governor, yet he remains—whether from choice or not, we cannot say—plain William Pugsley.

Regulations for Dealers in Food Stuffs

The Canada Food Board is compelling every dealer of food stuffs to secure a license in order to carry on business. Most food dealers are already operating under license, but eating houses and confectioners are given till the first of July to secure licenses. A license permits a dealer to carry on his trade in the proper manner, but it prohibits waste, hoarding, and excessive profits. If a wholesaler sells to another wholesaler, or a retailer to another retailer they may split the commission between them, but there must be only one commission in the transaction by which the goods pass from wholesaler to retailer, or from retailer to consumer.

Dealers may hold in storage a stock of goods sufficient to meet ordinary trade requirements during the scarce season, but there can be no hoarding in addition to this amount, and no carrying over of goods from one season to another. These regulations are meant to stop speculation and the increase of prices thereby.

No licensed dealer is permitted to buy from or sell to an unlicensed dealer; that is, an eating house must buy its groceries, bread and produce from licensed dealers. If a wholesale gro-

cer sells to a retailer who has not taken out a license he is liable to have his own license cancelled.

Bakers must conserve wheat flour, sugar, and fats. Doughnuts or crullers, French or puff pastry, Scotch short cakes, are prohibited. Almond macaroons and marshmallows, if made at all, are limited to a low amount of cake sugar. Bakers must not use more than eighty percent of standard wheat flour in the making of sweet cakes, and the amount of sugar or shortening that can be used in the manufacture of any sweet dough products is also limited.

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

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The full course of study in the Rural Science Schools occupies two summer sessions with an interim. Winter. Reading and Experimental Course. It includes: 1. Chemistry of Soil, Plants and Animals; 2. Physical Nature and Environment; 3. Nature Study of Animals; 4. Plant Life and School Gardening; Methods of Correlation and Study in the public schools with the regulations dealing with the work. No options. (See Regulation 50 in the Nature Study and Agriculture Course.)

Satisfactory completion of the Course entitles teachers to receive certificates of competency.

In naming the school an applicant wishes to attend the principle of readiest accessibility from home should govern.

Teachers actually engaged in the public schools of New Brunswick are eligible for admission free of charge.

Both Schools open at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of July 10th. Teachers who propose to attend for Second year classes are requested to present themselves at 10 o'clock in the forenoon for examination on the Winter Reading and Experimental Course.

As no standard Certificates are issued by the Railways this year students will purchase return tickets with receipts for amounts paid for same. Cost of transportation from home to school (the one way) will be paid on condition stated above.
