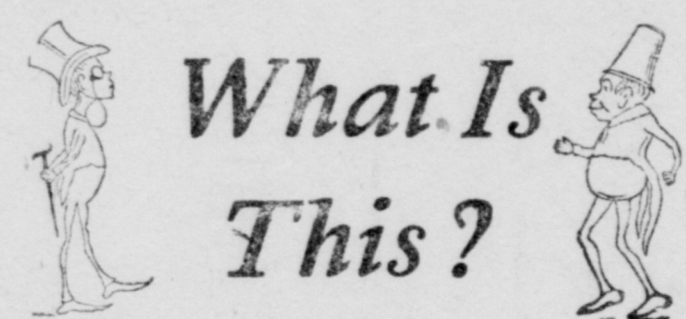

OBITUARY

REGINALD N. PHILLIPS.

The sudden death at the Fisher Memorial Hospital of Reginald N. Phillips, the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Chipman P. Phillips, aged six years and 13 days, came as a shock to their many friends. Little Reginald about four weeks ago was taken ill with a cold and cough which was evidently the whooping cough, as it was prevalent in town. This soon developed into a swelling of the glands of the throat and neck which was very painful and caused difficulty in breathing which indicated mumps in a serious form. The little fellow bravely battled against the disease, assisted by loving parents, nurse and physicians. But having a sudden choking spell, it was thought an operation might prolong his life. So on Thursday afternoon he was taken to the hospital but he never rallied from the operation as in his weakened condition the heart gave out. Very much sympathy is expressed for Mr. and Mrs. Phillips in their sudden and sad bereavement.

The funeral service took place at 2.30 last Saturday afternoon, and was largely attended by relatives and friends of town and country. The choir of the Reformed Baptist church sang some beautiful and appropriate hymns and the pastor, Rev. W. B. Wiggins, gave an address from Isa. 40-11, "He shall feed His flock like a shepherd; He shall gather the lambs with His arm, and carry them in His bosom." The pastor was assisted in the service by Revs. B. Colpitts, H. S. Dow and P. J. Trafton.

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MILITARY NOTES

There are still a few cases of mumps among the soldiers temporarily stationed here.

The following soldiers have returned after a service in France extending over three years: W. J. Sanderson; A. Furcotte, Grand Falls.

Major A. D. Carter, of the Royal Air Corps, formerly with the 26th Batt., previously reported missing, is now reported a prisoner of war in Germany.

Rev. H. L. Belliveau, of Fredericton, has been appointed Catholic rector of the Canadian Legion, Sussex. He is the son of Professor Belliveau and has two brothers overseas.

W. L. Sanderson arrived here this week and is being warmly greeted by his friends. This young soldier left at the beginning of the war with the engineers, and has had three birthdays in France, and one in England, being now twenty one years of age.

A mere boy at enlistment he has made a record for hard continuous service on the battlefields of France. He has been in an English hospital for the past seven months and is now on crutches as a result of Hun barbarism. He was hit in the leg and was forced to undergo several operations with the final result of having his leg shortened, which with other injuries, makes him very lame.

In spite of his condition the plucky young soldier is full of optimism and regrets that he was compelled to give up fighting the Huns at a time when the services of every available man is required. Pte. Sanderson will go to Fort Fairfield where his family now reside, but will return to Woodstock to remain until further orders.

The Morning Messenger, a Russellite publication, printed in Winnipeg, which has been generally and gratuitously circulated in Woodstock and throughout Canada, has been suppressed by the Ottawa government. A special extra edition of the Canada Gazette was issued on Saturday forbidding the publication of the sheet in Canada and its circulation in the Dominion.

Family allowances will be paid by the United States to a soldier's wife or child while he is making compulsory allotments to them as follows: If there be a wife, \$15; wife and one child, \$25; wife and two children, \$32.50; additional for additional child \$5. If there be no wife, but a child, \$5; two children, \$12.50; three children \$20; four children, \$30; additional for additional child \$5. The monthly allowance, however, shall not exceed \$50.

IF RATIONING
SHOULD COME

Gloomy Outlook for Non-Registrant if Such a Person Exists after 22nd June.

The Canadian people may, probably will, have to submit to food rations if the war is unduly prolonged. If rationing comes it will be based on the information obtained on Registration Day, 22nd June. This means that any person who fails to register will experience considerable difficulty in obtaining a food card. And without a food card it is extremely difficult to exist under a system of compulsory rationing.

Canada means business. She proposes, along with the other members of the Alliance, to see the war through to the only conclusion possible for the free peoples of the Earth. She proposes to maintain her overseas army at its full striking power. She further proposes to increase her export of food to the Allies, first by increasing her production of it, and second by economizing in her consumption of it. This necessitates the intelligent direction of man power and the elimination of waste. The registration of the civilian population is to be made the foundation for all subsequent war efforts.
