Mr. Webster Ross has greatly added to the appearance of his new residence by a new wire fence and grading his lawn.

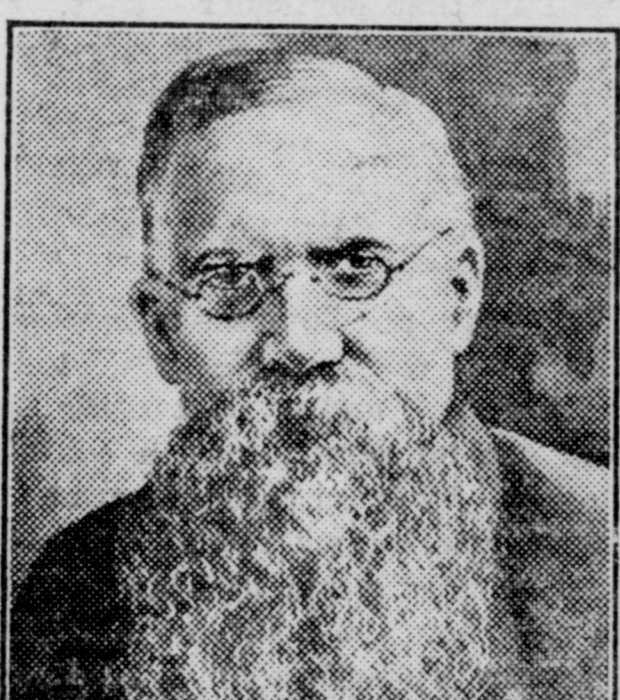
