

"Whereas our traffic laws in New Brunswick are a source of great nconvenience to motor tourists as well as a menace to life and property, because, practically in all parts of North America, except in the Maritime Provinces, traffic is directed to the right, and whereas in these provinces it must go to the left and with the increasing growth of the motor tourists traffic this will be felt more than ever.

Therefore, Resolved that this Council put itself on record as being in favor of the abclition of this inconvenience, and do approve of the New Brunswick Legislature making such a change compulsory throughout the province, that all traffic take the right instead of the left.

Seconded by Coun. Anderson -He felt a change was most desirable. It may inconvenience people with teams perhaps more than auto drivers but he felt people would soon get accus-




