Water By-Law

(Continued from Page One.)

water is to be used and the fixtures which are or will be connected thereto, according to the form provided by the town and a permit for the same has been issued therefor. No permit shall be granted for the use of water in any building or any premises to any person other than the owner or the authorized agent thereof, whether such water is to be consumed by the owner himself or his tenant. In the event of the application being made for the water service on a street on which the water main is already laid the collector of water rates shall notify the water superintendent to install the service, but should the application require an extension to the water works system, the collector of water rates shall refer the application to the Water Works Superintendent, who will report to the Water Committee stating the location of the required extension, its cost and the probable revenue to be derived, and the service shall not be installed until authorized by the Town Council.

WATER SERVICES.

8. The Town shall lay only one service from the main to the nearest property line of the applicant, and the applicant shall connect, thereto without delay, failing to do so he shall be liable to pay to the Town an amount equal to that which the water rates would amount to if supplied to him according to his application until such time as he completes the connection with his premises. No connection shall be made with the water mains of the Town for any purpose until a permit has been issued therefor, and only under the direction and supervision of the Water Works Superintendent or any other person duly authorized by the Council to act in such capacity. The size of the service pipe to be installed for supplying water for domestic purposes shall not be larger than 2 in., internal diameter, except where such service shall be required to supply more than six separate

faucets or fixtures, or where the premises to be supplied with water is sufficiently elevated to cause a reduction in the pressure of the water supply due to this size of pipe, and thus render it inefficient, in which case the owner of such premises shall be entitled to a larger sized service pipe, not however, to exceed 1 in., in diameter. For commercial and industrial purposes the size of service shall be determined by the Water Works Superintendent. The additional cost of any service which is enlarged to provide fire protection for any property shall be paid by the owner, and any service for fire protection only shall be paid by the owner. The water service shall be laid at such a depth that it will not be affected or interrupted by freezing and the Water Supt., shall have the right to refuse to turn on the water until the pipes on the premises of the applicant shall be placed at a suitable depth to protect them from frost, or shall be otherwise adequately protected. The Town further reserves the right to refuse to turn on the water or to connect with any plumbing which has not been done in a proper manner or which has not been examined or approved by the Plumbing and Water Inspector or his duly authorized agent. Whenever any water service has been laid to any building the owner shall immediately attach thereto a proper shut-off and waste cock, and protect all pipes on the premises from frost.

CAUSE FOR SHUTTING OFF WATER SERVICE

9. Any water service from the water supply may be shut off for:—
(a) Non payment of any water rate or sewer rate.
(b) Defective plumbing causing an unnecessary waste of water.
(c) Any violation or any of the provisions of this by-law, and when so shut off, or shut off at the request of the owners of the premises the sum of 2.00 shall be charged for turning on the supply.

DEFECTIVE PLUMBING.
10. The water shall not be turned on or be allowed to flow from a water main to any premises unless the plumbing on said premises has been performed in a workmanlike manner and thoroughly protected from frost and approved by the Plumbing and Water Inspector. In any premises to which water is supplied and in which the plumbing has not been performed in a workmanlike manner, or where the pipes and fixtures are not sufficiently strong to resist the pressure to which they are subjected, or where they are not sufficiently protected from frost or where the person so supplied with water has not otherwise complied with the provisions of this by-law relating to the taking and using of water, the Plumbing and Water Inspector shall shut off from such premises and keep the same shut.

You are hereby notified that it is the intention of the Town of Woodstock to sell under the lien for taxes provided for by Chapter 58 of the Acts of Assembly 1918 and amending Acts the following described real estate:
