Upper Kintore, N. B.—A gloom has again been cast over this community, caused by the death of Mrs. Alex Phillip, which occurred at her home, Sunday noon, October 6th, after a lingering illness, which she bore with Christian fortitude.

Although she had been in failing health for some time, she was only confined to her bed for the last three weeks.

The past summer was a hard one for the late Mrs. Phillip, losing her husband and son, some three months ago, with but a few days between.

The funeral services, conducted by the Rev. G. C. Pringle, were held from her home and the Presbyterian Church. The hymns sung were "The Lord's My Shepherd," "Sometime We'll Understand," "Will the Circle be Unbroken," "Peace, Perfect Peace," "Asleep in Jesus."

"He'll Wipe all Tears Away," Mrs. Phillip was seventy-two years of age, and leaves to mourn their loss, four sons, Alex at home, Willie L., of Plaster Rock, Andrew in France, and James, a prisoner of war in Germany, and six daughters, Mrs. Harry Glenville, of Rutland, Conn., Mrs. Geo. Workman, of Boston, Mass, Mrs. Robert Gordon, of Webb, Sask., Mrs. William Daigle, of Houlton, Me., Mrs. John Christie of this place, and Miss Elsie at home.

Mrs. Phillip was of a kind and genial disposition and won many friends who extended their deepest sympathy to the family in their sad bereavement.

Miss Maude V. Henderson, daughter of the late Thad. Henderson, and niece of Mrs. S. S. Miller of Hartland, died in New York last week.
