THE RETURNING SOLDIERS.

In the public eye there is something heroic in every man, WHO ENLISTED, went to the front and took his grueling, and the public is going to express its appreciation for what these boys have done.

It is true that there are many ways in which the appreciation can be shown. The returning soldiers themselves will soon sicken of sentimental exhibits, and so strangely is human nature formed, that those who have seen the most service will be those who will be the quickest and most completely disgusted by sentimentalism.

The best, and only really profitable type of hero worship in which the country should indulge, is to make certain that the returning soldier has a fair chance to establish himself in peaceful occupations and realize a civilian future. He does not ask fair treatment as a reward for what he has done; he expects it as a matter of justice.

There will be celebrations greeting the boys, and there ought to be. The country will show its appreciation in this customary way, but when the excitement dies down and the return is made to the daily round, then will the returned men soon learn of the presence or absence of substantial appreciation. They do not ask to be petted, they do not ask to be made objects of patriotic charity (and to resort to either course would be to offer insult to them) but the fair deal they expect and the fair play they must get in the way of opportunity of profitable employment.

Some Facts Concerning D. W. Griffith's "Hearts of the World"

"Hearts of the World" was eighteen months in the making. The production is not in any sense a war play, but a love story of the great war, with the conflict serving as the grim background.

The battle scenes were taken on the battlefields of France by permission and with the assistance of the British and French governments. Mr. Griffith and many of his principal players, including Lillian and Dorothy Gish and Mrs. Gish, mother of the two girls; Robert Harrold and George A. Seigmann, were under actual bombardment three times, on one occasion for a period covering four hours.

Mr. Griffith had to wear a steel helmet to protect him from shrapnel and a gas mask to protect his lungs during the taking of many of the stirring scenes.

David Lloyd George, Prime Minister of England, received Mr. Griffith in private audience in the British cabinet rooms in Downing street, London. Upon Mr. Griffith's departure, Lloyd George said: "God speed you in your great work and grant that you may accomplish your desires." In the prologue of the story of "Hearts of the World" Lloyd George is seen shaking hands with Mr. Griffith prior to the latter's departure for the French lines.
