PREMIER FOSTER HANDLES MR. MURRAY WITH- OUT GLOVES

The Vacancy in Carleton Co.
Will be Filled at Proper
Time.

In his reply to Hon. James Murray, Premier Foster made the following reference to the vacancy in Carleton:

His honorable friend had referred to the fact that no writ had been issued to fill the vacancy in Carleton county. While his friend had not been consistent in many of his statements, yet his allusion to this matter was the most inconsistent of all. The speaker said he was forced to admit that it was better that each county should be fully represented in the house, but could not see that public interest was suffering to any extent. His honorable friend opposite had been one of the worst sinners in matters similar to that of which he complained. In fact he was the worst sinner in this particular ever known in the province.

Mr. Murray (Kings)—"That is no excuse for you."

Hon. Mr. Foster—"I was referring to the inconsistency of my honorable friend."

In the city of St. John, when the late members, Hon. J. E. Wilson and Mr. Lockhart, deemed it wise to take cover and accept each one of them a gift of office, his friend opposite made no attempt to fill the vacancies. He left the largest centre of population in the province to the tender mercies of his colleagues at that time. These vacancies had extended to a period of nearly two years; in Gloucester to more than one year; in Kent more than a year; and these all at the same time, and yet his honorable friend now accused him.

Mr. Murray (Kings)—"I did not accuse you."

Other interruptions from the opposition side were followed by the Speaker's call for order.

Hon. Mr. Foster said that the leader of the opposition was getting a dose of his own medicine and he had nothing to complain of. In his opinion, the county of Carleton was fairly well represented, if the house were to judge by the action of the present member. In the last session hardly a day passed when one of them did not rise in his place and ask the minister of public works if he was aware that a certain bridge was in a danger

Military Features Confined to Attendance of Officers Upon Lieut. Governor— Large Attendance Within Chamber— First Session Opened by Gov. Pugsley.

The second session of the Seventh Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick was opened Thursday afternoon at three o'clock by Hon. William Pugsley, Lieutenant-Governor, with the customary ceremony within the chambers, but with none outside. There was no guard of honor, all troops which might perform such duty being overseas, and there was no artillery salute of thirteen guns for a Lieut.-Governor, for a similar reason. Within the Chamber the military part of the ceremonial was confined to the attendance upon His Honor of his aide-de-camps and a staff of officers all in service dress.

As usual, the ceremony attracted a gathering which filled the galleries of the chamber. Outside the Parliament Buildings there was not the usual throng—the absence of military display accounting for that. Acting Clerk Dibblee had issued a large number of invitations to seats on the floor of the House, and many ladies were present. The majority were wives of members of the Legislative Assembly.

ATTENDING UPON HIS HONOR.

His Honor entered the chamber at three o'clock. His personal staff was composed of Lieut. Col. J. L. McAvity, A. D. C., Major W. J. Osborne, A. D. C., and Mr. R. S. Barker, Private Secretary. Among the officers present were Brigadier General A. H. Macdonnell, Lieut. Colonel A. H. H. Powell, Major J. J. Bull, Capt. T. R. McNally, Capt. G. H. Boyd, Capt. Bennett, Capt. Heron.

THE GOVERNOR'S PARTY.

The Governor's party, which was seated in the Chamber and which after the ceremony repaired to the Queen Hotel, where the usual reception was held, was composed of Mrs. William Pugsley, Mrs. D. C. Scott, of Ottawa, Mrs. D. P. Chisholm, Mrs. Gillmor Brown, Mrs. J. L. McAvity, and Mr. G. B. McDonald, of St. John.

The address in reply to the speech of wrongs committed against the province in connection with the St. John and Quebec Railway Commission was made by Dr. J. E. Hetherington, of Queens Co., who dealt at some length with all the matters referred to. With regard to the Valley Railway inquiry, he said:

"The members of this House may differ with each other in political opinions, but every honorable gentleman will recognize and support legislation which has for its purpose the prevention of irregularities, such as made it necessary to appoint a commissioner to investigate the affairs of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company. The business of this province should be so conducted that there would be no occasion for such investigations. There should be no difficulty about carrying on the affairs of the country in an honest and

must surely be acceptable to every honorable member of this House."

With regard to proposed health legislation, Dr. Hetherington declared:

"It is quite time that we adopted some adequate policy for remedying the situation as it now exists, and take some steps toward the safeguarding of the general health of our population. The failure to do so in these days of scientific advancement in medical knowledge and well-tried out systems of sanitation, disease control and all other health means of preserving life and health become little short of criminal. I think I am free to say that any legislation that the government may be pleased to propose to insure better health conditions will meet with a sympathetic reception."

Legislation regarding roads, crown lands, etc., was approved.

Mr. J. E. Michaud of Madawaska, in seconding the address, made congratulatory reference to the appointment of Lieutenant Governor Pugsley and Chief Justice Hazen, and discussed the important features in the speech from the throne. Dealing with financial situation, he said:

"If the situation is not too bright we should not despair, for we have at the head of our affairs men of some financial ability, capable of dealing with problems more intricate than those which they have now to solve. And if we look at the speech from the throne it is fair to assume that they have already found the remedy and that it lies in the development of our natural resources. It is because our fundamental resource is agriculture, and it is in that branch that most can be done for the promotion of the welfare of our people that the premier has placed in charge of that department a man who not only can combine theory with practical knowledge of farming, but realizes the importance of the trust imposed in him. I have no doubt that when the people are educated to turn their attention to farming the most profitable branch of industry, the value of our land will rise above the average price of \$23 per acre."

MACHINE WEIGHING ABOUT TWO TONS COMING BY EXPRESS

Electric Light Company
Street Lighting Situation Un-
avoidable.

To His Worship the Mayor and Council the meeting of the Town Council on Friday evening:

To His Worship the Mayor and Councilors, of the Town of Woodstock, N. B.

Gentlemen: We notice upon reading the report of your last regular meeting that you appointed a committee to interview us regarding the matter of street lighting, but as yet the committee have not appeared.

We regret very much that these lights have been out of order for such a length of time, and have been a just source of complaint by the citizens both to the Council and ourselves, but the situation has been unavoidable.

As you perhaps know, the current regulator at our power house met with an accident and we secured the services of an expert from Montreal, thinking the regulator could be repaired at our plant, but after several tests and much correspondence, we were advised to send the regulator to the factory for repairs. This under present conditions will take some time, but as this piece of mechanism is somewhat expensive, we did not feel like purchasing a new one, but are glad to inform you that we have secured the loan of one from the Hydro Electric Co. of Toronto, which, although it weighs about two tons, we are having come forward by express this week, and hope to have the lights in a few days.
