Houlton, Me., July 5.—With 5,000 race enthusiasts as spectators, and with close finishes in every heat, the postponed 4th of July races here today furnished the best racing "witnessed here for many years."

Canadian horses won three of five races, P. Doherty, the veteran Canadian owner and driver, winning the 2.11 with Thomas Earle, but was pushed hard by Roy Volo; Belmont Miller, driven by Boutillier of Halifax, the 2.20, while Cassie W. Young of Woodstock, after being placed fourth and second yesterday came back today and won the special race in three straight heats. The old campaigner, Bangor, Tingley and Reed, took first money in the 2.15 in three straight heats, while Bromes, which won two heats yesterday, was winner in the 2.25. In the third heat of this race the judges gave Reed first position, placing Bromes second on account of running. In the fourth heat Dewse, the driver of it, was alleged to have used the whip illegally on Bromes and the latter horse was given first position.
