. HOW TO TREAT IT.

When a person is struck by influenza, only one course lies open. That is to take to bed with the least possible delay, and call a doctor. Rest, warmth and quiet are three sovereign remedies of the primary disease, and the best preventive of its more deadly complications, of which pneumonia is the most frequent. While there is no specific for influenza, yet there are many drugs which play a useful part n relieving it, such as quinine, aspirin and various 'tonics, anti-neuralgic, antiseptic and heart medicines to be prescribed by the


