JUNE SESSION MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

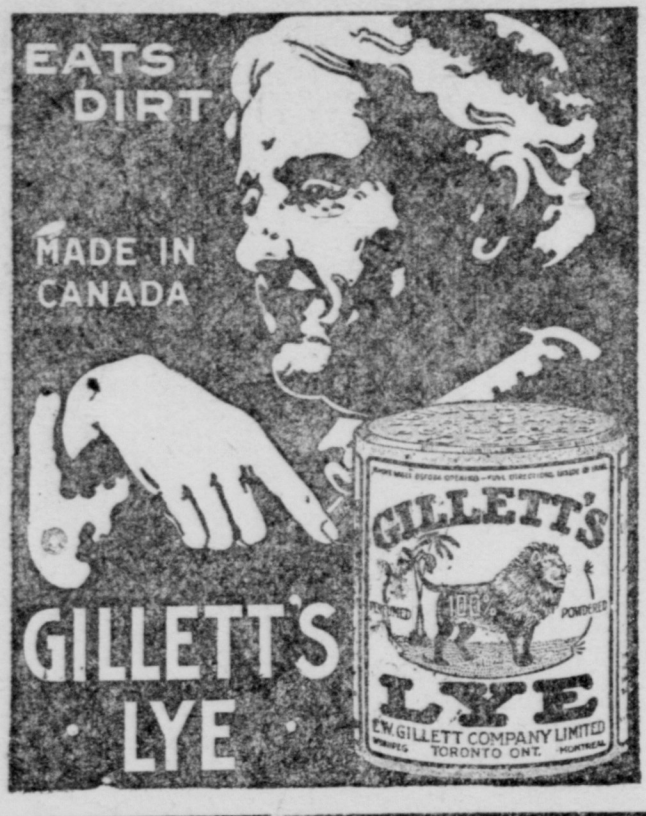
we could, and are thankful for assistance given us by the many persons interested.

Coun. Keith—We could have sold more oats at Hartland but local concerns sold for 25c a bushel less. The red rife was a good quality, some complaints were made of first lot being inferior quality. Local concerns sold a lot.

Coun. Carvell wanted to know about the expense. If we appoint a committee we should pay their expenses.

Coun. Tracy—So far as the seed wheat committee is concerned, it fell to me to distribute the seed without any charge. I kept a bill of expenses I had no authority to spend the money and if the council sees fit to pay it, well and good, if not I will stand it myself. I was away from my home in a very busy season and feel that \$4 a day for 27 days' services is not unreasonable.

Coun. Moxon thought the price the

government charged they should pay the expenses.

Coun. Tracy—I am well aware that oats could be bought for 23 cents less but they were not the quality of oats the government distributed. The government did not make a cent on the grain sold.

Coun. Moxon—They should have charged enough to cover the expense.

Coun. Melville—We voted against this but the committee did the right thing in financing it, or we would have had a shortage. The government should have paid the expenses, as other governments have done.

Coun. Anderson was in favor of paying the bill incurred by Coun. Tracy, \$219.65, and he would move that this bill be paid.

Coun. Benn and Coun. Keith had each small bills.

Coun. Tracy would pay Coun. Keith's bill as it was for freight. I

may say I was assured by the govern

ment that if our proposition had come in first it would have been adopted. I am satisfied that the government did not have a man to send out on this business. My bill represents actual money paid out.

Coun. Lamont did not approve of this way of doing the business, but wanted the committee paid. This council could have bought the seed and handled it cheaper.

Coun. Tracy—A lot of this grain was bought and sowed from a patriotic standpoint.

Coun. Watson—The committee deserves a lot of credit for their work. The grain was needed and there would have been a shortage if it had not come. If Coun. Tracy had not financed it we would have been without grain.

Coun. Gallagher and Anderson thought the bill should be paid by the government.

Coun. Perry (Kent) had the impression that a freight had been paid by parties receiving the grain.

Coun. Tracy—If Coun. Perry paid way freight on grain he is entitled to be paid back. If he can produce the freight bill I will pay it.

Coun. Moxon—We need the grain badly and I think the committee did remarkably well and should be paid.

Coun. Perry (Simonds) I had no idea we would have anything to pay as our agreement with Dr. Keirstead was well understood. Am not at all satisfied with the way the thing turned out. We wanted white wheat and got red.

Coun. Tracy—We were told white wheat was hard to get. They could only get one car for the province and it was sent here to Mr. Frapp. How far could one car go in Carleton county? We did the best we could under the circumstances. It was impossible to put it over the whole county. I don't think we should pay the bill. I assumed the responsibility and I leave it in the hands of the council. (To Coun. Smith)—The car that came to Mr. Frapp was the first car shipped and came quicker than was expected, and he could handle it and had sold some before we took it over.

Coun. Tompkins—Mr. Keirstead promised that a competent man would be sent to handle it. He was not sent and the only thing to do was to have Coun. Tracy do the work. We should pay Coun. Tracy and bill the government.

Coun. Carvell—It was not a promise from Mr. Keirstead it was a resolution of this council and was not accepted by the government.

Coun. Smith—No one opposes Coun. Tracy being paid it is only a criticism of the manner in which the government handled it.

Coun. Tracy—Coun. Tompkins was right. Dr. Keirstead did agree to send a man, but he asked me to do it in case they could not send a man. I did not agree to do it.

Coun. Lamont thought it should stand over till January session.

The report of the committee was adopted with the sum of \$219.65 to be paid Coun. Tracy.

The Warden thought that the urgency of the matter and general conditions that Carleton County was getting out well. From a patriotic standpoint we should pay the bill even if open to some criticism.

Coun. Carvell said if this county was going to appoint committees to do its work any expense incurred should be paid. We have a report from Coun. Perry (Kent) who went to King's county and no doubt had expenses.

Coun. Perry (Kent)—If you will build a municipal home I will not charge any expense for my labors.

Coun. Melville—Moved that the dog tax question be laid over till January session. Nothing can be done now as assessment has already been made.

Coun. Carvell—It's no use of this council carrying this over from one session to another—we should settle it now. If the sheep industry of this country is suffering from dogs we should act.

Coun. Melville—We can't do anything now that assessment is made. It seems a desire to go into another day's session of the council. I am in favor of a dog tax.

Let the government send a man here and explain the law.

Coun. Smith was in favor of a dog tax.

Coun. Anderson—If we can't get the tax collected we can't get rid of the dogs.

Coun. Phillips favored a dog tax but it can't be put in force this season as the petitions have been sent back by the Secy-Treas. on request of the Agriculture Dept. who said they would have a representative here at the June session. If the tax can't be collected this year we may as well let it go over till January.

Coun. Tracy—Was in favor of a dog tax if it could be carried out. We should have the dog law here to get some information. We should take some action but we don't know how to proceed.

The question was laid over till January session.

Coun. Anderson asked if there was any law relating to auto driving at excessive speed through certain villages. In my own village it is extremely dangerous.

Coun. Tompkins—There has been some talk about appointing a man in our district to enforce the provincial law relating to speeding autos. Since then a man has been appointed, but I don't know who appointed him. He is on the job.

Warden Flemming—A considerable number of bills have been presented but the auditor is not here to go into them. It is the duty of the accounts committee to examine these bills and report.

Couns. Melville, Perry (Simonds) Derrah, were the committee who took bills under consideration.

The C. Treas. and Fin. Com. were authorized to borrow \$10,000 to cover patriotic grant and other bills that may come up.

Moved by Coun. Carvell seconded by Coun. Tracy.

Coun. Melville—This is some money and is more than we had last year. Can't the patriotic fund wait?

County Secy—We will not borrow unless called upon for payment. There is a payment to be made each month.

The motion carried.

Fred L. Clark, Parish of Brighton, was added to list of constables.

The Council went into a committee of the whole and took the bills and accounts.

The name of one of the overseers poor, Parish of Wicklow, was struck off list of parish officers for Wicklow and Bert White added.

Coun. Gallagher—Moved a committee of five (5) be appointed to purchase a poor farm for county of Carleton.

Coun. Melville—Where are you going to get the money?

Coun. Smith—It was voted to let this matter lay over till after the war. The war is not over. We better wait. I feel in this as in my own private business. This should be put off.

Coun. Lamont—This is important and should have considerable consideration. The poor farm had better not be pressed at present. We may be called on to raise more money for patriotic fund. Values are too high.

Coun. Tompkins was in sympathy with establishing a poor farm. It is cheaper to handle the undesirable and if this is so, why not buy now and get in operation as soon as possible. It works well in town of Woodstock why not in County?

Coun. Phillips was in favor of a poor farm and the quicker it is bought the better. If it is a good thing after the war it is good before the war. The poor farm will be an asset to the county. Now is the time to act. We are 25 years behind time in this county.

Coun. Lamont—We should have more information on the subject. I

am opposed to it now.

Coun. Perry (Simonds)—This question has been agitated year after year. We have been getting estimates and figures for years. Coun. Lamont is hard to educate. It is hard now to get a poor person boarded. We will be in no better shape after the war, but may be in worse.

Coun. Anderson—The present time is not ripe for the purchase of a poor farm.

Coun. Carvell—While in favor of taking care of the poor, I don't like the resolution. It is to buy a poor farm and that means all that goes with it. This matter should be laid over for more consideration.

Coun. Moxon—Some members of the board always want to lay things over.

Coun. Melville—The argument that we can do this now much cheaper I can't see. We will do well to get off with \$15,000 or \$20,000 instead of \$7,000 as stated.

Coun. Perry (Kent)—We should have a large farm with lots of wood and not an elaborate building. This is important to our parish. \$7,400 was used last year for support of poor. We can save dollars and provide for the poor better with a farm.

I can say to Coun. Lamont that the parish of Aberdeen would only be called upon to pay its proportion of interest on the bonds.

Coun. Keith was fully in sympathy with a municipal home, but was not sure that this was an opportune time. We don't know what taxes may be put upon us.

Coun. Tracy—A vote was carried some time ago that this matter be laid over till after the war.

Coun. Phillips—Moved an amendment that a committee of five be appointed to investigate and find out what a farm can be bought for and report at January session.

Coun. Gallagher withdrew his motion.

Committee appointed—Couns. Perry (Kent), Keith, Phillips, Robert Bell, Clark.

Coun. Estey moved that the word three be changed to five for foot passenger in the ferry in bye-law No. 18 section 10. Seconded.

Coun. Perry (Kent) Ten cents is

quite a charge and I am not sure that it is just correct. Motion carried.

The warden read the following:

Resolved:—

That this Woman's Suffrage Association notes with pleasure the reforms set forth in the Public Health Act and urge upon the Provincial Government and Municipal Councils the wisdom and justice of appointing at least two women on each of the several Sub. Boards in the four divisions of the Province. The mothers, the girl workers and thousands of other women are deeply interested in the sanitation of our cities, towns and villages. We therefore claim the right to have an equal share with men in administering the several Sub. Boards that are to be created in this Province upon the proclamation of the new Health Act.

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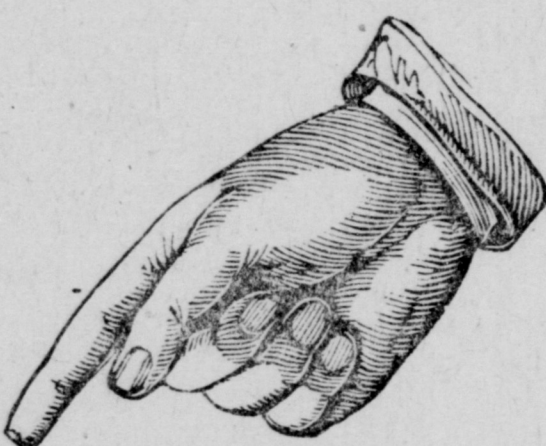
