Hon. Dr. W. P. Roberts, minister of public health announces that the ban on public gatherings throughout the province will be raised on Thursday, November 14th. Churches will be opened the following Sunday, and schools on following Monday, and Normal School on November 20.

A returned soldier who hired a team in Fredericton Thursday to drive to Marysville forgot to return and was rounded up in Woodstock Thursday night by Sheriff Foster. He had gone to Bloomfield to see his wife. He was handed over to the military authorities.

Stealing flags, breaking windows and other acts of vandalism have been among the features that have been successfully carried out during the past few days. If the officers of the law would drop activities along other lines and devote a little time to the public interests it would at least stop the criticism levelled at them for the apparent indifference to violations of the law.

## TOUCHING TRIBUTE TO CAPT. R. B. CAMPBELL FROM HIS COMRADE

A Kind and Considerate Officer—Died Nobly for us All

Officers Convalescent Hospital, Matlock Bath, Derby, England Sept. 4th 1918.

Mr. Charles Campbell, Woodstock, Car. Co., N. B.

Dear Sir:—

Am writing you these few lines in humble respect and deep sorrow at the death in action of your gallant son and my respected Company Commander, Captain R. B. Campbell, late of the 26th Canadian Battalion N. B. Regiment.

He was instantly killed in the German front line trench while gallantly leading his company in the great Canadian advance of Aug. 8th. At this point he rushed in front of his men, who were being held up by heavy machine gun fire, and reached the trench first where he was killed. The Boche defence here was soon afterwards overrun by his men who amply avenged his death. No one knows but those around him, how hard he worked and how well he planned, how patiently he taught us during the days previous to the offensive to have everything go right with his company, which was one of the leading companies in the attack.

From the time we started that morning until he met his death, he never ceased in his wise efforts to keep us in our proper direction in the fog, that surrounded us and have everything go right until he could no more,—"Faithful unto death."

Although a strict disciplinarian he was kind and considerate, not only to his officer but to every man from the first day one joined his company until the last, fair and square all round.

In your great loss which only takes precedence to the great loss to his battalion, his company and to us each individually, we all join in sincerest mourning and sympathy. Nothing can repay him or you and all of us for the sacrifice but may the thought that he died so nobly for us all after many months spent in useful and skilful work in the field in France help to alleviate your sorrow, God helping you.
