ENDORSED BY GEN. PERSHING.

A cable from General Pershing received recently by James A. Flaherty, Supreme Knight, Knights of Columbus, said:—

"I wish on behalf of the troops under my command to thank your organization not only for its generous and inspiring message but for the substantial service it is rendering the army in France."

The cablegram was in reply to one sent to General Pershing, Aug. 6th, when the K. of C. opened the Victory Convention at New York, conveying the good wishes of the organization and assurance that each of the 420,000 members of the order were behind the American forces abroad and were pledged without qualification to back the army to the limit.
