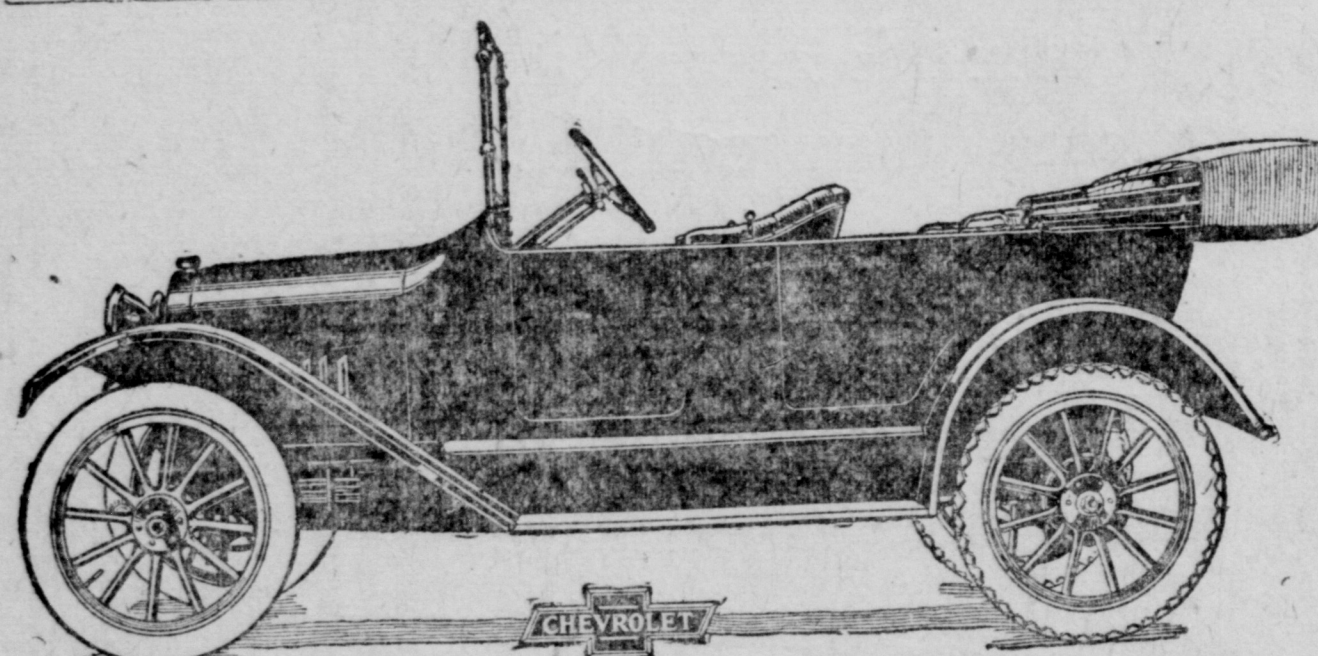

REV. JOSEPH EDW. WILSON, B. A.

(Maritime Baptist.)

On Sunday evening, November 3rd, the Rev. Joseph Edward Wilson, B.A., pastor of the Woodstock United Baptist church, was called from the service of his Lord on earth to the higher service awaiting him in heaven. The announcement of his passing from our midst was received with sincerest sorrow by all who knew him.

Brother Wilson was one of our best known and most useful and successful ministers. He will be greatly missed from all of our public gatherings, such as Associations and Conventions, in which his voice was heard, when matters of importance affecting our churches and denomination were being considered.

By birth Brother Wilson was a Nova Scotian, having been born in Barrington on April 27th, 1873. On the death of his father, Captain Wilson in 1883, the mother, with her four children, moved to Yarmouth. While in Yarmouth he learned the trade of carriage painter. Having acquired his trade he commenced business for himself and as a business man was on the road to success when he received what he believed to be a call from God to preach the gospel. Thus convinced, like Paul, he conferred not with flesh and blood, but at once set himself to the work of preparing himself for the service his Divine Master required of him.

At the age of twenty-two he became a student of Bates College, Lewiston, Maine. In due time he graduated, receiving the degree of B. A. He also took a course in theology in the Cobb Divinity School at Lewiston. As a student he commanded the respect of his fellow students and professors and was loved by all. He was prominent in all of the athletic features of college life, and was highly esteemed because of the fairness and honor which always characterized him at play.

The religious side and work of college life also appealed to him and he was never found lacking when called upon for service. In 1901 Brother Wilson became pastor of the Pine Street Free Baptist church, Lewiston, Maine. A year later, viz., March 5th, 1902, he was united in marriage to Miss Gosselin, who had been a fellow student at Bates. In 1903 Mr. Wilson returned to his native province of Nova Scotia, and became pastor of the Tivoli group of churches. Blessing attended his ministry here which covered a period of three years.

After the union of the two Baptist bodies, Brother Wilson received and accepted a call to become pastor of the United Baptist church at Chegoggin, N. S. For four years he was the beloved and successful pastor of this church. During his pastorate at Chegoggin there was quite an ingathering, including several retired sea captains.

In 1910 the George Street United Baptist church, Fredericton, extended to him a hearty and unanimous call to become pastor. After due consideration the call was accepted. For seven years Brother Wilson labored with continued and ever growing success at Fredericton. It was with the deepest regret on the part of his people that he resigned to accept a call extended to him by the church at Woodstock. While pastor in Fredericton he was appointed Chaplain of the New Brunswick Legislative Assembly, which position he resigned when he moved to his new pastorate.

Though pastor of the important church at Woodstock only since Aug. 1915, he had already witnessed an ex-

tensive increase by conversion to the membership. The secret, perhaps, of Brother Wilson's success in the ministry, may be found in the following testimony of one of the Woodstock church officers: "He was a man who lived very close to his Lord and Master; a great man in every way." Right up to his last days Brother Wilson was active in ministry and service of every kind. His last service was in securing pledges sufficient to pay off the debt on the church and parsonage.

In addition to being a good preacher, a hard working pastor, and a splendid organizer, he was also a good denominational man. He believed that the Baptist denomination had a mission and a message, which no other organized body of Christians could fulfil and deliver. Believing this he was always present at the Associational and Conventional gatherings of our body. In connection with our annual assemblies he has held official positions. He has been the Moderator of the New Brunswick United Baptist Association, and two years ago he was First Vice-President of the Maritime Baptist Convention. At the time of his death he was one of the members of the New Brunswick Home Mission Board.

In the death of Brother Wilson we all sorrow; but not as those who are without hope. He rests from his labors and his works do follow him. Our hearts go out in deepest sympathy to Mrs. Wilson, and the ones who are left to mourn. D. H.
