Another point of the defence was that the analysis did not state whether the over-percentage was volume or strength. The magistrate adjourned the case for two weeks when the Analyst, who resides in Chatham, will be present. It is understood that the manufacturers of the beer are behind the retailers. Chief Inspector Wilson was present at the hearing.

The small score was due to a tendency to play the man rather than the ball. Two Woodstock boys, Don Lindsay and Don Rankin played on the freshmen team and each put up a good brand of basketball. It would be impossible to name any stars on the local team as every man played a star game. Capt. Strain handled his team well and marked the opposing centre in splendid fashion, although he was decidedly shorter and lighter. The forwards, Watson and Smith, were closely covered but played brilliantly and showed a bunch of speed. Hayden and Tompkins, the defence men, held their forwards practically harmless and by their exceptionally clever work prevented a much larger score, as the college forwards did not miss many shots. There was a good attendance and the rooting was enthusiastic. The collegians had many supporters who backed their team in good style. Mr. Dyson Wallace refereed the game to the satisfaction of all. The boys are very grateful to Lieut. Ross for his courtesy in allowing them the use of the Armoury.
