NOTHING LESS THAN OUR BEST

Is it not time that those who have given only lukewarm support to war activities take a new viewpoint of the situation? If our boys can give up their lives, or suffer their help along the great cause, and everybody to be mangled; if the parents of these boys can make such a great sacrifice, what patience can we have with those who continually complain because they are asked to do with less wheat and other things they formally used in such lavish quantities. Every act of the government to



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"I am all through giving any support to the Y.M.C.A., Red Cross or any other object for war purposes." What do these deserve from the relatives and friends of the boys who are giving their all to the cause? And what about those who seek to make political capital from the blood suffering of our sons; what do they deserve? The casualties bring all this home to us. These sacrifices fill every decent one of us with a great ambition to show ourselves worthy of the boys who are dying for us. God! but they deserve our best, and even our best is insignificant in comparison with what they are doing.

And those who fall short of their best, or who seek to capitalize in any way this frightful war for their own selfish purposes or ambitions, are unworthy of the protection our boys in Flanders are giving them and of any consideration on our part. Nothing that anyone of us have been called upon, or will be called upon, to do here at home can even approach what they are doing for us over there, and those who hesitate or refuse to do their best are not worthy of the name of men.

LOCAL AND GENERAL

THE BIG FIELD DAY in aid of the Red Cross and Soldiers Comforts will be held at Connell Park, Wednesday, Sept. 11th. Watch for particulars.

The funeral of the late Mrs. H. Augusta Gibson, who passed away in New York after a protracted illness, was held from the residence of her son, George W. Gibson, on Wednesday. Funeral services at the home and grave were conducted by Rev. Mr. Walton. Interment was in Greenbank Cemetery. There were many beautiful floral offerings. The body was accompanied from New York by Mr. George Gibson.

A terrific electrical storm Wednesday afternoon accompanied by hail, rain and wind did considerable damage in town and outlying districts. Trees were blown down, badly dam-



aging telephone and telegraph wires and interfering with the service. A barn on the McLean farm was laid flat, and a barn on an adjoining farm met the same fate. Damage is reported to crops, especially corn. Fortunately the duration of the storm was brief or all crops would have been seriously damaged.

In a letter to the Sentinel, W. W. Hartley, of Mountain View, California, says in part:

"This war seems to draw us more closely together, as it piles our dead together in the trenches and on the battlefield and I am curious to read about it in my old home paper. Send me two dollars worth at war prices."

The forecast made by the Minister of Finance a few days ago to the effect that the last issue of Victory bonds would soon be selling at a premium was not long delayed.

When the price was raised from 98¢ buyer and 97¢ seller by 1¢ of one per cent in June it was foreshadowed even then that it would eventually be moved up again.

The new price now created by the stabilizing committee is 100¢ to the buyer and 99¢ to the seller. This gives a small premium as the original price barely covered the original cost to the holder.

The demand for the bonds was maintained notwithstanding the June advance, and it is still understood to be active.

LOST IN THE WOODS

William Ross Rescued From Possible Death—Killed Deer For Food—Found In Deserted Lumber Camp.

Mr. William Ross, who has been employed with Mr. George Newell at Millville for several months past, was rescued on Saturday afternoon from a possible death from exposure in the woods back of Millville. He had been in the woods since Monday last and was in a badly used up condition when found.

It appears that Ross left the house where he was employed on Monday last and started out for a few hours shooting in the woods back of his employer's home. The day was an ideal one, and he wandered on taking no notice of the time until nearly dark, when he decided to return home. This he discovered was no easy task. He then decided to stay in the woods all night, and taking his last two remaining matches he lighted a fire and made himself as comfortable as possible.

Just as he was beginning to feel the pangs of hunger he succeeded in killing a young deer, and this kept him alive, as it was the only food he had to eat for the balance of the week. Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday passed and Mr. Ross wandered around without being able to find his way to the clearance. On Saturday he came across a deserted lumber camp. He decided to make himself more comfortable, and, as luck would have it, he found several more matches, so he proceeded to cook the balance of the deer which he had carried since Monday evening.

He was beginning to enjoy as much comfort as he could under the circumstances, when a relief party from Millville discovered his whereabouts and took him back to the village. When he was located Ross was only nine miles from the house which he had left and only six miles from the clearance, and had apparently wandered around in a circle most of the time.

have destroyed 7 dogs. I have not made any charges for my work in connection with enforcement of the law. We will get the rest of them all right."

Coun. Leighton moved, seconded by Coun. Smith, that executions be issued against all ratepayers who have not paid their taxes. Carried.

Coun. Leighton said there was a very large delinquent water list—some running over 8 years and some using water are not on the books. It is somebody's fault. The rates should be collected up to May 1st and no fooling about it. It is about time to get after the delinquents and make them pay.

Coun. Smith—"I have been after the town treas. for sometime and it seems to be impossible to get anything done."

Coun. Stevens urged that a flag be

purchased for the town hall.

Coun. Leighton—The town bought a flag within three years and it seems to be nobody's business to look after these matters and the flag has disappeared."

A motion to buy a flag was carried. The matter was left to a committee consisting of Couns. Smith, Fewer and Brown.

Council adjourned to meet Monday evening.

CANADA.

PROCLAMATION

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern,—GREETING :

A Proclamation of conditional amnesty respecting men belonging to Class 1 under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, or their orders to report for duty, or are deserters or absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

able numbers of men belonging to Class 1 under our Military Service Act, 1917, called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada under our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, although they have thus become by law soldiers enlisted in the Military Service of Canada,

Have failed to report for duty as lawfully required of them under the said Military Service Act and the regulations thereunder, including the Order in Council duly passed on April 20 last,

Or have deserted,
Or absented themselves without leave from our Canadian Expeditionary Force,

And it is represented that the very serious and unfortunate situation in which these men find themselves is due in many cases to the fact that, notwithstanding the information and warning contained in our Proclamation aforesaid, they have misunderstood their duty or obligation, or have been misled by the advice of ill-disposed, disloyal or seditious persons.

AND WHEREAS we desire, if possible, to avoid the infliction of the heavy penalties which the law imposes for the offences of which these soldiers have thus been guilty, and to afford them an opportunity within a limited time to report and make their services available in our Canadian Expeditionary Force as is by law their bounden duty, and as is necessary for the defence of Our Dominion of Canada.

NOW KNOW YE that we in the exercise of Our powers, and of Our good will and pleasure in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare and cause to be published and made known THAT THE PENALTIES OF THE LAW WILL NOT BE IMPOSED OR EXACTED as against the men who belong to Class 1 under Our Military Service Act, 1917, and who have disobeyed Our Proclamation aforesaid; or who have received notice from any of Our registrars or deputy registrars to report for duty on a day now past and have failed so to report; or who, having reported and obtained leave of absence, have failed to report at the expiry of their leave, or have become deserters from Our Expeditionary Force, PROVIDED THEY REPORT FOR DUTY ON OR BEFORE THE TWENTY FOURTH DAY OF AUGUST 1918.

AND WE DO HEREBY STRICTLY WARN AND SOLEMNLY IMPRESS UPON ALL SUCH MEN, and as well those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist them in their disobedience, that, if they persist in their failure to report, absence or desertion until the expiry of the last mentioned day, they will be pursued and punished with all the rigour and severity of the law. SUBJECT TO THE JUDGMENT OF OUR COURTS MARTIAL WHICH WILL BE CONVENED TO TRY SUCH CASES or other competent tribunals: and also that those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist such men will be held strictly accountable as offenders and subject to the pains, penalties and forfeitures in that behalf by law provided for their said offence.

Provided however that nothing contained in this Our Proclamation is intended to release the men aforesaid from their obligation to report for duty as soon as possible or to grant them immunity from arrest or detention in the meantime for the purpose of compelling them to perform their military duty; Our intention being merely to forego or remit the penalties heretofore incurred for failure to report, absence without leave or desertion incurred by those men of the description aforesaid who shall be in the proper discharge of their military duties on or before the said twenty-fourth day of August, 1918.

Of all of which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness: Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin and Counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquess of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwicke, Baron Cavendish of Keighley, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter: One of Our Most Honourable Privy Counsellors: Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order, Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of OTTAWA, this FIRST day of AUGUST, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the ninth year of Our Reign.
