SHORT SESSION OF TOWN COUNCIL

Coun. Smith Explains Benefits of House Numbering.

The town council met Friday night, with all the members present.

A communication from Rev. Frank Baird in re. work of the greater production committee was read, and bills amounting to \$29, in connection with the work were ordered paid.

\$10 was ordered paid to George Flemming for part repairs on 'side-walk' near his building.

Coun. Fewer said he had issued orders to stop auto speeding.

\$255. premium of Jewel Filtration Co., \$25,000 bond was ordered paid.

Coun. Fewer said citizens were complaining of water bills as rendered not being correct.

Coun. Stevens asked for an explanation of the \$1000 in connection with numbering of houses.

Coun. Smith—The Sentinel had a misleading statement that \$1000 was to be expended for street numbering.

Coun. Stevens—Tell us what the \$1000 was for.

Coun. Smith—"It was for taking the water census. The water dept. should be run on a business basis and the numbering of houses is to carry out a proper system. The idea is that the numbers will never change. Mr. Grimmer won't make a fortune out of it as the numbers cost nearly one-half of the amount.

Coun. Gallagher would like power arranged to do our street lighting. After some unimportant talk on independent water power the council adjourned.
