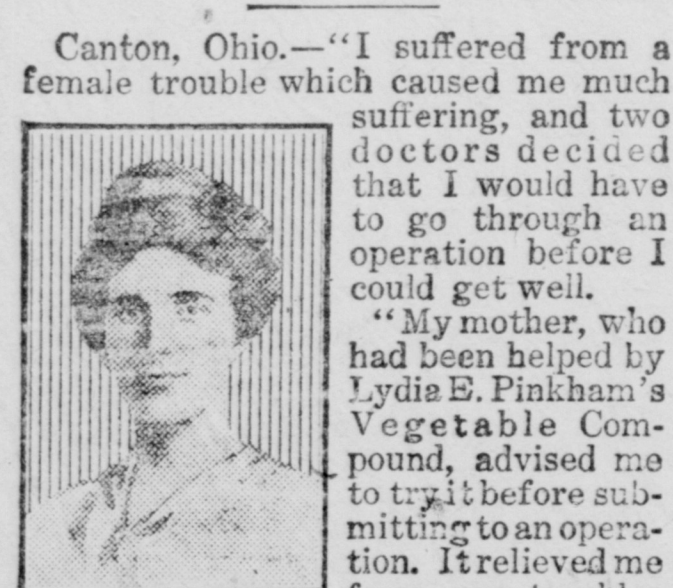

REGULATIONS THAT APPLY TO PRIVATE HOMES

The Canada Food Board prohibits, under penalty of a heavy fine, the use of sugar in making candy for home consumption, or for frosting cakes, or as a filler for cakes. This practically prohibits all use of cane sugar for home made candy. Licensed candy manufacturers are allowed to use one-half the amount of sugar each month that they used for the corresponding month of last year. If the war continues industries of this character may have to be closed, but it is only fair that such drastic action should apply to the homes before it closes our industries.

Only a limited amount of sugar and fats can be used in making fruit, pound, sponge or other cakes. Wheat flour must not be used in the manufacture of candy. It must not be used in the manufacture of paste for posters, wall papering, or similar purposes.

No private home or confectioner shall manufacture ice cream containing more than ten percent of fats, whether of vegetable or animal origin, or more than six pounds of sugar to eight gallons of ice cream.

Twenty-five pounds of flour, or a fifteen days' supply and a fifteen days' supply of sugar is the amount that one it allowed to purchase at a time unless he lives more than two miles distant from a licensed dealer when he is permitted to buy in larger quantities, the amount varying with the distance from the market. This does not prohibit farmers from holding the flour milled from their own wheat, provided that they report to the miller the amount of such flour in their possession.

Town of Woodstock, New Brunswick

A By-Law of the Town of Woodstock to Regulate Vehicles or Vehicular Traffic Within the Town of Woodstock

Printed Documents, purporting to be printed copies of any or all By-Laws passed by the Council, and purporting to be printed by the authority thereof, shall be admitted as prima facie evidence in all Courts in this Province of such By-Laws, and of the due passing thereof.

BY-LAW.

A By-Law to Regulate Vehicles and Vehicular Traffic within the Town of Woodstock.

The Town Council of the Town of Woodstock in Council assembled, enacts as follows:—

1. The term "vehicle" as used in this By-Law, shall include all led horses, everything on wheels or runners and all vehicles drawn or driven by animal or mechanical power, except fire apparatus, police patrols, hospital ambulances, His Majesty's Mail and baby carriages. The word "horse" includes horses, mules, oxen or other beasts of burden; the word "driver" includes the rider and driver of a horse, the rider of wheels and the operator of motor vehicles; the word "curbs" are the lateral boundaries of that portion of the street for use of the vehicles, whether marked with curb stones or not.

2. No person shall operate a motor vehicle upon any street of the town at a greater speed than one mile in five minutes, nor at a greater speed than one mile in ten minutes, or at a speed reasonable under the conditions, in turning or approaching a corner of an intersecting street.

3. All slow moving traffic, including drays, wagons and other vehicles moving at not more than four miles an hour, excluding bicycles, shall keep as near the left hand curb as possible.

4. All light or fast moving traffic including all vehicles moving at a rate of not less than four miles an hour, shall keep as nearly as possible upon any portion of the roadway lying between the line for slow moving traffic, as defined in the immediately preceding section, and the centre of the roadway.

5. A vehicle meeting another vehicle shall pass to the left.

6. A vehicle overtaking another vehicle shall pass on the right side of the overtaken vehicle, and shall not pull over to the left until entirely clear of it.

7. A vehicle turning into another street to the left shall turn the corner as near the left hand curb as possible.

8. A vehicle turning into another street to the right shall turn around the centre of the intersection of the two streets.

9. When two adjacent or intersecting streets from an angle greater or less than a right angle, a vehicle shall bear sharply across to the proper side of the street along which it is to proceed.

10. A vehicle crossing from one side of the street to another shall do so at the corner of the street.

11. No vehicle shall stop with its right side to the curb.

12. No vehicle shall stand backed up to the curb except when actually loading or unloading; and if said vehicle is horse drawn and has four wheels, the horse or horses must stand parallel to the curb and faced in the direction of the going traffic, but no vehicle shall stand so backed up if it interferes with or interrupts the passage of other vehicles.

13. No vehicle shall back to make a turn in any street if by so doing it interferes with other vehicles, but shall go around the block to a street sufficiently wide to turn in without backing.

14. Vehicles of the Police or Fire Department in answering a call, emergency repair wagons, His Majesty's Mail and ambulances shall have the right of way in any street. Funerals shall be classed as slow moving traffic, and shall have the right of way in any street.

15. Upon the approach of Fire apparatus, every vehicle shall be drawn as nearly as practicable to the left curb of the street, and remain at a stand-still until such apparatus shall have passed.

16. All traffic going in a northerly or southerly direction shall have the right of way in any street.

17. No vehicle shall occupy any street so as to interfere with or interrupt the passage of other vehicles.

18. No vehicle shall stop at the cross walk so as to interfere with the passing pedestrians.

19. A vehicle waiting at the curb shall promptly give place to a vehicle about to take on or let off passengers.

20. No horse shall be left unattended in any street or highway unless securely fastened, or unless the wheels of the vehicle to which he is harnessed are securely tied, fastened or chained and the vehicle is of sufficient weight to prevent its being dragged at a dangerous speed with

wheels so secured.

21. No person or persons shall drive through or upon any street roped, barricaded or indicated by words or writing prohibiting the use of the street for the time being.

22. No horse shall be unhitched in any street or highway unless securely fastened.

23. No person shall remove a wheel, pole, shaft, whiffletree, splinter bar, or any other part of a vehicle or any part of the harness likely to cause accident if the horse or horses start, without first unhitching the horse or horses attached to said vehicle.

24. No person shall drive a vehicle the reins in his hand while riding, driving or conducting a horse or vehicle, or by wanton or furious driving or racing, or other wilful misconduct, or by wilful neglect, lose control of the same, or remove his hands from the controlling apparatus of a vehicle propelled or driven other than by horse power.

25. No person shall drive a vehicle that is so covered or that is so constructed as to prevent the driver thereof from having a sufficient view of the traffic at the sides of such vehicle.

26. No person shall drive or conduct any vehicle in such condition, so constructed or so loaded as to be likely to cause unnecessary delay in traffic or accident or injury to man, beast or property.

27. No person shall ride on the rear of any vehicle without the consent of the driver, and when so riding, no part of the persons body shall protrude beyond the limits of the vehicle.

28. No person shall ride or drive a horse not in every respect fit for use and capable for the work in which it is employed; free from lameness or sores calculated to cause pain, and free from any vice or disease likely to cause accident or injury to person or property.

29. No person shall ill-treat, overload, over-drive or cruelly or unnecessarily beat any horse.

30. Drivers of vehicles must at all times comply with any directions, by voice or hand, of any member of the Police force as to stopping, starting, approaching or departing from any place, the manner of taking up or setting down passengers or loading or unloading goods in any place.

31. At theatres or public gatherings or under unusual circumstances, vehicles shall stand or move as directed by the police.

32. It shall be unlawful for any person operating any bicycle, tricycle, velociped, motor bicycle, automobile or any other riding machine or horseless vehicle, to use thereon, while traveling through the streets, any instrument for the purpose of giving a warning, which shall produce a sound of an unusually loud or distressing character or such that will tend to annoy or frighten pedestrians or animals, it being the intention of this section to prohibit the use of whistles, bells, gongs or any instruments for the purpose of producing unusually loud or distressing or annoying sounds. This action shall not apply to the vehicles of the Police or Fire Department or ambulances. No cutout open.

33. The driver of vehicles before turning, stopping or changing their course, shall make sure that such movement can be made in safety, and shall extend and wave the hand or whip to give some visible sign outside of the conveyance as a signal to persons driving vehicles behind them, if their intent on to make such turning movement.

34. All drivers of vehicles before backing shall give ample warning of their intention so to do, and while backing must take all proper precautions so as not to injure any person, beast or other property behind them.

35. No person who is not over 15 years old shall drive a public, licensed or business vehicle, excepting bicycles.

36. No person who is not over 15 years old shall drive a public, licensed or business vehicle, excepting bicycles.

37. Vehicles shall not stand or travel two or more abreast on any street, except in passing.

38. No horse or vehicle shall be driven, backed, led, or allowed to stand on any sidewalk.

39. No person operating a self-propelled vehicle shall permit the motors of the same to operate in such a manner as to visibly emit an unduly great amount of steam, smoke or products of combustion from exhaust pipes or openings.

40. No vehicle shall remain stationary on any street, so as to impede vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

41. When approaching a crossing, drive or corner, or when a pedestrian is in the street ahead, anyone operating a vehicle shall slow down and give timely warning.

42. Any person or persons found guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this By-Law shall be subject to a penalty of not less than \$5, or more than \$25, dollars.

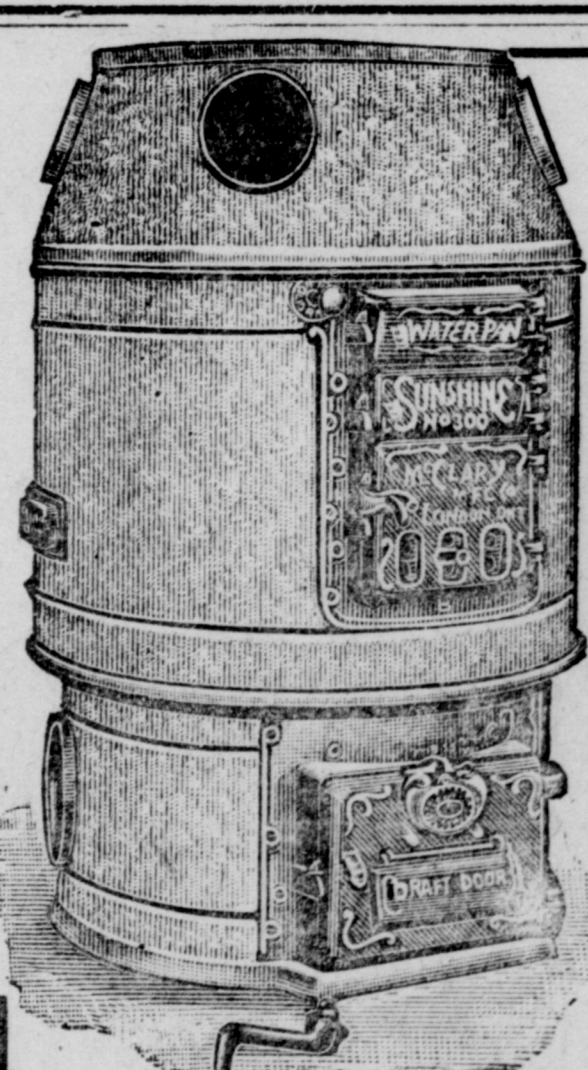
43. All By-Laws or parts of By-Laws in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, in so far as same conflict.

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.
DEPARTMENTS OF AGRICULTURE AND EDUCATION.
RURAL SCIENCE SCHOOLS FOR TEACHERS AT WOODSTOCK AND SUSSEX
JULY 10—AUGUST 8, 1918.

The full course of study in the Rural Science Schools occupies two summer sessions with an interim Winter Reading and Experimental Course. It includes: 1. Chemistry of Soil, Plants and Animals; 2. Physical Nature and Environment; 3. Nature Study of Animals; 4. Plant Life and School Gardening; Methods of Correlation and Study in the public schools with the regulations dealing with the work. No options. (See Regulation 50 in the Nature Study and Agriculture Course.)

Satisfactory completion of the Course entitles teachers to receive certificates of competency.

In naming the school an applicant wishes to attend the principle of readiest accessibility from home should govern.

Teachers actually engaging in the public schools of New Brunswick are eligible for admission free of charge.

Both Schools open at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of July 10th.

Teachers who propose to attend for Second year classes are requested to present themselves at 10 o'clock in the forenoon for examination on the Winter Reading and Experimental Course.

As no standard Certificates are issued by the Railways this year students will purchase return tickets with receipts for amounts paid for same. Cost of transportation from home to school (the one way) will be paid on condition stated above.
