JOHN DILLON SCORES SINN FEIN

Says it is to Blame for "Wicked" Policy Toward Ireland

LONDON, July 13.—John Dillon, member of Parliament for East Mayo and Chairman of the Nationalist Party, in acknowledging to-day resolutions pledging support of the County Carlow branch of the United Irish League to the Nationalist Party, denounced the "reckless, wicked policy of the Government" toward Ireland. He added:

"But it would be folly to ignore the fact that responsibility for the present conditions, to a very large extent, is shared by the leaders of the Sinn Féin movement who have led a section of the people along a path that is bound to place the country under a military dictatorship."

STRAIGHT DENIALS TO TESTIMONY OF SCALER MURCHIE

Fredericton, July 15.—Absolute and unqualified denial of the allegations in the Murchie affidavit was given by Hon. Wm. Currie, speaker of the legislature at the afternoon session of the inquiry which is being held by James Field, K.C., of Moncton, Mr. Currie's version of the conversation on which the charges were based differs vastly from that given by Murchie, the former government lumber scaler. His evidence was given with evident candor and frankness and as a witness he proved much different from the man responsible for the charges.

Hon. Mr. Currie testified that when Murchie introduced the question of stumpage he informed the scaler that Mr. Richards had told him that he (Richards) had settled the stumpage with the scaler and the witness refused to discuss the matter. He merely told Murchie to do the best he could without doing wrong, according to his evidence. He also testified that he had advised Murchie not to do anything that would get him into trouble. As to his knowledge of the cut at that time, he explained that once the company was assured of the logs they needed—in that year about four million feet—they were not much concerned with the remainder and did not attempt to check up their cut definitely until they received the reports of the results of the saw mill operation.

He had not attempted to check the stumpage payment as Mr. Richards looked after the financial affairs of the company, he managed the manufacturing and had little to do with office routine, in which class he put the signing of the check prepared for him by the accountant. He swore that he had made no attempt to influence Murchie to reduce the scale. Daniel E. Richards, President of the Continental Lumber Company gave equally emphatic evidence on the subject of the settlement of the stumpage. At the time Murchie approached him he testified, he did not know what the cut was but informed Murchie that he thought it was less than the previous year when they paid on 4,700,000 feet. Murchie asked him if between 4,500,000 and 5,000,000 feet would be satisfactory. He also denied making any attempt to influence Murchie in the preparation of his scale.

The morning session and part of the afternoon was taken up with evidence of Colonel T. G. Loggie, deputy minister of the department of lands and mines. Colonel Loggie's evidence showed that Murchie had not sent in the monthly returns expected of him. He also admitted
