CITIZENS TRY SHALE AS A FUEL

Sample quantities of shale, sent to Mr. D. V. Storm, were tried out by several citizens with results that were quite satisfactory. It burns freely, almost "fiercely," throwing out an intense heat. In one instance in an ordinary sized heater, the fire lasted three and a half hours without replenishing. The open grate fire seemed to give the best satisfaction. Citizens who witnessed the demonstrations were quite satisfied that, in view of the fuel situation, shale could be used to advantage. It was stated that it could be landed here at a cost of six or seven dollars per ton.

position in the open and let Fritz have it. The Hun went so fast the first two days that it kept us all our time catching up. You could always see the fruits of our labors in the shape of hundreds of prisoners passing. We would be in action on the top of a hill and looking to the front you could see thousands of our

cavalry chasing the Huns out of the towns and woods. They came to a railway and captured a whole train load of reinforcements.

Mother dear you were speaking of Robbie Campbell. I met Willie McDougal a week ago and he said he was with poor Rob when he was killed. Convey to Mr. and Mrs. Campbell my heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement. I would go to his grave but it is a long way from here. Willie Mc. also saw cousin Harry. I met Elmo Tabor day before yesterday; he had quite a narrow escape. He was driving a car up a road which was being pretty heavily shelled and a big shrapnel burst just in front of the car, some pieces coming through the wind shield killing one occupant and wounding two others. Elmo escaped without a scratch.

I am sending you a souvenir of a shoulder strap of a Hun with the number of the regiment he belonged to. They are so short of metal that they make their badges of cloth and work the numbers in it with stitching.

In the Big Show, Sir D. Haig was around shaking hands with the boys and complimenting them on their great victory. Our Major went away yesterday to be decorated with the Croix de Guerre by one of the great French Generals. Our brigade was on the extreme right of the British line and of course we were more or less mixed up with the gallant little French. One time during the attack our fellows got quite a bit ahead so they had to wait till the French caught up on the right. When they came up one of our officers said: "Come on Frenchie, you're late." "Oh Pardon," they said, "it is you that are too early, we cannot keep up with the gallant Canadians."

Gen. Foch calls the canucks "his pets," so we are now known at Foch's Pets and the storm troops of the British Army. I don't think anyone will ever have cause to be ashamed of the Canadian Soldier or the part they have played in this G. R. E. A. T. struggle, and I have the greatest hopes that we will have Old Kaiser Bill by the neck before Christmas and the outlook now is all in favor of it being over at an early date. I was talking to some prisoners on Wednesday and one said in two months "Kaiser finish" and he made motions like cutting his throat.

Mother I don't write as often as I should. I don't forget but am always thinking about you and how grand it will be to get back home and enjoy life again.

drive, on the 8th, and came very near to put a bullet through my steel helmet that burnt the back of my neck. I intended to try and keep the helmet for a souvenir but I lost it when I got hit. On the 16th our company (D. Co.) started out about 4.30 in the afternoon to go ahead and rout Heinie out from an old railroad. My platoon, lucky old 13, started up an old trench, full of wire, which made it hard going, and about every five or ten yards we would have to jump out and run along on top. Lieut. McDougal who had charge of 15 Platoon 140th at Hartland, had charge of D. Co. that day and he was with us. We kept on going ahead for sometime throwing bombs and one thing or another at him. In the meantime we had suffered quite a few casualties and had got ahead too fast for the others on the flank, consequently Heinie tried to cut us off and very nearly succeeded. Lieut. McDougal said we would have to turn around and fight our way back. Well we started and that's where I got a bullet in the left shoulder. I was not long getting to England and am doing fine here. I expect to be up in a few days.

Don't forget a parcel soon. I received that birthday one after the first two days drive while we were resting up a bit.

The following further information has been received concerning Pte. Bernard Saunders:—"Was admitted a very few days ago to the Bethnal Green Hospital, Mile End, London, E. 4, England, after nearly ten days in hospital in France, having been wounded on the 16th by shrapnel in the shoulder and back, through the chest. The wound near the shoulder joint is on left side. The eighth rib is fractured, but all wounds are healthy. There is no pain in breathing and no cough. He is very cheerful, told our representative when he saw him two or three days ago he hoped to be up, soon! Really the pluck of our men is wonderful. We do sincerely hope he will continue to make good progress. I know we shall have good news for you in the future. Assuring you of our keen sympathy and interest.
