A YEAR OF PREPARATION.

At the end of last week the United States have been a year at war. What have they accomplished in that time?

In some ways, not much. In other ways, a great deal. Their way has been active and efficient. Their money has been given without stint. In other directions, they have not got far beyond the preparatory stage.

But from now onwards they will count in ever increasing measure. The hundred thousand men they are said to have on the firing line will presently be two millions. Their aeroplanes will fill the air. Their ships will be in numbers and tonnage sufficient.

Most of the talk about the United States being behind in their preparations is just politics of the very nasty sort with which all democracies are afflicted.

On the day the United States declared war, the world knew the defeat of Germany had become certain. To our impatience the development of her strength may seem slow, but in the end, it will be crushing.

DAYLIGHT SAVING.

Why should representatives of rural communities object to the Daylight Saving Bill? The pop-



ular conception of a farmer's life in summer is that he gets up an hour before the sun and works hard until dark. Then he does the chores and goes to bed.

This program takes no account of any regulations regarding hours of labor. Under such conditions, why should the farmer care what the clock says?

The hired man may be pardoned for suspecting any scheme which gets him up earlier in the morning. Experience may have taught him that the implied promise of knocking off earlier in the evening is entirely too problematical.

But it is a new thing to find members of parliament so tender with the feelings of the hired man. Probably at bottom the motive of such representatives is nothing more serious than a vague dislike of change. They will submit to be dragged along by the chariot of progress but they refuse to pretend to enjoy it.

AIM STRAIGHT.

The most hopeful words that can go to the soldiers in France are those of a London clergy-

man, Father Bernard Vaughan. One of his fellow ministers regretted that it was necessary to kill so many Germans. The priest militant replied that in his blundering, stupid way he thought: "What a pity it is to miss so many of them." The war aims should be accurate aims, and every bullet should bring down a German. It will be a pity to miss any of the Germans now. There has been a great deal of talking about war aims. However golden the words may be, leaden bullets are the better.

THAT NEW CANNON.

The performance accredited to this instrument of death astonishes the world but does nothing further except, perhaps, to inflict a few casualties on innocent women and children in an allied capital. This new contraption, whatever it is, will not get Germany anywhere nearer to final victory in the war.

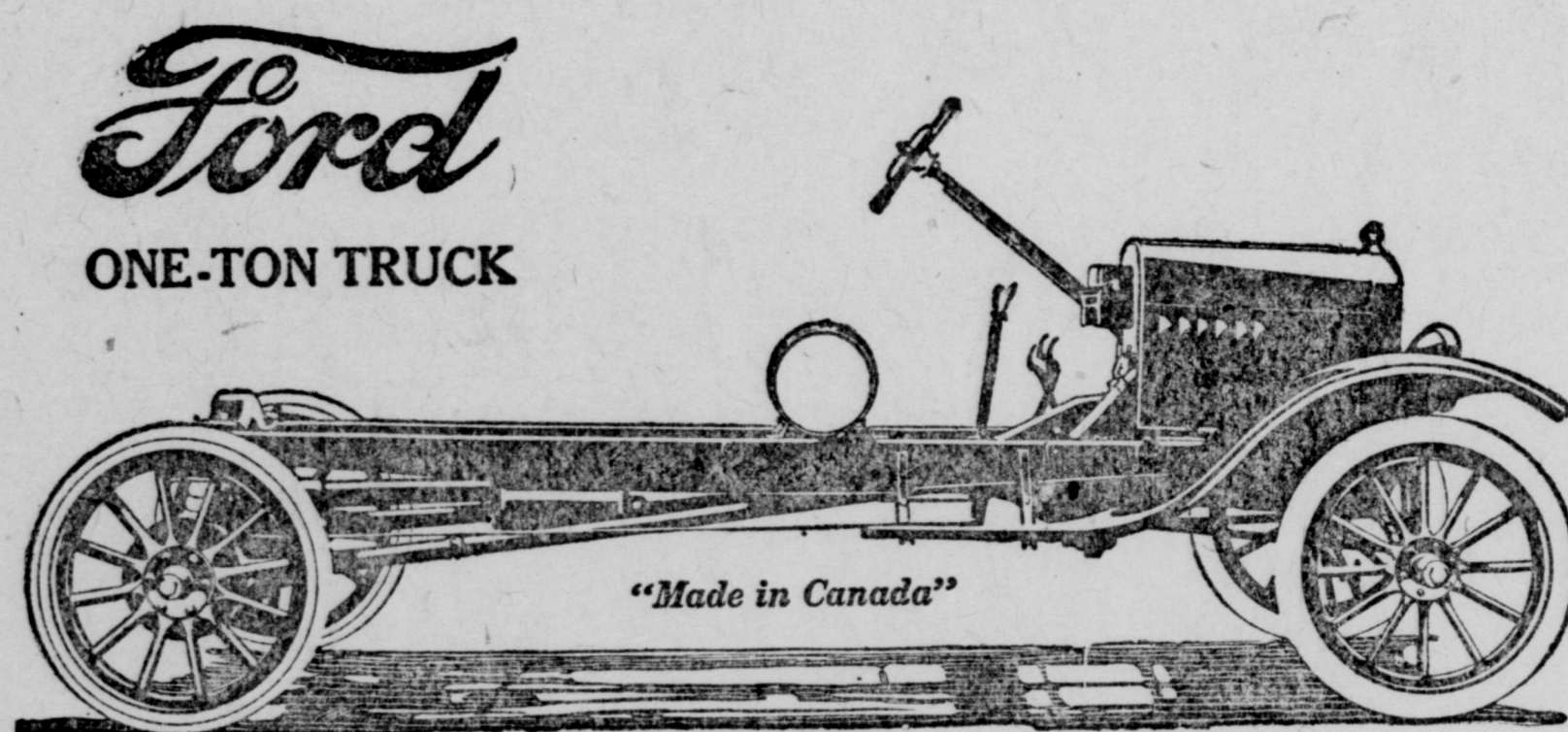

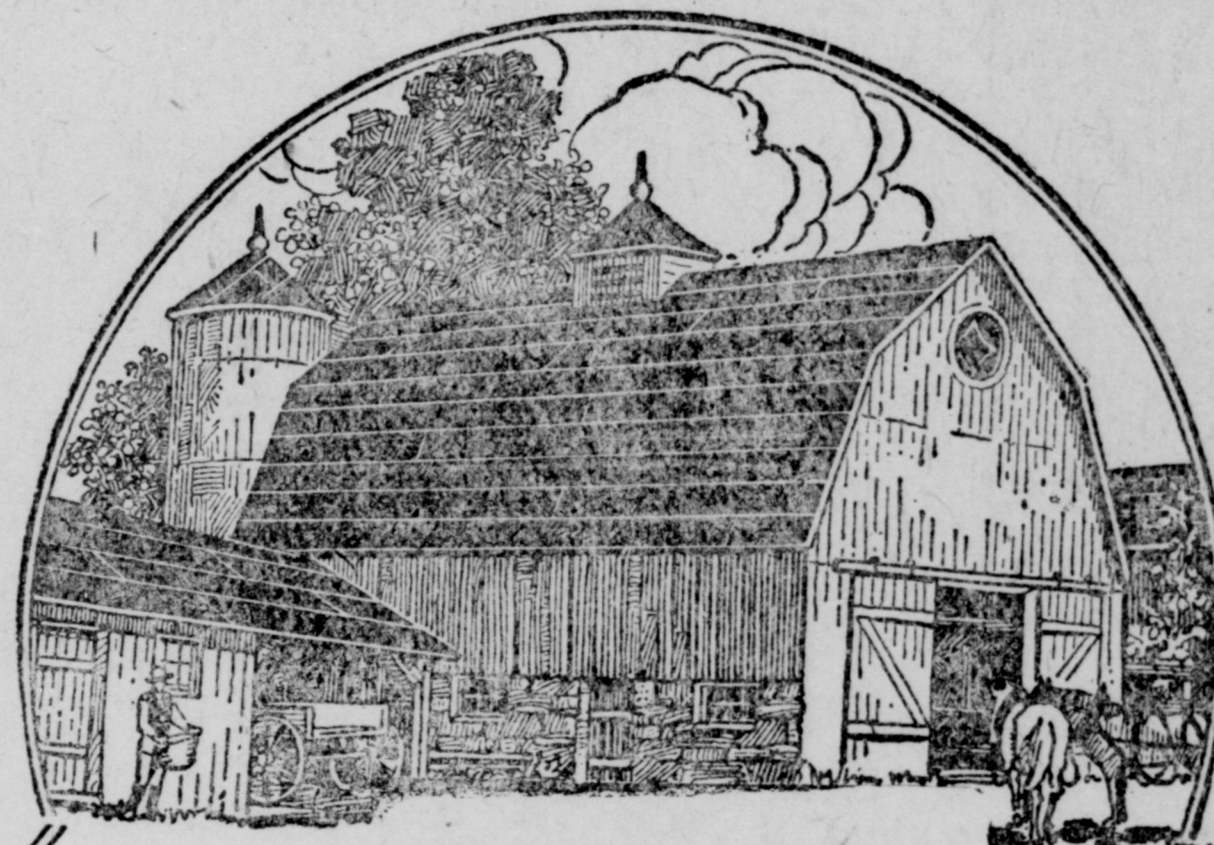
