WOMEN AND THE BALLOT

The fact that women do not turn out en masse to vote where they have the right of suffrage, is being used as an argument to show that they are not ready for the ballot or are not sufficiently interested in political affairs to warrant the right of suffrage being given them. But the argument falls flat when it is reckoned that in many instances the percentage of the male population of voting age, who present themselves at the polls is even smaller than that of the women voters. No one would think of intimating that the men who fail in their duty at the polls should be denied the privilege.

The question of woman suffrage is not the women ready for it. It is a question of fairness which should be shown the women of the country. If they wish to avail themselves of the privilege well and good if they do not, they will be showing no less interest than the thousands of men who fail to present themselves at the polls.

The argument that a woman's place is in the home is well taken. No one can deny that is her proper sphere, but alas, too often circumstances force her to leave that environment and earn her livelihood. No one has claimed it makes her less a woman to work and combat the conditions as she finds them. If she can better those conditions, by studying the reasons for the existing affairs and casting her vote for the betterment of conditions, she will not necessarily become unwomanly or neglectful of home duties by going to the polls and casting her vote.

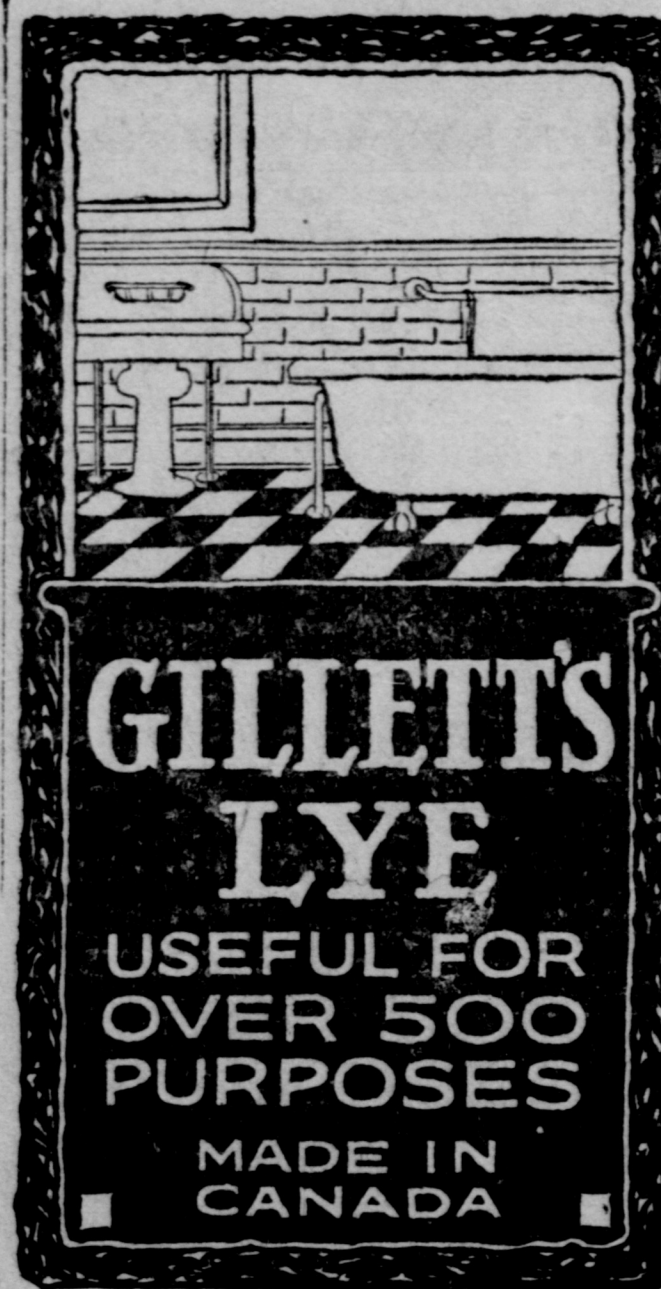

JOSEPH GRENIER HAS SENTENCE COMMUTED

Joseph Grenier, sentenced to death for murder, has had his sentence commuted to life imprisonment. Grenier was tried at the September sittings of the Circuit Court at Andover before Chief Justice McKeown, for the murder of Felix Francoeur, just outside the limits of Grand Falls, on September 11 last. He was found guilty, with a strong recommendation from the jury for clemency, and was sentenced to be hanged on December 16. Recently an application was made by his counsel, J. M. Keefe, to the Governor-General-in-Council to have the death sentence commuted, and this has been done.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, N. B. THE COLLECTION OF VITAL STATISTICS.

The public will please note that that part of the Public Health Act and its amendments providing for the reporting of Births, Marriages and Deaths as they occur in the province of New Brunswick, will go into effect on the first day of January, 1920.

The scheme for the collection of such information is, briefly, as follows:

In each parish and in each incorporated city and town there will be appointed an officer by the Sub-district Board of Health concerned, known as the sub-deputy registrar, to whom all reports of births, marriages and deaths occurring in the parish, city or town for which he is appointed, will be sent.

All Clergymen, physicians, nurses, parents or house-holders as the case may be, having primary or official knowledge of such occurrences shall send to said deputy registrar reports of such birth marriage or death upon forms furnished by the Department of Health to such persons, through the sub-deputy registrars.

Posters, in prominent type, will be put up throughout the province, notifying the date of the inception of this service, together with the name and address of the sub-deputy registrar of the parish, town or city in which any such poster appears.
