Miss Lillian Larlee is spending a few days with friends in town.

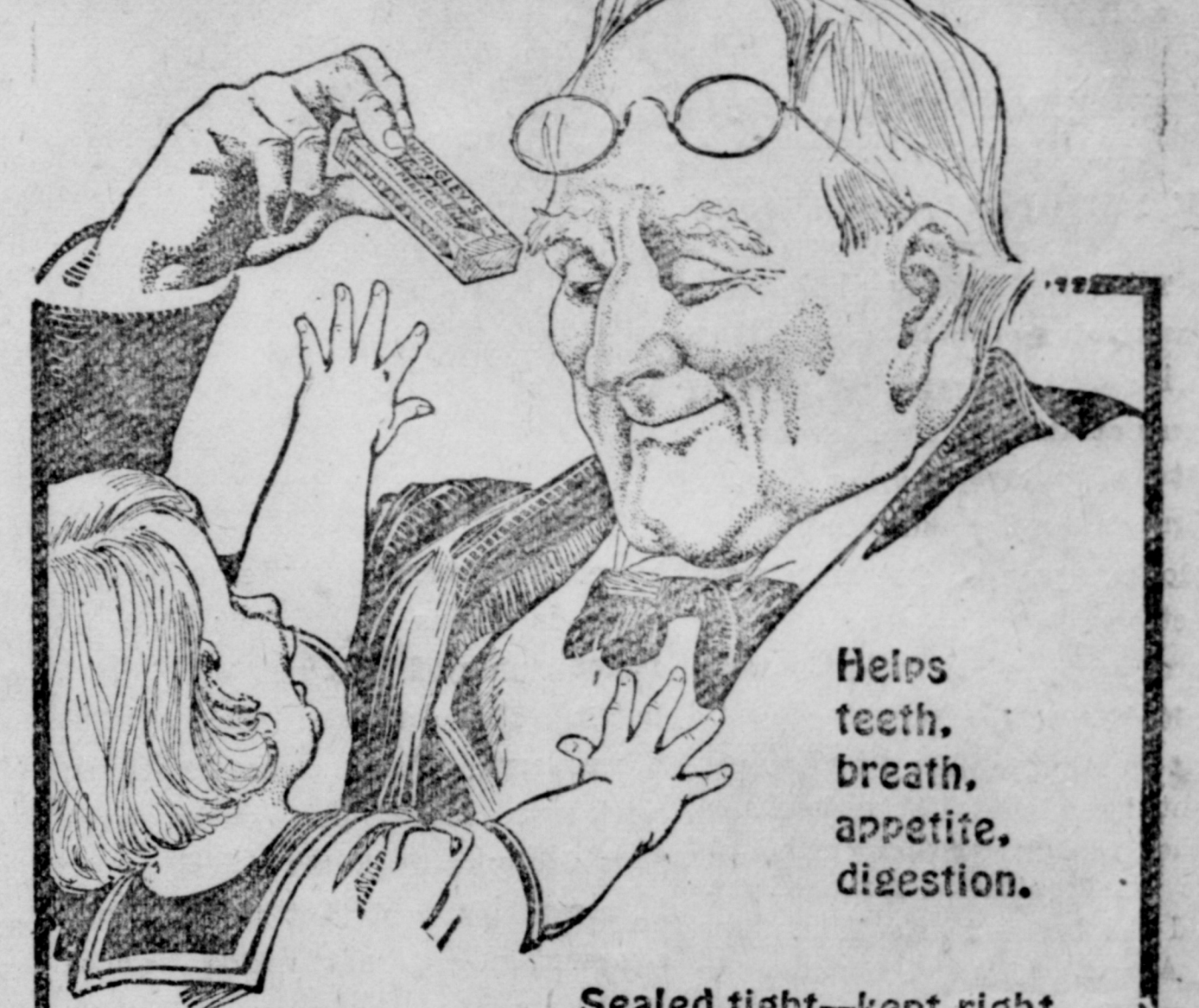
