THE PROHIBITION QUESTION.

The Toronto Saturday night thinks that most of the public men in Canada wish that the prohibition question was at the bottom of the sea. At Ottawa, it says, they are looking for signs in the sky and tremble when they look back over Ontario's recent by-elections.

Referring to conditions in the west, Saturday Night has this to say:

"Out in Alberta the Stewart government has, in utter desperation, abolished the commission created to enforce the Prohibition Act, and has 'passed the buck' to the Hon. John Boyle, Attorney General. In turn the Attorney General also takes a pessimistic view of the situation. For instance, in a speech on the floor of the Legislature the other day he remarked that out of the 12,000 estimated male adults of the province 60,000 of them were guilty of some infringement of the Liquor Act during 1918. That the violation of the Liquor Act in British Columbia is the chief form of popular amusement in that province is too well known to require further comment, other than to remark that it is estimated by British Columbians of unquestioned standing that fully eighty-five per cent of the male adults in that neck of the woods have in some form or other broken the Prohibition enactments."

In New Brunswick the prohibition law was placed on the statute book by the late government, the members of which no doubt thought that it would be the means of covering up their many administrative sins. The duty of enforcing the law fell to the lot of the present administration, it will be generally conceded that they have made a pretty fair job of it. As announced by Premier Foster a few days ago the people will be given an opportunity to pass on the act at a referendum after the soldiers return from overseas.—Mail.

OBITUARY

FRANCIS CRABBE.

Francis Crabbe, the well known C. P. R. engineer, died at 4 o'clock on Saturday morning, after ten days' illness from grippe and heart disease. He is survived by the widow and 3 children. His one year old child died on Wednesday.

Deceased was a perfect specimen of manhood, standing over six feet high weighing 240 pounds, and was one of the strongest men in town. A clean living man and general favorite, his sudden death shows the uncertainty of life.

A special train left Woodstock at one o'clock on Sunday afternoon, containing the body, hundreds of railway men and citizens in general, for Debec, where was witnessed one of the largest funerals ever held there. After services by Rev. C. J. McLaughlin in the church where he was baptised as an infant 35 years ago, the burial took place in the Catholic cemetery adjoining, and thus passeth one of the most popular of the railway boys.

CAPT. ROBERT KIRKPATRICK.

At Grand Falls, Capt. Robert Kirkpatrick, for many years a customs officer at Debec, died on Wednesday after a week's illness. He is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Catherine Henderson, sister of the late Rev. Chas. Henderson, of Andover, and six sons, Dr. Ernest, of Creelman, Sask.; Clifford, in the employ of the G. T. P. in Alberta; Major J. G. Kirkpatrick, who went overseas in Major Hanington's Forestry unit, and is now on staff duty in England; Archibald, manager of the Bank of Montreal in Halleybury, Ont.; Dr. Clarence and Elder, agent for the C. P. R., Grand Falls.

FRED H. LINDOW.

Mr. Fred H. Lindow, one of the oldest employees on this division of the C. P. R., died Sunday, 9th, inst., at Presque Isle, after a brief illness of Bright's disease. Until stricken about a fortnight ago, Mr. Lindow had appeared to be in vigorous health, and during his long service on the railroad previous to this attack had been on duty without any interruption from sickness.

The deceased was born in Woodstock, Jan. 1, 1860, the son of John and Jane Lindow. When less than 19 years of age he entered the employment of the New Brunswick R. R. Co. first in connection with the work of transferring freight from the narrow to the broad gauge section of the line. He was afterward engaged in the train service of the C. P. R., which succeeded the New Brunswick Railroad, in which he was employed at the time of his death.

During all the long period of his service on the railroad, he was one of the most faithful and trusted of its employees, and popular both with the public and his fellow workers. Personally, Mr. Lindow was of quiet tastes and habits, and was a man who won the esteem of all who
