REGULAR MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Report of Town Manager - Sharp
Increase of Theatre License--
Permanent Streets--Auditor's
Report.

The town Council were in regular session Monday evening with Mayor Nodden presiding. Couns. Gallagher and True were not present. The town manager read his monthly report and during the course of his remarks referred to the necessity considering a program of permanent streets. The increasing automobile traffic had a serious effect and it would be a matter of economy to make the work of a permanent nature.

Referring to the collection of taxes he felt the situation would be quite favorable if the question of the assessments of the banks could be settled. They had appealed from the assessment and for several causes no decision had been arrived at. The amount was some \$3300, and it was now doubtful if a settlement would be made in time to be included in this year's financial statement. The case of fireman Niles, who was badly injured last winter, was left with the fire committee. The license committee will settle the matter of a license of an optical expert with A. B. Atherton.

In reply to Coun. Brown it was stated that F. G. Spencer paid a license of fifteen dollars a month for operating the Vogue theatre. Coun. Brown said that rental for this theatre was \$100 a day, and in view of this fact and the statement made as to the daily receipts he felt the license should be increased to \$50 a month. Formerly the town received a license from the travelling shows, but this revenue had been cut off, also the license received from another theatre.

Coun. Augherton moved, seconded by Coun. Brown, that the license of the Vogue theatre be made \$50 a month, beginning Dec. 1st, 1920--carried unanimously.

Herewith Report from your Town Manager for the month of October.

STREETS.

Victoria Street has been ditched, so as to give good drainage, and lightly recrowned and surfaced with gravel.

Boyne Street has been ditched and surface recrowned.

Elm Street, at intersection of Elm and Grover, has been regraded.

Grover and St. John Streets have been ditched.

Broadway, from Houlton Road to Park Street, has had holes in surface repatched with gravel.

Main Street, from Park Street to Prince William Street, has had holes in surface repatched with gravel.

Wooden culvert on South side of Houlton Road, at Union Street, has been 50 per cent renewed.

Before the construction season closes, we hope to be able to carry out repairs to Maple and Richmond Streets, and to resurface with gravel the upper portion of Main Street.

The increasing auto traffic, with the consequent increased wear to roads, will make it very soon necessary to consider a more permanent road construction program than has been carried out in the past.

RUM RUNNERS AND LAW OFFICERS IN THRILL- ING RACE

Shots Fired as Revenue Officers Speeding at Fifty Miles an Hour Overtake and Capture Heavily Laden Motor Truck.

A thrilling race in the stillness of the night, in which runners of a cargo of liquor obtained somewhere in New Brunswick and four husky custodians of the law were the principals, was staged late Thursday night on a highway near Mars Hill, a little Aroostook town situated close to the intersection of Victoria and Carleton counties. Ambitious film men missed an excellent opportunity to tuck away some splendid material for the movies, for in addition to the contest of speed, shots were fired, and there were other accessories which would have delighted the screen artists.

The race began soon after Messrs. Whitten and McPheters, United States revenue officers, and Deputy Sheriffs Graves and Barrett, of Aroostook county sighted a suspicious motor car of large size and heavily laden proceeding at a rapid rate of speed from the direction of Upper Kent, Carleton county, towards Mars Hill. The officers were in a speedy motor car of their own, and when the strange car came within hailing distance the federal officers ordered the driver of the other car to stop. The driver paid no attention to the order, but speeded up still more and in an instant a furious race was on. The official car gradually gained on the fugitives and after several miles had been traversed at the rate of fifty miles an hour the car from this province reduced speed. A shot apparently punctured a tire, for the driver realizing that he was losing the race pulled up at the side of the road, the several occupants abandoning it and disappearing among the shrubbery in the darkness. The officers found it useless to search for them. They seized the automobile and its cargo of liquor valued at one thousand dollars. The liquor consisted of two hundred quarts of Canadian rye whiskey. The number on the car was that of a resident of Old Town (Me.)

INTERNATIONAL RACE GOES TO ESPERANTO

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 1--Taking the lead after Captain Himmenlan, master of the Lunenburg schooner Delawana, had shown him the way, for twenty-five miles of the forty-mile course, Captain Marty Welch, blue nose skipper of the Gloucester schooner Esperanto, yesterday won his second and final race of the 1920 International series off Halifax harbor. The mackerel seiner will sail home with the trophy emblematic of the championship of the North Atlantic fishing fleets and the big end of the prize money--\$4,000 to be exact. Along, also, goes another cup donated by Gloucester to the winner. Delawana, the salt fishing down-homer, gets \$1,000, for second place and the credit for having very ably defended Canada's honor and put up a wonderful race against as fleet a fishing craft as has sailed in these parts for many a day.

ANOTHER ROBBERY

Sixteen hens were stolen from Fred Atherton, Connell street, Tuesday night. For unlimited nerve this theft is in a class by itself, as the hens were all killed and partly picked in the coop from which they were taken. Twice before Mr. Atherton has been visited by hen thieves and his total loss is now twenty eight. He has a few left which no doubt will be taken in due time unless he can arrange for protection at his own expense.
