SWEEPING VICTORY GAINED BY THE REPUBLICAN FORCES

Democrats Defeated for Presidency, Vice-Presidency and Congress.

New York, Nov. 3.—One of the most sweeping Republican victories in party history today stood recorded for Senator Warren G. Harding for President and a Republican Congress.

Tremendous and unparalleled Republican pluralities, beginning with the first count of ballots in yesterday's election, continued mounting today. Defeat in their fight both for the Presidency and Congress was conceded early by Democratic National leaders on the basis of the crushing Republican vote and despite the absence, even early today, of final and official figures.

Property Destroyed

To The Sentinel:
For wanton destruction of property and other depredations the acts of the young boys of the town on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings, eclipsed all previous occasions, when it is looked upon as a fitting observance of Hallow'een. In addition to the destruction of property, robbery of cellars was indulged in and many dollars' worth of fruit and preserves stolen. Now, the question is will the town officials allow this to pass without finding out who the guilty parties are? It seems to be assumed by the police that a complaint must be laid before they can act. This is a very strange conception of their duties. The property of the citizens must be protected, and paid officers of the law should see to it that no citizen suffers at the hands of a gang of irresponsible boys, whose parents are evidently indifferent as to their welfare. It is quite true that the police could not be in several places at the same time, but now that the damage has been done it is up to the law officers to take drastic steps that will result in apprehending the culprits who so maliciously damaged the property of many citizens on the nights mentioned. WOODSTOCK TO HEAR GREAT TENOR.

One of America's Greatest Singers will Appear at the Vogue Theatre, Tuesday, Evening Nov. 30th, Other Attractions to Follow.

After considerable negotiation the Vogue Management is in a position to announce one of the most attractive musical events, if not the very best, ever offered in Woodstock. F. G. 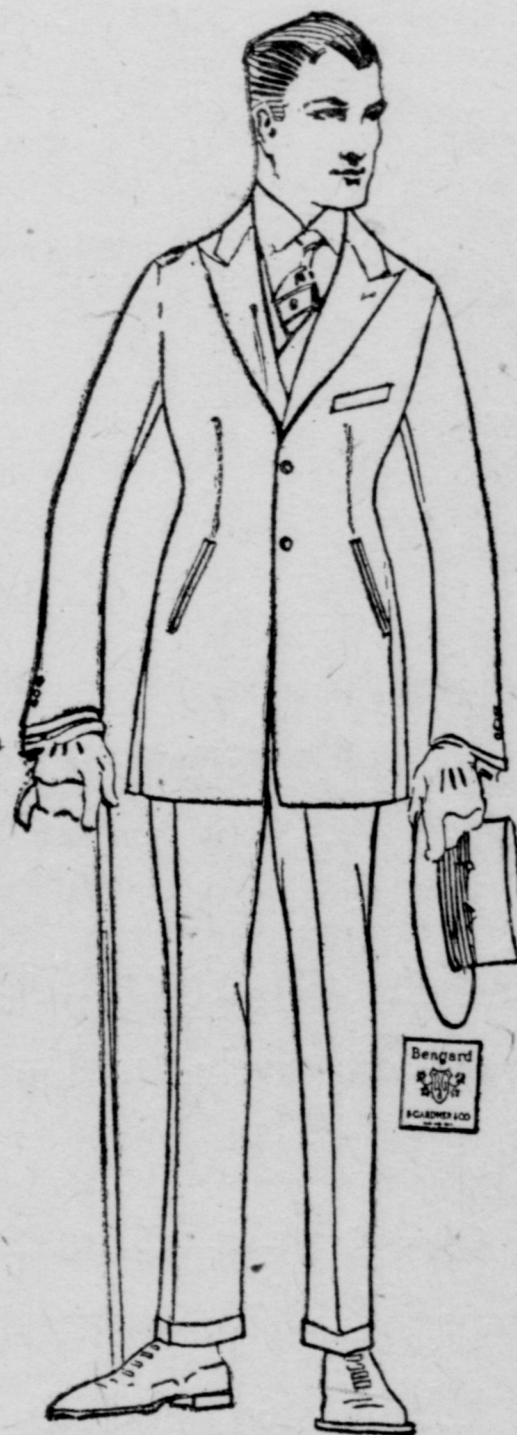
