

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon has received information that three Indians were caught near Debec. Carleton County, Monday, in the act of slaughtering deer and moose. His Honor has been pleased to refer to the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to the province during the year just passed. We in this province, irrespective of race and creed, are considered loyal to the British Crown and constitution. It was only natural, therefore, that we should tender to the Prince a sincerely loyal reception, for did he not represent that spirit of freedom and democracy that has characterized the British attitude towards this confederation for the of the principal battlefields engraved past half century.
