FROZEN WATER PIPES

Many winter fires are caused by ill-advised attempts to thaw frozen water pipes.

A burning match, torch, or open flame of any description should never be employed for this purpose. To wrap the pipes with oil-soaked rags and set them on fire is worse than folly; it is incendiarism.

Pipes are almost invariably adjacent to walls or partitions where there is an ascending current of air to feed and spread a flame. Even if the flames do not start a fire its sudden local heat may cause the pipe to break and flood the premises with water.

Wrap the frozen section of the pipe with cotton cloth and pour hot water upon it (even if the hot water must be obtained from a neighbor) until the ice in the pipe gives way. Rags on the floor at the base of the pipe will absorb the waste water. If the freezing is too severe to yield to this treatment send for a plumber.

Reputable plumbers always avoid running water pipes along outside walls where it is possible to do so. Property owners when building should look out for this. It may save them money and vexation.

MEMORIAL TO INSPECTOR MEAGHER

At the meeting of the Teachers' Institute in Woodstock, on Dec. 18, 1919, the members of the institute in a resolution expressed their deepest regrets at the death of their late Inspector, Mr. F. B. Meagher. They further proposed the erection of a suitable memorial to Mr. Meagher, such memorial to be erected by the teachers of the counties of Victoria and Carleton at the minimum rate of twenty-five cents each to be forwarded to anyone of the following committee:—Miss Bessie Fraser, Grand Falls, Miss Frances Milmore, Woodstock, or C. D. Dickson, Hartland.

No definite arrangement was made as to the place for the memorial but everyone seemed in favor of the Fisher Memorial School, Woodstock, where most teachers could see it.

Any teacher who was personally acquainted with Mr. Meagher and noted how energetically he performed his duties as inspector and how ever ready and willing he was to aid any teacher in trouble, will readily approve of such a memorial and should forward his or her share to one of the committee at an early date.

WOODSTOCK RACES JULY 12--SEPT 20

The Maritime and Maine Short Ship Circuit Thursday at the Barker House, Fredericton, arranged the schedule for the circuit during 1920. The meeting was largely attended, the majority of the tracks which will form the circuit being represented. There was enthusiasm shown and everything pointed to the horse racing season being the most successful ever experienced in the Maritime provinces and Eastern Maine.

The circuit will open at Houlton, Me., in the week of July 5th and will close at Moncton the week ending September. July 1st is left open for any track to run an independent meet.

THE SCHEDULE.

The meetings at the various tracks forming the circuit will be in the weeks opening on the dates given as follows: Houlton, Me., July 5; Woodstock, July 12; St. Stephen, July 19; Fredericton, July 26; Chatham August 2; Moncton, August 9; Springhill, N. S., August 16; Sussex, August 23; Fredericton, August 30; Chatham, September 6; St. Stephen, September 13; Woodstock, September 20; Moncton, September 27.

INDIVIDUAL PROGRAMS.

The different tracks will arrange their own programs and select their dates. It is believed that the schedule has been arranged so as to best suit the interests of the horseman and the public. Each track will also make its arrangements concerning the time to be allowed trotters.

THE PURSES.

The meeting considered the matter of purses and decided that each track must put up \$400 for classes and \$500 for free-for-all.

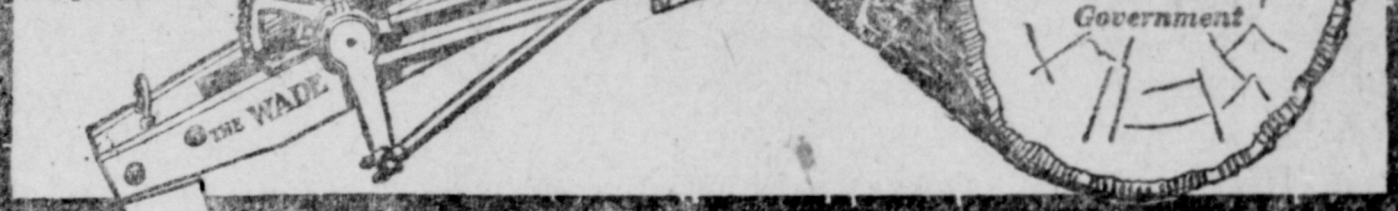
