### COUNTY COUNCIL

Coun. Morgan—There is no rivalry between Woodstock and Hartland, we are willing to co-operate with Woodstock...Hartland intends to erect a Memorial Hall and we will not erect a monument.

Coun. Carvell—I am glad to hear Coun. Morgan say that there is no rivalry between Hartland and Woodstock, but I heard him say in committee a short time ago that Hartland was the Hub of the county.

Coun. Keith—I don't like to hear Coun. Stevens hinting that we do not wish to commemorate the deeds of the lads who fell in the war. If the Council decided to build a monument at Hartland I would vote against it. My mind at first was favorable to building an annex to the hospital, and thus commemorate the dead soldiers. In my district I have not heard a man say he is in favor of a monument. Coun. Stevens hinted that it was not patriotic to vote against the monument. I am just as patriotic as any man in the room, but I am not in favor of a pile of stone. In Nova Scotia they are erecting three Memorial Hospitals. The War Veterans in some places are erecting memorial halls, in Hartland they will do so, and the town is giving them land on the town lot. I do not feel ashamed to oppose this question.

Coun. Tracey—I am in favor of a monument on the county lot. Last June I opposed it because the money had not been appropriated. While in England on a visit Coun. Clark and myself lived near Buckingham Palace, near which was a monument and gardens to commemorate the soldiers who fell in the South African war. The people passing would stop and view the monument and gardens doubtless many of them having relatives who had fallen.

Coun. Perry—I was always in favor of a monument. Wicklow joined with Kent and we erected a drinking fountain on the banks of the Monquart for the 25 boys who fell in these parishes. Two men pledged \$100 each to the fountain. I have no fault to find with Hartland or Brighton. They are welcome to their own opinion, but deep in my heart I am a strong supporter of the monument for all the boys who fell.

Coun. Shaw—On personal grounds I would like to support the monument, but more of the people in my district want to go in with Hartland for a memorial hall.

Coun. Watson—We were criticized last year by the local newspapers or voting to postpone the question. Now is the time to decide. There should be a monument here to include the names of all the soldiers who fell from this county. The gave their lives for us. The least we can do is to erect a monument to their memory. Memorial halls are all right if they don't burn down. Parents will be pleased to have the names of their fallen boys on the monument here. The parents sacrificed much when they lost their boys. Let us honor the boys by erecting the monument.

Coun. Bull—I am in favor of the monument on the county property in the town of Woodstock. A memorial hall may burn—the monument will always be here. I have a boy over there who will never come home. The motion to build was then carried, the town of Hartland and parishes of Brighton, Aberdeen and Simonds voting no.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Moved by Coun. Stevens and Carvell that a committee be appointed to arrange with Mr. Tarbox for the contract for the soldiers' monument. Carried.

The Warden appointed Couns. Anderson, Tompkins and Gallagher, who later reported as follows, after Coun. Anderson remarked that it had a letter before it that Mr. Tarbox wrote Mr. Stevens, in which he said the price would be \$5500, owing to increase in wages, the price had gone up to \$5900. We made a contract at \$5700. The names of soldiers must be in by the 20th of February.

Dr. Wade was heard before the board. He thanked them for inviting him to address them and complimented them on such handsome buildings, the size, equipment and arrangements of the county buildings were the best in the province. He explained the new Health Act with Hon. Dr. Roberts in charge, and the duties of the different officials. Dr. Wade had six counties and the city of Fredericton to look after and last year travelled 10,000 miles.

Mr. T. C. L. Ketchum, secretary of the board, gave a full explanation of the local work of the Board of Health.

Coun. Flemming—What action is taken on those counties which turn the Act down?

Dr. Wade—The government has power to make the assessment and collect the same, and it will no doubt exercise that power.

Coun. Flemming—Any penalty against the inspector who fails to do his duty.

Dr. Wade—He is dismissed.

Coun. Carvell—Dr. Field is in our parish. There has never been a school inspected in our parish, unless it might be in Centerville.

Coun. Keith—Under the old system, costing the county \$300 or \$400 a year, we had better service than we had last year under the new system. Of course when the work is done, the inspection of schools and the vital statistics record will be a good thing.

On motion of Couns. Morgan and Perry, the Hospital trustees were heard before the board.

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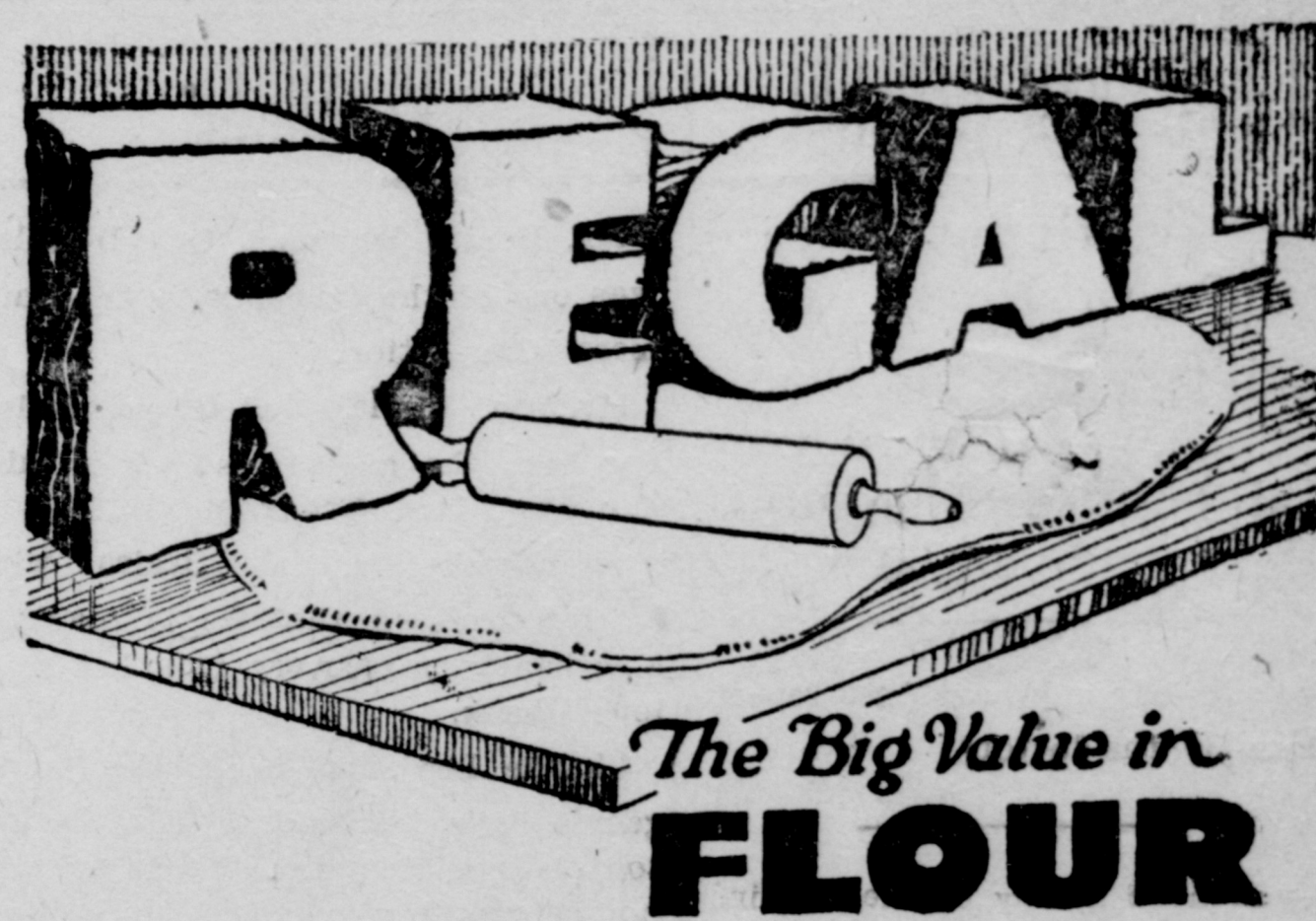
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
