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THE LOCAL CAMPAIGN

The local political campaign seems to be progressing quietly, without fireworks on either side, but with more or less intensive efforts along some lines. Quite unlike former days, in Carleton county, while there is interest manifest on the success of the government it is a kindly instead of a hostile interest, as it is generally agreed that the candidates of all parties are worthy and deserving.

There seems to be confidence in each camp that victory will be attained if the vote is only gotten out.

Why not have a record breaking vote at this time? Surely three of the candidates must be acceptable to practically every voter in the community. There is no reason why any man or woman should stay away unless it be a physical one.

The number of voters in the town of Woodstock has been greatly increased by the addition of women's names to the lists, and surely the women should be as much interested in the success of the government candidates as the men, now that the opportunity has been given them to express themselves in an effective manner. It would be a crying shame if the metropolis of the county should be unrepresented in the local legislature. If the women are serious in their demand for the ballot they can demonstrate it in no way so effectively as by taking a maximum interest in this election and voting for a return of the government that gave them the franchise. Let the whole town vote be polled. It is necessary and those who are equipped with facts must realize the situation.

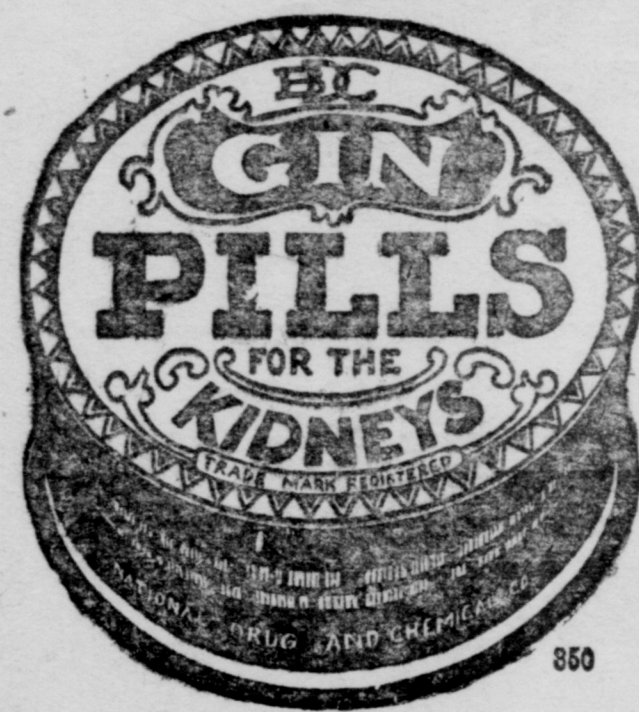

It is the construction element in the Foster program that appeals to the independent voter.

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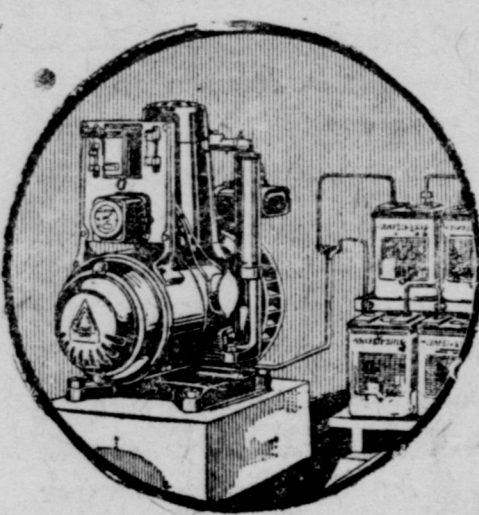
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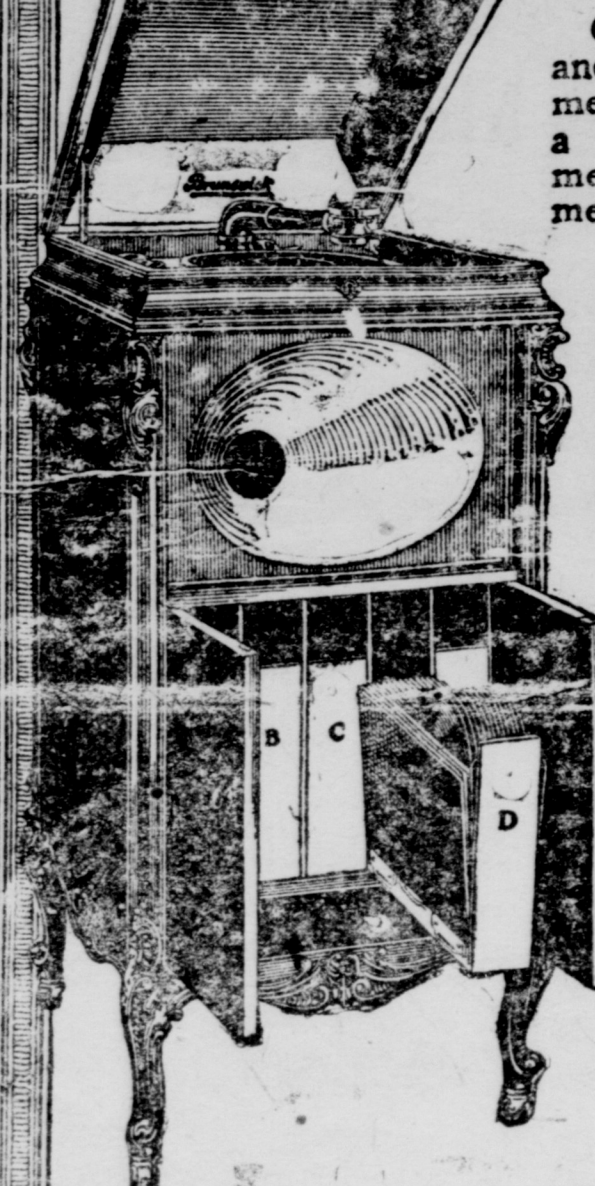
