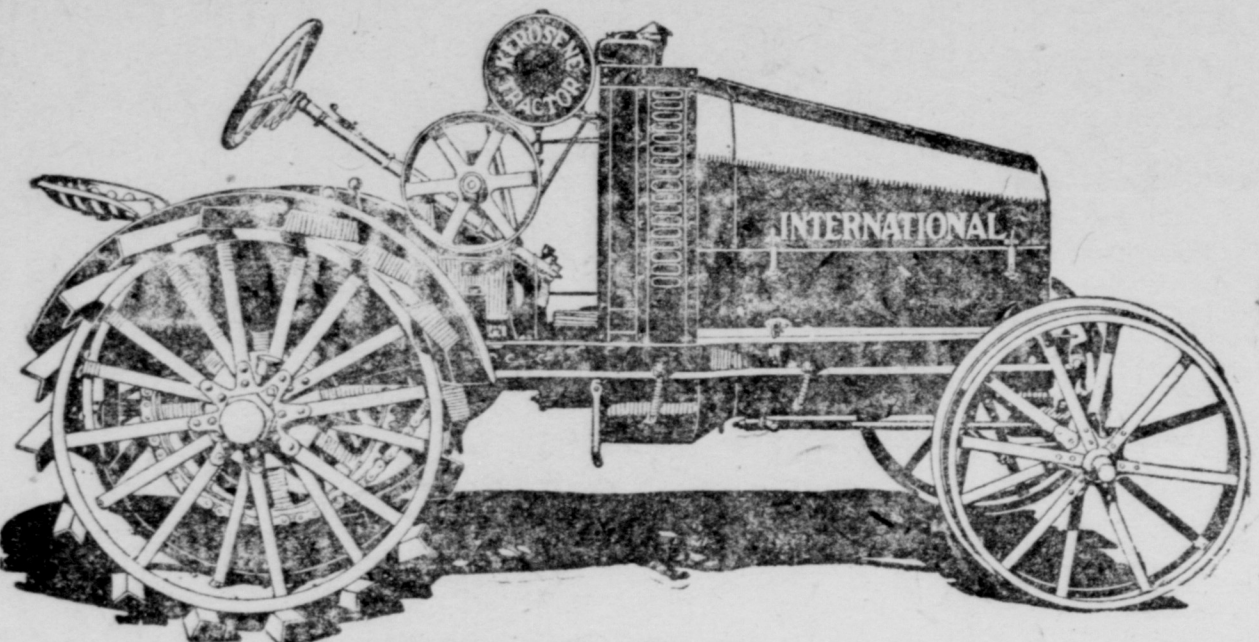

OBITUARY

Though the death of John Wallace has been expected for a number of days past by many townspeople who knew that he was critically ill, still the announcement of his death Tuesday morning created universal expressions of sorrow and regret. It removed from the community a man who was among those interested in the development of the town and a citizen keenly interested in its activities. It also takes away a citizen who for years has been prominent in legitimate sporting events, and who was deeply interested in driving horses, being the owner of several noted racers during his lifetime. Up to the very last he maintained his interest in the new exhibition movement and was very proud of the success attained during the past two seasons.

Mr. Wallace was born in Fredericton, coming to Woodstock very early in life. He learned the trade of a printer at which he worked during his long life, and was very skillful in his occupation. For fifty years he was on the Sentinel staff, being foreman the greater part of the time. He is survived by his wife, who was Miss Abbie Boyer; one son, John Wallace a valued employee of the Bank of Montreal, and at present manager of the bank at Temiskaming, Que. One daughter, Mrs. A. Douglas Cooke, of Montreal, also survives.

The funeral was held Wednesday from his late residence on Chapel Street. Services were conducted by Rev. M. E. Connon. The pall bearers were: Wellington Belyea, Howard Burr, Herbert Hillyard, Fred Webber.

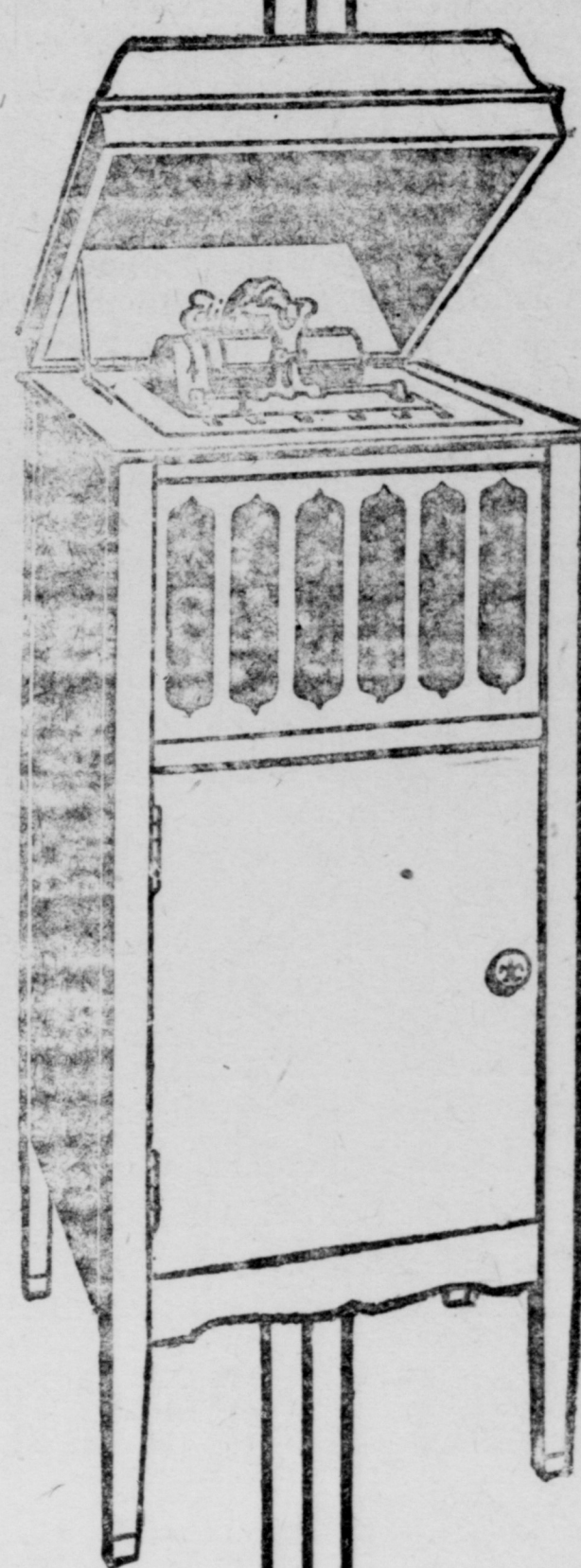
