ENGLAND HONORS WAR HEROES BY ACCORDING FIELD MARSHALL'S FUNERAL TO UNKNOWN BRITISH WARRIOR

TRIBUTE TO POILU IN PARIS

HERO DEAD OF WAR HONORED IN HEART OF THE EMPIRE

WESTMINSTER SCENE OF IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY AS UNKNOWN SOLDIER IS BURIED.

London, Nov. 11—Great Britain today impressively honored her war heroes by according a field marshal's funeral to an unknown British warrior, who was buried in Westminster Abbey, and unveiling a permanent cenotaph in Whitehall to the "glorious dead."

Aside from members of the royal family, who included Queen Mary, Queen Mother Alexandra and Queen Maud of Norway, the members of the British cabinet, and a few officials including Hon. Sir George E. Foster, Hon. C. J. Doherty and Hon. N. W. Rowell, the only witnesses to either ceremony were persons who lost relatives in the great war.

As "Big Ben" in the tower of the parliament building began to strike the hour of 11, King George, facing the 16th century coffin of the unknown soldier, which was resting on a gun carriage, drew a cord that released a Union Jack draped above the cenotaph and after the last stroke of the hour, thousands of people, who crowded Whitehall as far as one could see in either direction, remained absolutely silent for two minutes.

This silence was broken by a choir softly beginning the hymn "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," which was followed by the Lord's Prayer, recited by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Buglers sounded "The Last Post" and, with its escort of troops and a band, the gun carriage moved toward the abbey, with King George, as chief mourner, walking behind it.

Sir George Foster deposited a wreath of maple leaves at the foot of the monument on behalf of the Dominion of Canada. The Canadian party walked in the procession to the abbey with the members of the British cabinet.

STRICKEN WOMEN HONORED. During a brief service in the nave of the abbey, the king stood at the foot of the grave, the members of the royal family ranging themselves on either side. All the whiteness that packed Whitehall or crowded the abbey, a little band of approximately 100 women in the abbey received the most reverent attention. They had been selected for the seats of honor because each had lost their husband and all her sons. Every woman in Great Britain so bereft who applied for a place got it, but less than half the other appli-

cants for seats were successful, owing to the lack of space.

After the 100 had been seated, the next to be considered were those mothers who lost their only sons, and then came women who lost their husbands only. They were given positions in accordance with the price they had paid during the war.

PERHAPS HIS DADDY. A girl who wrote that she had lost nine brothers killed or missing, was given a ticket, as also was a twelve-year old boy who wrote: "The man in the coffin might be my daddy." In all, eight thousand tickets were issued.

The body of the unknown soldier was brought here last night, after it had been honored by Marshal Foch and other military officials in France from the time it was exhumed until the ceremony of French destroyers turned for home after seeing the British destroyer Verdun, which bore the body, safely into the harbor of Dover.

It was brought to London in the same railway car used to transport the bodies of Edith Cavell, the nurse who was executed by the Germans, and Captain Charles Fryatt, the British captain of a British merchant steamer who also met death before a German firing squad. It lay last night in a room especially set apart and fitted for it in Victoria station, and a guard of honor remained there until morning.

The immediate guard which escorted the body on its trip through the crowded and silent streets from the station to Whitehall was composed of 100 men of all services who won the Victoria Cross.

The pall bearers were field marshals and admirals of the fleet, including Viscount Douglas Haig, Earl Beatty, admiral of the grand fleet, and Major-General Sir Hugh Trenchard, commander of British air forces. Battalions of guards, with their bands and a few others made up the balance of the escort.

The cortege proceeded through Grosvenor Gardens, and Grosvenor Palace to Hyde Park, and thence to Buckingham Palace, Pall Mall and Whitehall. As the procession started from the station a battery in Hyde Park fired a field marshal's salute of nineteen

guns, and just as the coffin was lowered into the grave, another battery of horse guards fired the same salute.

THE PEOPLES FLAG. The grave was filled with soil brought from the grave from which the body was exhumed in France and was covered by what is known as the "patriotic flag," one of the most famous flags flying in the war. It was taken to France early in the struggle by a chaplain who asked it scores of times at funerals on the field, and it has been much coveted by many regiments to which the chaplain has loaned it for short periods.

Not in recent years has London seen such detailed police precautions. Extra strong barricades had been constructed at every approach to Whitehall and the abbey, and every man that could be spared was on duty, or was held in reserve near Whitehall. Store windows even blocks away were boarded or protected by steel shutters in order to prevent breakages by the crowd.

After the ceremonies were completed the barricades were opened and when the witnesses had passed out, all who cared to were allowed to go into Whitehall, pass the cenotaph and place wreaths on it. Long lines began to file past immediately, and it seemed the solemn march would continue for hours.

Representatives of the dominion Great War Veterans' Association placed a wreath in tribute to the unknown hero. Another wreath from the Canadian Last Post Fund bore the legend: "Let Us Forget."

IN FRANCE. Paris, Nov. 11—Official and civilian France today did honor to the memory of the nation's sons who fell during the war. Paris dedicated the day to recognition of the sacrifice made by hundreds of thousands of dead who are sleeping in cemeteries along the battle line.

Called from its grave on the field of Verdun, the body of an unidentified French soldier was carried solemnly through the streets and reburied under the Arc de Triomphe. Following the flag draped gun carriage walked President Millerand, cabinet members, and three French marshals, Joffre, the hero of the Marne; Foch, who accomplished the final defeat of Germany, and Petain, whose defence of Verdun will forever live in French song and story.

Verdun, France, Nov. 11—Neither the freezing cold November night nor the long waiting line could subdue the eagerness of the residents of this city to participate in the funeral vigil over the bodies of eight unknown soldiers of France, exhumed so that one might be chosen for burial under the Arc de Triomphe in Paris. A private soldier selected the body at random. The coffin was soon hidden from sight by masses of flowers brought by pilgrims. Children from every school of Verdun filed past the catafalque on which the coffin reposed.
