A BEAUTIFUL SYMBOL

France and England performed an act of deep significance on the second anniversary of the armistice.

In England the body of an unknown soldier was laid to rest in Westminster Abbey, where lie the illustrious dead of Britain. In France the body of an unknown soldier from the battle zone of Verdun was taken to the Pantheon in Paris.

Thus by symbol are the soldier dead of each country given their right to find their final resting place among the greatest of the dead of each nation. It was a beautiful and touching tribute, but one wholly deserved. None too highly can a country honor its defenders; none too great traditions can be built up around them. The most honored spot is none too good for the body of the unknown soldier as a last resting place. It is merely a recognition of merit and a reverent tribute to our soldier dead.

"To him who sleeps in a splendid isolation we may say:

"Common man, common soldier, mere unit in a vast aggregation of common men and common soldiers, thou art the firm foundation of all human States and Powers, the creator guardian, defender of Civilization. Little regarded and little regarding in life, at death but an entry among the Unknown Dead to our human understanding, heir of Learning, Insight, Experience and Divine Inspiration, proudly dedicates the lasting memorial of all its glory."

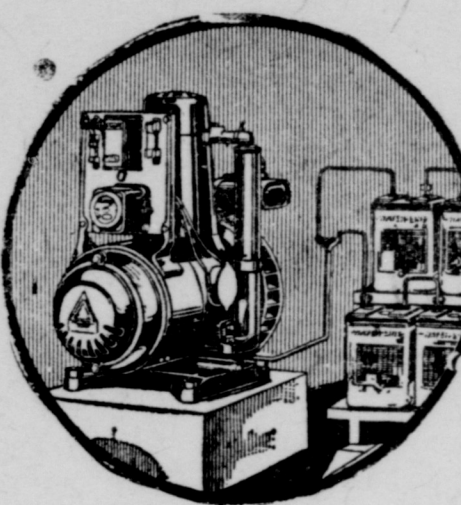

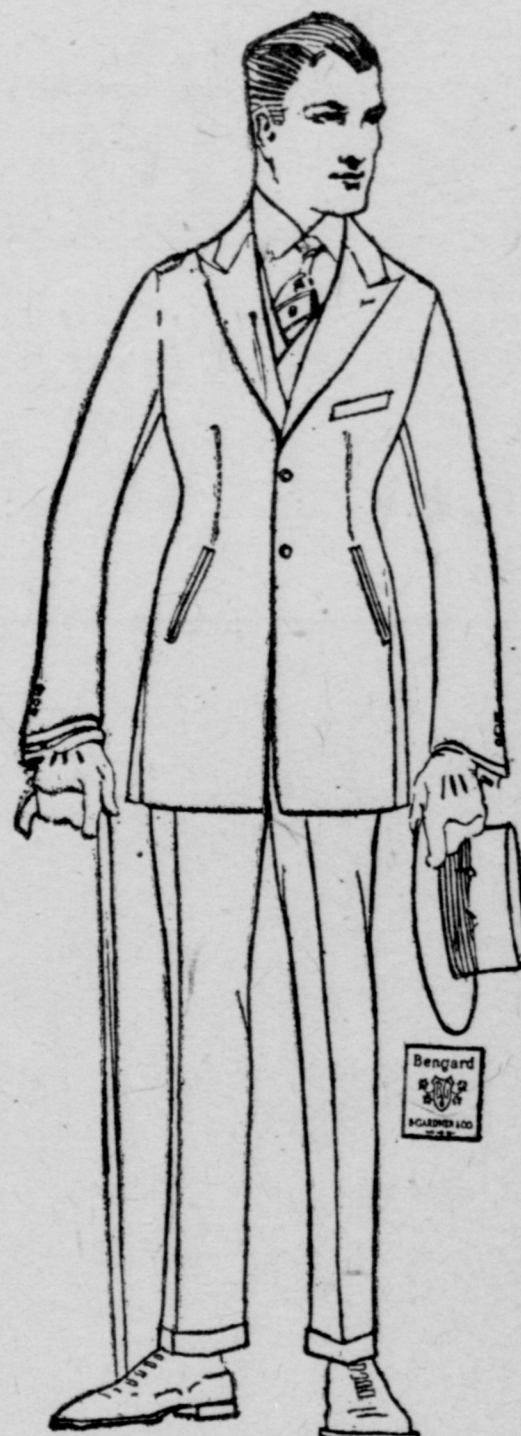
