DEDICATE MEMORIAL TO HONORED DEAD

Ceremonies Attending Dedication at Jacksonville—Four Comrades Unveil Monument.

Monday afternoon a monument erected in memory of the boys of Jacksonville was dedicated with most impressive ceremonies. Six young men who died in a war not only for our freedom but for the freedom of the world, have their names engraved on stone that will be handed down the coming generations. The erection of this handsome memorial will serve as an inspiration and example for the boys and girls who will know of this titanic conflict through the pages of history. The arrangements for the dedication were in charge of a committee headed by Rev. F. A. Fenwick. Among those attended were Hon. F. B. Carvell, Rev. Mr. Harrison, Rev. H. F. Rigby, T. C. L. Ketchum, S. L. Lynott.

EMPIRE DAY EXERCISES

Children in Pleasing Program—Miss King Wins Prize for Best Essay.

The schools held their Empire Day exercises Friday afternoon. The children of the Broadway school, accompanied by their teachers, marched to the Fisher school, where a patriotic program was carried out in the large auditorium. Marching through the streets, each pupil carrying a flag, the little folks made a very fine appearance, and their marching was greatly admired all along the route. A large number of spectators attended the exercises, mostly women.

A very entertaining program, consisting of patriotic music, recitations, flag and physical drills, was presented, with all grades taking part. While it would be hard to specialize as to the merits of the different features, it will not be out of place to mention the flag drill, led by two bright little girls, Marion Hayden and Elsie Montgomery. The marching and evolutions of the children were very clever and elicited much applause. The physical drill by grades 7 and 8, Broadway, is also deserving of special mention. Their work showed careful and painstaking training. Rev. Samuel Howard made a short and interesting address. Mrs. Harry Currie, on behalf of the L. O. D. E., in a few well chosen remarks, presented the prize awarded for the best essay to Miss Madge King, whose subject "The Flag" was pronounced the best by the judges. The exercises closed by the entire assembly singing God Save the King.

VICTORIA DAY RACES

Racing Program Attracts Big Crowd—Oro Fino a Handsome Horse—Summary of Races.

The ceremonies opened with O Canada by the choir.

Rev. Mr. Fenwick briefly stated that the object of meeting here to-day was to pay a tribute to those who have fallen from this vicinity and to formally dedicate a monument to their memory. He was pleased to see with us persons deeply interested in the Empire and who were here to assist in honoring the memory of those who have fallen. He read a letter from Col. Anderson regretting his inability to be present.

Hon. F. B. Carvell was called upon and said in part:—
"When asked by Mr. Havens to

attend this dedication I gladly

consented. There is something pathetic in this meeting at Jacksonville where I had no warmer friends than the fathers of the boys whose names appear on this monument. I recall the occasion when Harry Havens called upon me to arrange some business before going away. I felt he was one man who should not go, but he looked upon it solely as a matter of duty.

We are here to-day to pay our respects to six brave men and the thought occurred to me did it pay that 60,000 men should lay down their lives, 150,000 were wounded and some maimed for life, and two billions of dollars were spent and we are tempted to ask did it pay? I have never felt that it did not pay. Canada has taken her place among the nations of the world in a way that we never dreamed of. We are to have our own ambassador at Washington. But all this glorifying of Canada does not sooth the heartaches of those afflicted. The world is in a chaotic state but it will come back to sanity the same as before the war. The Germans are down and out and it is to be hoped that the allied nations will see that they have no time to again prepare for war. I am a firm believer in the league of nations—it is a new experiment and we should not be impatient if it does not work as fast as we think it should. I can say that I wish more of these functions would take place in Canada. No place in Canada has done more than Jacksonville. Memorial halls are all right in a material way, but I hope that in every town and hamlet monuments will be erected. It will create loyalty to country and institutions. This memorial will be an education to the boys and girls of Jacksonville and

surrounding country.

T. C. L. Ketchum expressed his undoubted admiration for this noble effort of Jacksonville. From time immemorial when something was to be commemorated it was with a great stone. Jacksonville has set an example to the whole of Canada.

Mr. Ketchum quoted from Chesterton writing of the death of a friend in battle. "No man will ever dare to say that his death in battle was in vain, not only because in its highest sense it could never be, but because in its lower sense it was not. He hated the icy insolence of Prussia and that ice is broken and as weak as water. That at least through unending ages will never insult the face of the sun anymore. None can say that the weary marching in France was a thing thrown away, not only in the sense which consecrates the footsteps of such a via crucis or highway of the army martyrs' but also in a perfectly practical sense for the army was going somewhere and it got there.

Rev. H. F. Rigby considered it a privilege to have an opportunity to pay a tribute of respect and acknowledgement to those who did so much for us. This monument is a fitting memorial to the fallen and an inspiration to the living. We pray God will rest our dead and He will inspire the living to be worthy of them.

Rev. Mr. Harrison said the boys had laid down their lives rather than come back defeated. They were animated by a spirit of "Give Me Liberty or Give Me Death."

Rev. Mr. Fenwick extended thanks on behalf of the people of Jacksonville for the help and inspiration given by the attendance, and speeches. The ceremony closed with singing God Save the

SOME THINGS ON WHICH YOU MUST PAY TAX

Where the Budget Hits the Family Man

Items of General Use and the Tax which Ottawa Government Imposes on Them—Further Details Received.

The following is a list of some articles on which the new excise taxes are to be levied as shown in a lengthy document from Ottawa:

(a) A tax of ten per cent. on:
Boots, shoes, pumps and slippers of any material (not including shoes or appliances made to order for persons having a crippled or deformed foot or ankle) in excess of \$9 a pair.
Hats, men's and boys, in excess of \$5 each.
Caps, men's and boys, in excess of \$2 each.
Hose or stockings, silk, men's and boys', in excess of \$1 a pair.
Neckties and neckwear and scarfs, men's and boys', in excess of \$1.50 each.
Clothing, consisting of coat, vest and pants, or coat and pants, men's and boys', in excess of \$45.
Cloth overcoats, men's and boys', women's and misses', in excess of \$50 each.
Waistcoats, men's, sold separately from suits, in excess of \$5 each.
Shirts, including night shirts, men's and boys', in excess of \$2 a pair.
Hats, bonnets and hoods, women's and misses', in excess of \$12 each.
Hose, or stockings, silk, women's and misses', in excess of \$2 a pair.
Kimonos, petticoats and waists in excess of \$12 each.
Nightgowns in excess of \$3 each.
House or smoking jackets or bath and lounging robes, pyjamas and underwear in excess of \$5.
Fans.
Purses and pocketbooks in excess of \$2 each.
Shopping and handbags in excess of \$6 each.
Umbrellas, parasols and sunshades in excess of \$4 each.
Trunks in excess of \$10 each.
Valises, traveling bags, suit cases, hat boxes and fitted traveling cases in excess of \$25 each.
Gloves, except fur, in excess of \$3 a pair.
Dresses, women's and misses', in excess of \$45 each.
Suits, women's and misses', in excess of \$60 each.
Opera cloaks.
Coats and robes, the component material of chief value being fur, in excess of \$100 each.
Ivory handled cutlery.
Cut glassware.
Sporting goods, such as tennis rackets, nets, racket covers and presses, skates, snowshoes, skis, toboggans, canoe paddles and cushions, polo mallets, baseball bats, gloves, masks, protectors, shoes and uniforms, football helmets, harness and goals, basketball.
