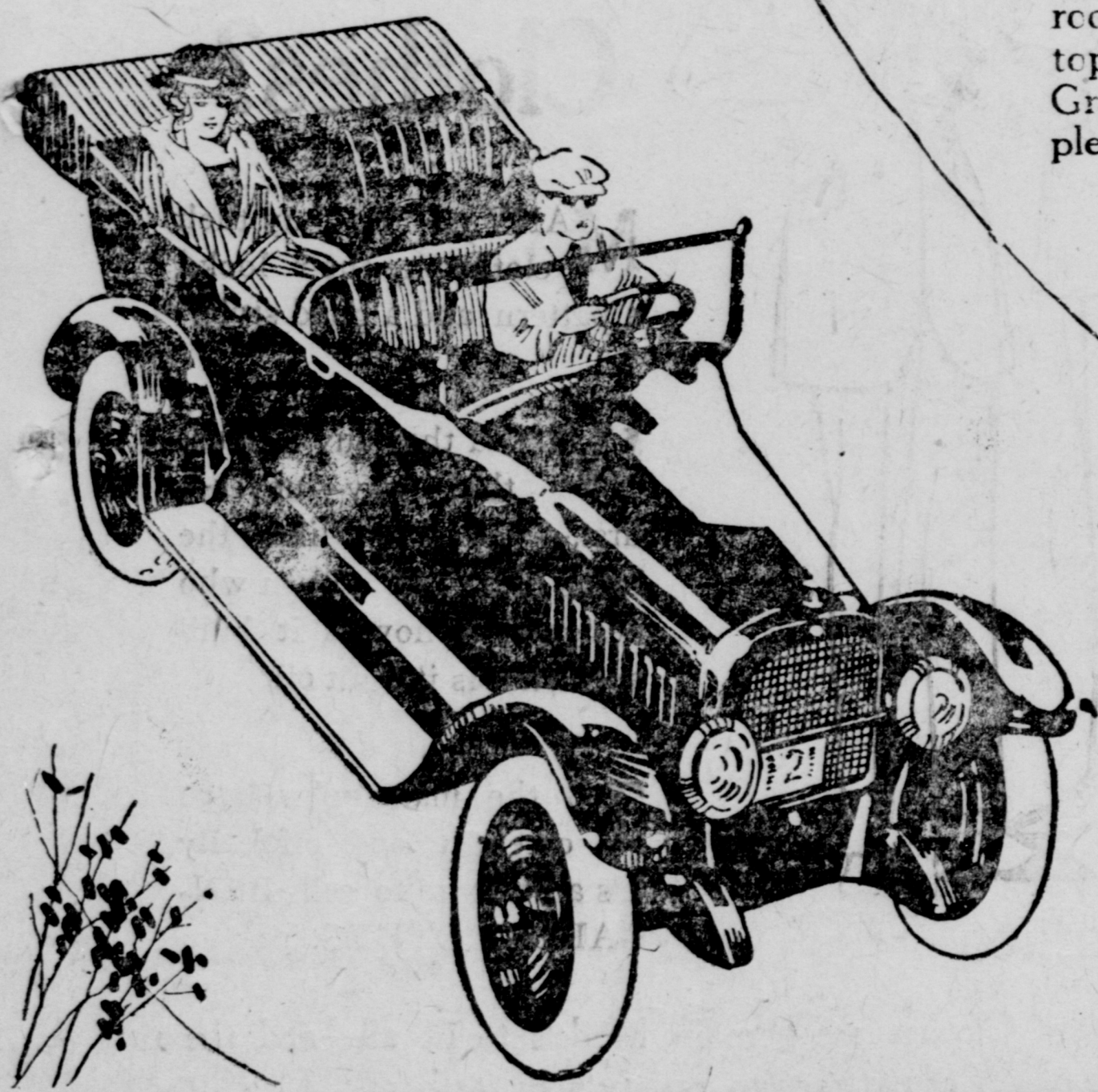

The prospects for horse racing here this summer are excellent. Horsemen have been working out their steeds on the track since May 1st, and the condition of the race course is first class.

Already 14 horses are quartered in the splendid stables at the fair grounds. These include seven out of town horses. Pope McKinnon, formerly of Bangor, will have two here to-day, Dusty Dan, pacer, 2:09 and Bertin trotter, 2:18. Bud Tingley of Houlton, is bringing The Problem 2:04 on a mile track; Bud will likely have several more on his string. It is also reported that Bill Sharon 2:16, the fast colt trotter, will train here. This horse is now owned by Archie Alcorn of Blackville, Northumberland county.

The Hartland Driving Club has purchased a green trotter Colorado Rose by Colorado E. This mare will probably train here.

Vocational School Notes

The authorities of the Carleton County Vocational School, Woodstock, are justly satisfied with results attained during the first year of operation of this institute. But what of next year? There are two conditions which must prevail if this system of education is to be successfully established. First, the community must need that type of education; and in the second place, they must want that type of education. That a need for vocational education exists we feel sure is the unanimous opinion of the people of this favored section of the province. We have every reason to believe that in its establishment vocational education meets the wants of a

great majority of the ambitious youth of the county. We are sure that many want this form of education, but how can this school be of service to them if the want, the desire, is allowed to remain dormant? The foresight of the late L. P. Fisher first recognized the actual value of such a school to the community, and through his beneficence the building was erected. Later, a committee was formed to organize and operate the Vocational School. Action was manifested in both these steps which have given to us the Carleton County Vocational School. Action on the part of the young people to which this school caters is of as much importance to the future welfare and development of the institute as that action which marked

Section of "An Act to amend the acts relating to Assessment in the Town of Woodstock, 1929."

The Acts relating to the Town of Woodstock are hereby amended so that after the passing of this Act it shall be the duty of every person liable to be assessed in the Town of Woodstock within twenty days after notice published in the newspapers of said town by the Assessors thereof, requiring the same, to make and file with the said Assessors a statement under oath, in such form as the Town Council of said town, or on their failure to prescribe a form, the Assessors, thereof, may determine, of all his or her real estate situate in the said town and personal property of every nature and kind and wheresoever situate and income derived from his or her professions, trades, occupation or calling, such forms shall be furnished by the said Assessors to all persons applying for same. Should any person fail to comply with the requirement of this

section, then the Assessors shall form the best information they can obtain regarding the values of the personal property and income of such persons and to the best of their judgment assess such property and income and no appeal shall lie at the instance of such person to either the Assessors or the Town Council but the assessment shall stand as made and such persons shall be liable to pay the same without any deduction. Town Council shall be of the opinion that there exists a reasonable excuse for failure to file such statement.

The forms are procurable from the Assessors and from the Town Manager.

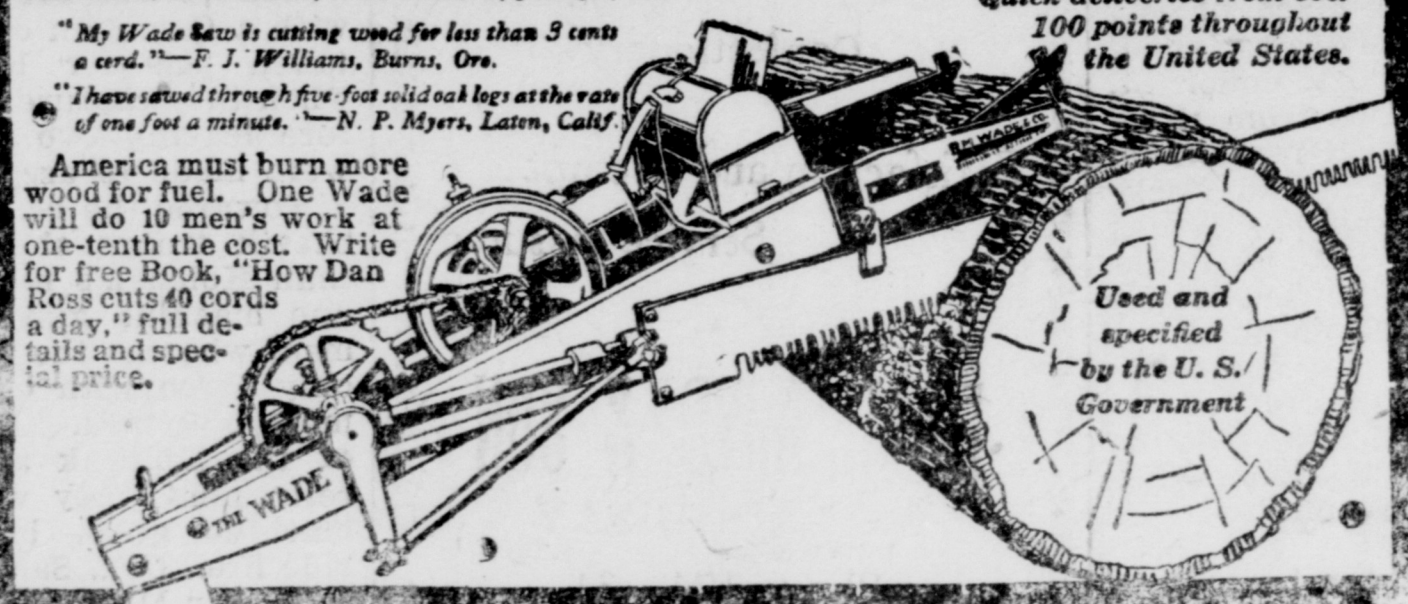

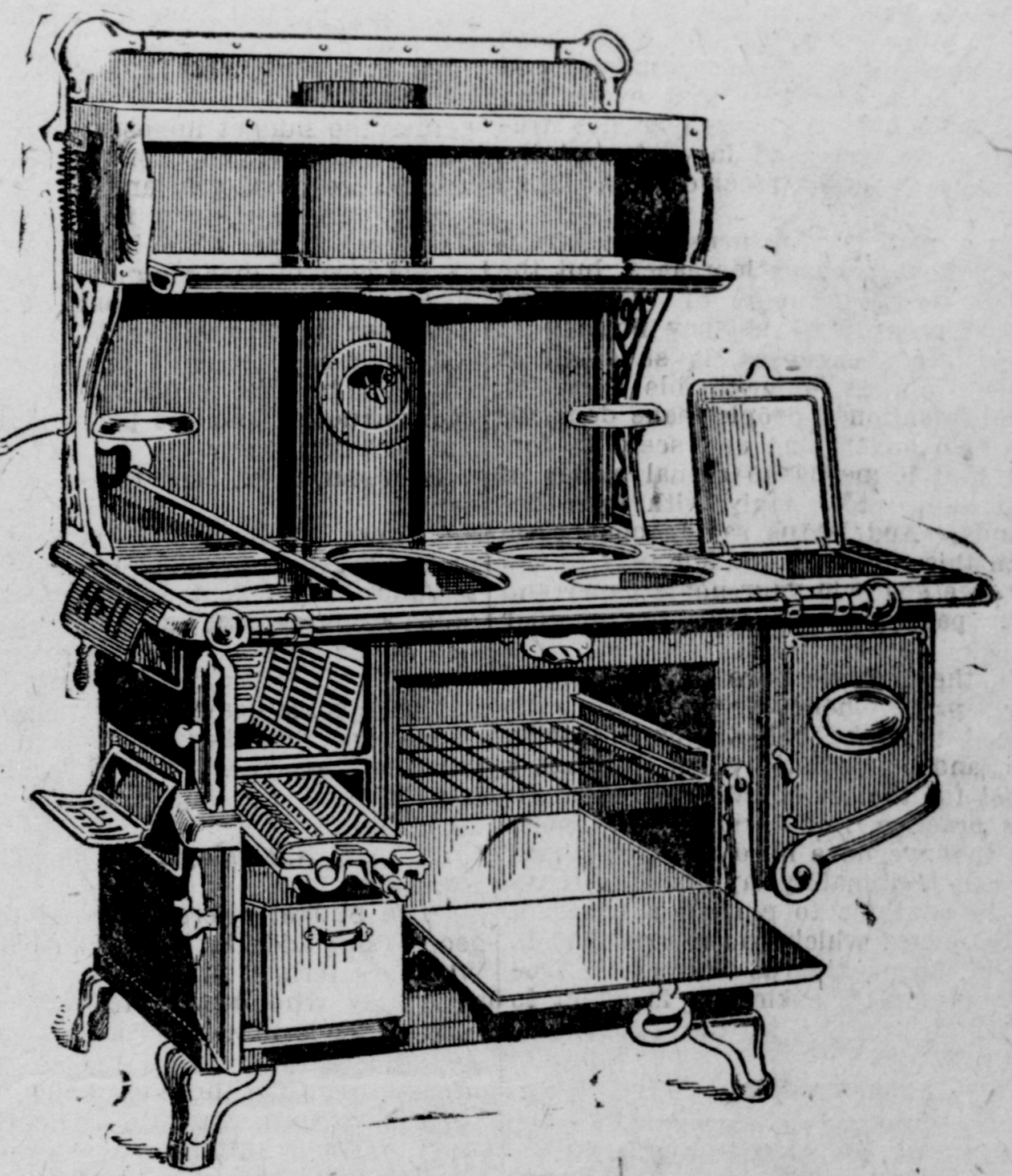
