In the swine department will be paid \$1200 to successful exhibitors.

Horticultural Hall.

Has premiums for vegetables etc., amounting to \$1450.

Fred Cowan, Supt. buildings. Living on Grounds.

There will be an opportunity to camp on the grounds and a large dining hall will be open, with several refreshment stands. It is a beautiful spot for a few days outing with all the privileges of a regular summer resort including facilities for bathing.

Excursions. Arrangements have been made for excursions from Fredericton, Grand Falls, and Presque Isle.

Information. Those having rooms to let are earnestly requested to notify the management once. An information bureau will be opened at Newnam & Sillp's drug store.

Automobiles. Automobiles will be parked under the supervision of an officer appointed for the purpose and patrons are asked to assist in the proper observance of the auto regulations.

Music and Dancing. The 6th Regt Band will furnish music every day and Miss Evans, the well known singer, of Toronto, will be heard every day in popular songs.

Dancing with orchestra to furnish music will be held in Machinery Hall, second floor.

Fireworks. A new feature, in this section, will be an elaborate display of daylight fireworks. There will also be fireworks every evening.

Midway. The Midway will excel anything of this nature ever attempted "down east." Over 2000 feet of space will be devoted to fun and frolic.

\$7,500 Trotting Purses. The trotting features, with \$7,500 in purses, the largest ever offered here will attract horsemen from all over the country.

The greatest racing of the season is promised. Over one hundred entries have been received. The track is in prime condition and no matter how many starters, in any class, there will be room for all—and no crowding.

Exhibits. The space in the main building has all been taken and many of the booths will be exceptionally attractive. Space in the new machinery hall has also been taken up by exhibitors in this line.

Races. The horse races will start each day at 2.30 sharp. Improvements have been made in the grand stand that will add to the comfort of patrons.

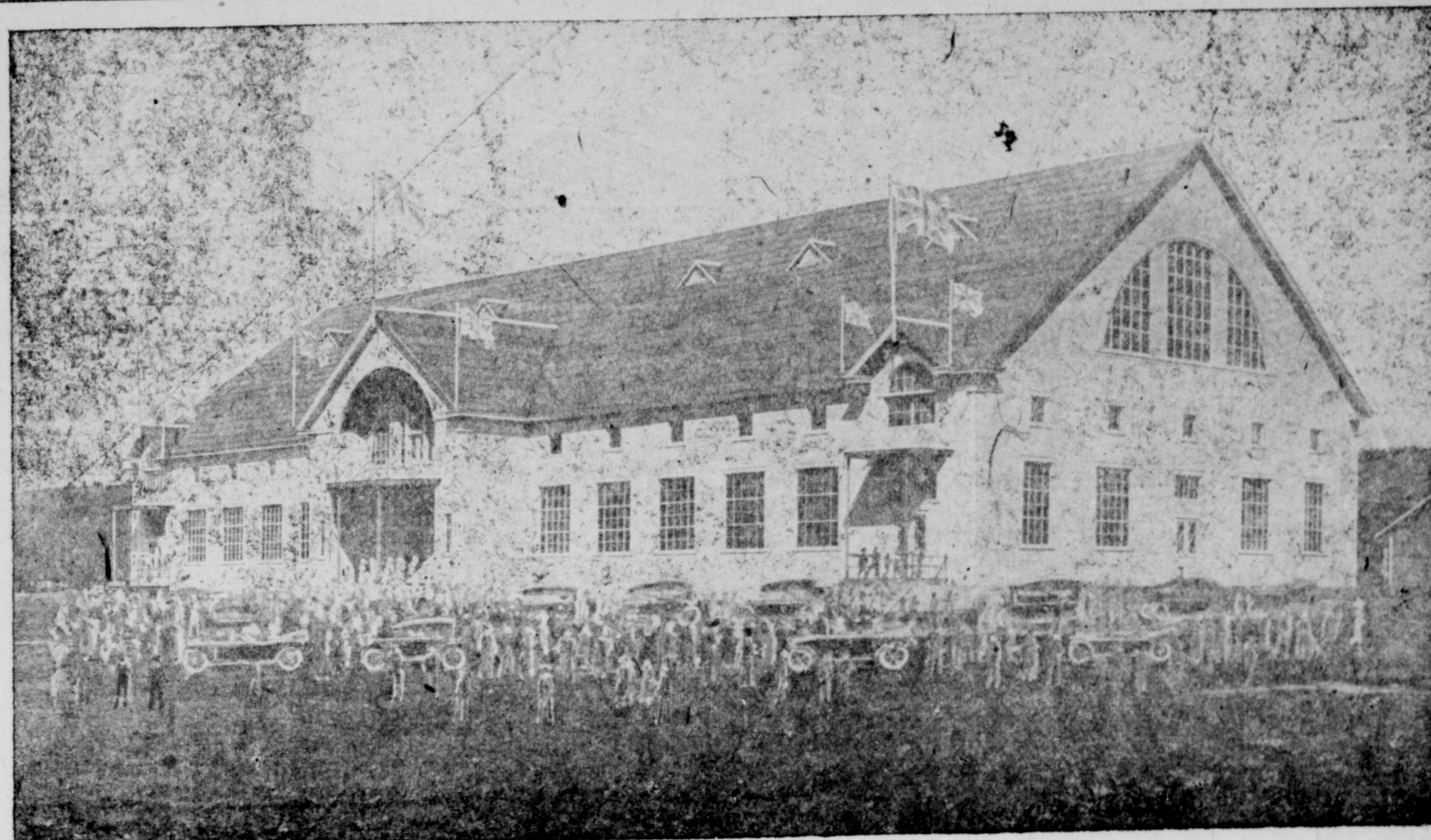
HAS NOT RESIGNED; WILL NOT RESIGN
