CARLETON COUNTY VOCATIONAL SCHOOL GRADUATION EXERCISES

The second annual closing exercises of the Carleton County Vocational School took place at the Vocational School on Wednesday evening, June 29th, in the presence of a very large crowd, the large room provided being entirely adequate to accommodate the many interested visitors. His Worship, who is Chairman of the Vocational Committee, presided, and associated with him on the platform were Rev. Father Donahue, Johnville, T. W. Caldwell, M. P., Rev. Mr. Conron, Woodstock, Mr. W. S. Sutton, ex-M. L. A. Woodstock, and Mr. Maxwell, the director of the school. The first number on the program was a drill by the young ladies composing the Commercial and Home Making Classes. This drill took place on the lawn, and the very efficient manner in which it was performed, under the supervision of Miss Grace Conglan, Academic teacher, at once gained the favor of the many spectators assembled. The remainder of the program, which was conducted in the building, was of a very high order. A number of well received and much appreciated choruses were rendered by the graduating classes. The salutatory was given by Irving Everett, Jacksonville, in a well prepared and excellently rendered address in which a brief but thorough outline was given of the work in the Course in Agriculture and Farm Mechanics. Miss Taylor, immediately upon graduation, was offered and accepted the position of Chief Clerk and Stenographer in the offices of the Provincial Board for Vocational Education, Fredericton.

The Rev. Father Donahue, in his remarks to the graduates in the Agricultural and Commercial Courses gave an inspiring address, the key-note of which was efficiency. He pointed out

to the agricultural students that the duty of community leadership lay before them and they must accept it, while the graduates in the Commercial Course would be called upon to serve in an equally important capacity as workers in the progress of the business world.

The valedictory, rendered by Murray Kilfoil, Johnville, will be printed in next week's issue.

The speakers of the evening, and the many interested visitors were favorably impressed by the work carried on by the students at the Vocational School, as depicted throughout the program and by virtue of the many excellent exhibits in the Manual Training and Home Making Departments, and all joined in an expression of praise and congratulation to the staff of teachers of the Vocational School. The program closed by the singing of the National Anthem.

The Class Motto was "Honor Waits at Labor's Gates," and the class colors were purple and gold.

The students, together with their parents and friends, and the speakers and teaching staff were served ice cream and cake before finally wending their way homeward.
