complete the work. We purpose getting data from the secretary's office. Then we will take one or two farms in each school district, and can finish the work in three or four weeks.

Coun. Stevens—What will it cost?

Mr. Leighton—The three of us will travel by auto, the latter to cost 30c a mile. We will not cover the ground twice. We will make the cost as light as we possibly can. We will get a good valuation as between parish and parish, which is what is required.

Mr. Morgan—We would like advice as to whether this board should or should not make a valuation of the town of Woodstock.

Mr. Hartley—By legislation, the town of Woodstock pays one seventh of the whole cost for running the county, but I think it would be wise to make a valuation of the town of Woodstock, so that we may have the total valuation for the county, but it will not affect the payment that Woodstock Town now makes. That change would have to be made by legislation. Carried.

Soldiers' Monument.

Coun. Anderson—After last session of the Council, we wrote Mr. Tarbox about his contract but could get but little information, in fact we got no information. We cancelled the contract with Mr. Tarbox. Coun. Gallagher and myself, Coun. Tompkins concurring, then made a contract with H. McGratten & Sons, St. George. The old contract was for \$5700. The new contract is for \$6300; we had accumulated interest of \$427.50, which, when used, made the cost only \$172.50 more.

than the old contract. There will now be 142 names of soldiers on the monument. The McGratten people are a reputable firm and the work will be high class. The monument will be placed on the county grounds on or before Sept. 30th, 1921.

Coun. Gallagher—We found that the relatives of every soldier who died during the last two years wanted these soldiers' names on the monument, and we found that the four sides would not hold the names. The sides were four feet six inches square and we had to raise them six inches more to get on all the names. We made a good contract. The monument will be nine-foot square at the base and will weigh 40 tons; block letters will be used. This monument will be set up at the quarry and the committee and an inspector will examine it before we take it off their hands; this will be extra cost for the firm, and it will also have to pay freight, expenses, etc., to Woodstock. The people have been clamoring for the early erection of the monument. Moved by Coun. Stevens seconded by Coun. Tracey, that the action of the monument committee be ratified by the Council. Carried.

Property at Bristol.

Coun. Perry—There is a building at Bristol, in the parish of Kent, owned by the county, that is in a bad state of repair. It was needed at one time, but the people moved northward to "the happy land of Canada," and that lock-up has not been used for some time. The people there having some funds put a new roof on it at one time. It would take about \$100 to put it into repair. I do not want to be personal, but, as it is a small building, it might be shipped and used in the parish lower down, to advantage, judging by recent articles in the local newspapers.

Coun. Stevens—There is a great reform in Kent during Coun. Perry's regime, but that parish might keep the lock-up because Coun. Perry will not always be a councillor and Kent might slip back to the old ways.

Mr. Hartley—I will look over the Municipality Act and see if it is a county or parish charge.

Mr. Melville—The secretary will have the necessary information tomorrow morning.

Moved by Coun. Anderson, seconded by Coun. Carvell, that A. J. Lee be appointed collector for Wilnot, in place of Jack Lee. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Bull, seconded by Coun. Carvell, that \$3.10 be paid D. W. Olts, and charged to parish of Woodstock. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Tracey, seconded by Coun. Fulton, that Ward B. Miller added to the list of pound keepers and field drivers for the parish of Wicklow. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Flemming, seconded by Coun. Dalling, that John Grant and James Rush be appointed constables and George Farrel pound keeper for the parish of Richmond. Carried.

Moved by Coun. McIntosh, seconded by Coun. Miller, that Arthur Jordan be an overseer of poor for the parish of Aberdeen, in place of H. M. Doucett, removed from parish. Carried.

Adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

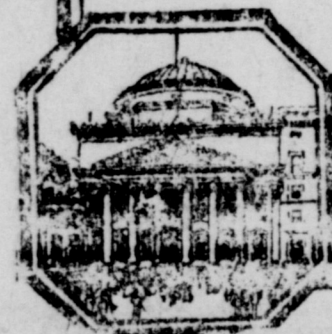

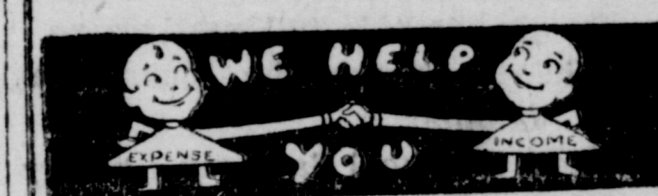

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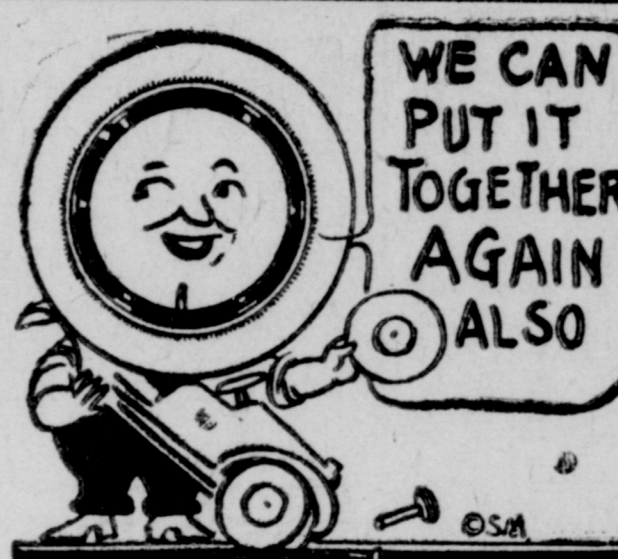
