NURSES HOME THROWN OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

Large Number of Visitors Present—Committee Receive Guests—Beautiful Furnishings From Generous Donors—The Building a Gift From L. P. Fisher Trustees.



Nurses' Home

The new nurses' home was thrown open to the public Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Charles Comben, representing the Women's Institute, Mrs. Frank Currie the I O D E, and Miss Bessie Budd, Supt. of the Fisher Memorial Hospital received the guests and were kept very busy during the afternoon, showing the very large number of visitors over the building. The reception was on from three until five o'clock. Music of a very pleasing variety was furnished by the Peerless Orchestra. There were many pleasing expressions of delight from the visitors at the furnishings and general appearance of all the rooms. Luncheon was served under the direction of the following ladies: Mrs. E. W. Mair, Mrs. T. M. Jones, Mrs. James Gibson, Mrs. Gilliland, Mrs. E. O. Creighton.

The following evening a social dance was held in the roomy parlors and greatly enjoyed. Refreshments were served and an opportunity to indulge in bridge which was pleasing to a number of those present. The following ladies had this delightful function in charge: Mrs. F. O. Creighton, Mrs. John Lee, Mrs. W. S. Sutton and Mrs. Dr. Sprague.

The rooms are very comfortably furnished and reflect much credit on the generous donors who carried out this very necessary part of the work. There are five rooms and a kitchen on the first floor. The double parlors were furnished by the I O D E, in oak with beautiful upholstery. The floors have two elegant and serviceable squares. This was a most generous gift and deeply appreciated by the young nurses who will enjoy the comforts of the thoughtful ladies of the I O D E. A room in white, is the gift of the Women's Institute, and contains two beds. Much good taste is evident in the selection of the furnishings which combine comfort and convenience. The Superintendent's room was the gift of the Woodstock police force. The furnishings are of attractive design and give evidence of very careful selection. Every piece of furniture is beautifully finished giving the room an air of "all the comforts of home."

The matron's room is neatly appointed and convenient. A room containing two beds, with accompanying furnishings was the gift of Dr. T. W. Griffin. It is the acme of comfort and the doctor's thoughtfulness is deeply appreciated by the young nurses. The trustees have furnished a room very comfortably.

There are two rooms temporarily furnished from the hospital. It is hoped that some person, or society will supply these two rooms with the necessary equipment.

Other gifts to the home have been mentioned in a previous issue. There are now ten nurses occupying the rooms with two who are still at the hospital. It is the intention to have a staff of fifteen nurses and it will be necessary to complete the other rooms in order to carry out the plans as outlined.

The building was bought from the Duncan estate by the Fisher trustees and presented to the hospital. It is ideally located and very near the hospital. A broad verandah faces the river and is supported by wooden columns. The whole front is now covered by vines and makes a pretty setting with a back ground of stately trees. Leading from the door is a beautifully carved winding stair with a large hall finished in rare wood, giving a most pleasing effect. Open fires in nearly all the rooms will add to the comforts so richly deserved by the young nurses, when their duties are over.

The building is equipped with hot

and cold water, and electric lights. There are many comfortable little nooks that will be found convenient and a small but very useful library, the gift of the late Father McMuray, who at one time was a member of the hospital board. The home is certainly a credit to generous donors, the town, and county and will undoubtedly add to the efficiency and comfort of the hospital staff. Mrs. Joseph Merrithew is to be the matron of the home and those who know the lady will be pleased with the appointment.

Contemplation of the fact that the big WOODSTOCK EXHIBITION will open Sept. 13th, forces one into thoughts of this annual event as the fair par excellence of eastern Canada.

One thing can be said about this exhibition it is a healthy growing institution. It is bigger and better every year. It isn't stagnant. Its offerings improve season after season. The wide-awake management believes in growth and improvement and the patronage shows the popular appreciation of this sound policy.

The Woodstock Exhibition is not merely a "show." True it has its amusements—and the attractions will be notable this year—and every fair should have this side to it, but it is also educational to a marked degree.

Noted judges of cattle will again be on hand and give demonstrations of the correct method of judging live stock. The lads from the Vocational School will be there while the judges will tell in actual demonstration the good and bad points of the cattle placed under inspection and they will learn lessons of infinite value to them in their farming career. The floral features, the women's work, the exhibit of school work and many other high class features will each be a factor in the exchange of information, and in the creating of standards. They really make a community show care.

And what would an exhibition be without its horse races? Then comes the touch and go of differences of opinion, which are the stuff, we are told, of which horse races are made.

Larger purses mean better races; larger purses are being offered this year and the best strings of the whole country are coming to the Woodstock grounds. It has been demonstrated that the horse-men who have visited Woodstock will "come again." They appreciate the efforts of the management to make their surroundings comfortable and deal out the courtesies to which every participant in the racing game is entitled.

But above all the other advantages of the exhibition, and they are many, is the common meeting ground it furnishes for people from all parts of the country to come and rub elbows and exchange views, not alone about farming, but about everything under the sun. COMPLETE MOONSHINE OUTFIT SEIZED BY LIQUOR INSPECTORS

Located in Secluded Spot—Evidence of Hustling Business—Hogsheads and Barrels Calore—Up-to-Date Facilities for Production---Big Kettle Destroyed---"Worm" Brought to Custom House---Three Hundred and Fifty Gallons in Process of Distillation.

For an up-to-date, well constructed and giant producer the Still found Saturday by inspectors Nevers and Kirlin and Warden Johnson, undoubtedly eclipses all others found in the province. The outfit was complete in every detail and its location was ideal for the manufacture of the special brand that has been sold during the past year. The peculiar state of hilarity of a young man who imbibed too freely of a recent brew was the direct cause of the liquor officials locating the still. While it is common talk that many of these "condensers" are in operation in the vicinity of the town, their location is unknown except to the "faithful." The officers in this case were directed to a spot in the woods not far from Grafton, where a lumbering camp had been utilized as part of the "brewery." They found ten barrels and two hogsheads with ingredients in various stages of distillation. About three hundred and fifty gallons were ready to journey through the "worm," which was of copper and apparently of the calibre used in the manufacture of whiskey in large distilleries. This part of the apparatus was found hidden under boughs some distance from the centre of activities. The big pot, which would hold several gallons was also concealed, and being too cumbersome to handle, it was broken up by the officers. A sluice had been built from a running brook that carried the water for cooling purposes to the still and could be turned on when in operation. There was evidence that a thriving business was being carried on and the conditions indicated that a big brew was about ready to go

through. The barrels were emptied of their contents and one of the officials said—"If the finished product had any resemblance, or smell, to the sediment in the barrels it must have been an awful dose for any man and I don't wonder at the injurious effects to be seen every day in those who are drinking this vile concoction."

The outfit was destroyed by the officers except the worm which was brought to the custom house where it will await the pleasure of the excise officials.

If the officers have any clue as to the ownership of the apparatus they are keeping it to themselves. It is rumored, however, that arrests are to be made as soon as certain evidence is available.
