REGULAR MIX-UP IN LIQUOR DEAL

Disclosures Before Mr. Justice Barry.

(Northern Light, Bathurst)

An interesting sidelight on how the liquor traffic is handled was shed before Judge Barry at a sitting of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick in town this week.

The case in question involved the

sale of a thousand dollars worth of liquor and three gentlemen, all of them are well known locally, viz., the man who sold the liquor, who shall be "A", the man to whom the liquor was sold, who shall be designated "B" and the man who acted as buffer in the case who can answer to the abbreviated appellation of "C".

To arrive at a proper understanding of the case it is necessary to begin at the end and work backwards, for the case as presented to the court was not between the vendor and the vendee, but between the agent or buffer and the vendee. However, we will forget that and state the case as it turned out.

"A" had the liquor to sell and he arranged to sell it to "B" but unfortunately "B" did not have the thousands and dollars to pay for it. That is where "C" came into the picture. He gallantly came to the purchaser's rescue with a check the full life-size of one thousand dollars. This check was then presented by the buyer to the seller who apparently accepted it in payment of the liquor.

"B" the purchaser, then gave three notes to the gallant "C" to cover his check of a thousand dollars. The deal was therefore consummated, and everything was "hunky dory" so to speak. It appears, however, that after paying \$380 on the notes "B" wanted

to renege on the proposition and finally did so, refusing to pay any more. He gave as a reason that the liquor was turning out to be "watered" stock.

Now, however, both "A" and "C" were in a quandry. "A" was out all the liquor and "C" only collected \$380 on his thousand dollar check. "A" could not sue for the recovery of his liquor, for he had no standing in law, the sale of liquor representing an illegal transaction. "C" has the promissory notes and he sued on the strength of these; but as the circumstances of the sale demonstrated that "A" and "C" were practically one, the notes were without value. The case was accordingly dismissed "with costs" which means that "B" is a heavy winner. He got a thousand dollars' worth of liquor for \$380. No doubt "A" and "C" have come to a satisfactory arrangement as to the disposition of that sum. "C" stands where he stood, for while he gave his check for \$1,000 in order to help the deal along, the check never found its way back to the bank although it was accepted by "A". In these circumstances the relationship of "C" to "A" becomes rather obvious; but not any more obvious than the fact that "B" succeeded in putting the skids under them, so to speak.

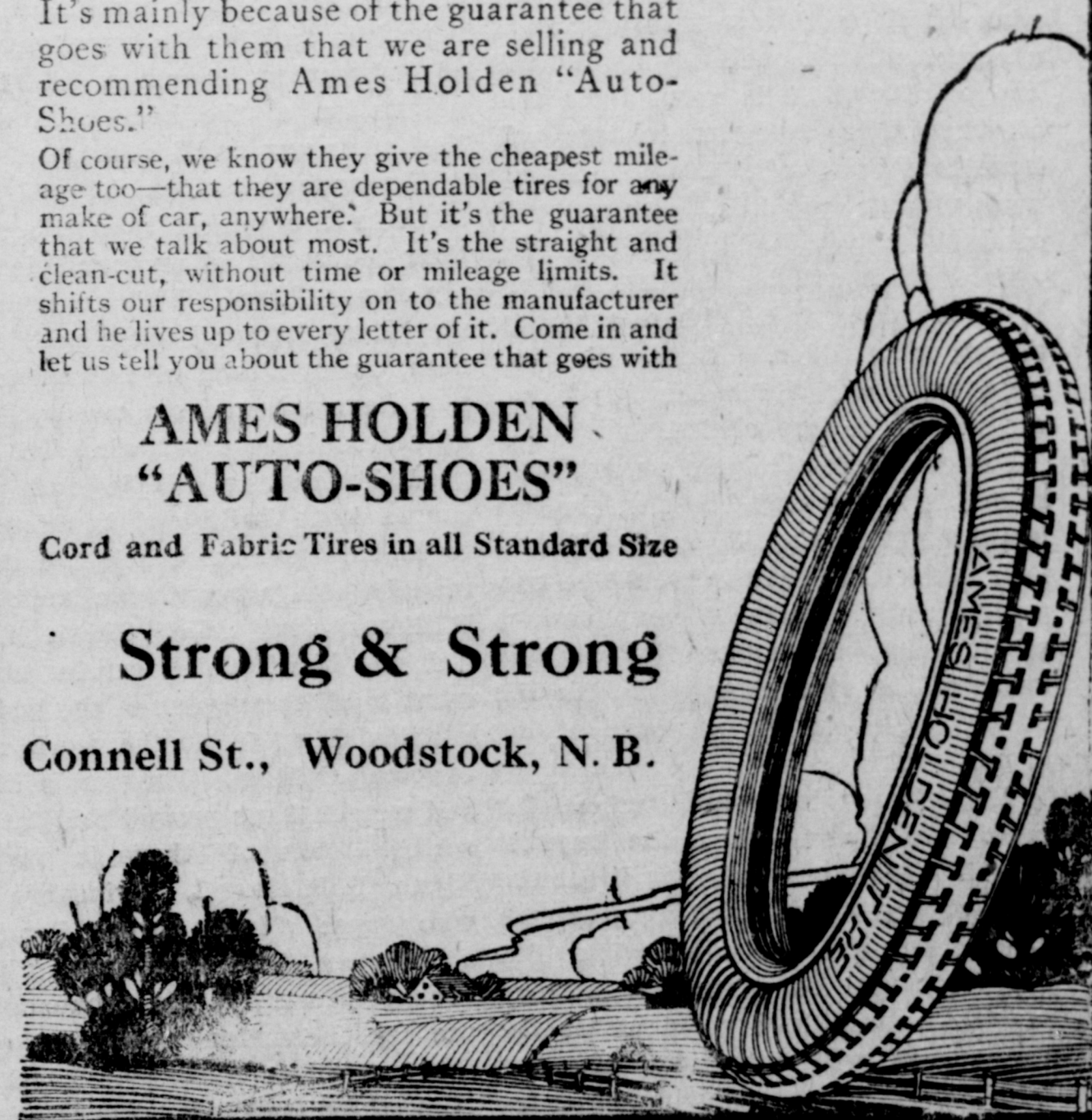
