THE SELLS-FLOTO CIRCUS DRAWS BIG CROWD

A Good Show Full of Dazzling Features—Immense Crowds in Town—Two Thousand Autos on Streets.

The Sells-Floto circus was here Friday, being the first Canadian town it visited east of Montreal. The big show came in from Danforth, Me. The usual large crowds that are in town on "circus day" were here and on no previous occasion has so many automobiles been seen in the streets—the lowest estimate being 2000 cars. A very large number of American cars were seen. It is said that 5500 persons were under the "big top" at the afternoon show.

There were the usual three rings and never before in the history of shows, to visit this town, have so many thrilling, dazzling and spectacular acts been presented. It may be said that the Hannefords act was perhaps the most finished and sensational in the long list of good features presented. Not a hitch occurred during the performances and not a single arrest was made during the day. It should be mentioned that the parade was one of splendor with flashy and pretty costumes displayed by the good looking men and ladies of the big show. The many clowns with their antics kept the crowds in the best humor. The music was especially good.

The circus still has the magnetism and attraction to draw the crowd, and those who thought the interest was waning have reason to change their opinion.

Decision of C. P. R. Maintenance of Way Men.

An absolute refusal to accept any reduction in their present rate of pay which might be attempted by the C. P. R. was determined on at a united meeting of the St. John, Fredericton Junction and McAdam Junction locals of the Canadian Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Workers at a combined banquet and meeting held at the LaTour, St. John, on Sunday. The united opinion was expressed that the present wage was low enough and that any further reduction should not be accepted.

REDUCE RAILWAY FARES IN CANADA

Railway Board Authorizes Reduction of Ten Per Cent. After July 1.

A ten per cent reduction in standard passenger railway fares in Eastern Canada, to become effective July 1st, was authorized by the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners yesterday morning. This will mean, a return of the rates prevailing prior to September 13, 1920, when a 20 per cent increase was granted to the companies.

At the time this increase was made, the Board ordered that the rates were to be reduced by 10 per cent on January 1st and a further 10 per cent reduction on July 1st.

Prior to January 1st the rate was 4 cents per mile and 3.95 cents per mile after the first reduction. After July 1st the rate per mile will be 3.45 cents.

Western passenger rates and pullman accommodation rates are not affected.

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LIQUOR PRICES UNDER THE NEW ORDER IN N. B.

Fredericton, N. B., June 16.—The highest price the consumer with a prescription will have to pay for a bottle of Scotch whiskey after the board of vendors has commenced to function will probably not exceed \$5.00 said Hon. J. F. Tweeddale.

It is expected that early next week the board will be ready to fill their first orders from retail vendors. A controlled schedule of these prices will go into effect.

Retail vendors here are now selling Scotch whiskey as high as \$6.00 for some of the best Canadian rye. Mr. Tweeddale expects that \$5.00 will be the outside figure for the best brands of Scotch. He said as soon as the board has established a price list retail vendors will be compelled to make all sale at the new prices whether or not their stocks have been obtained from the commission.
