denced by the fact that, although the
oval gained the distinction of acquir-
ing the Canadian race record when
John R. Braden, 2:02 1/4, won the free-
forall over it in 2:10 1/4, 2:08 and 2:07 1/4,
on September 14, 1921, they are plan-
ning to resoil the course, thus giving
the trotters and pacers a still faster
surface to race over. The plant is one
of the best and most beautiful in all
Canada and must be seen to be ap-

WRITS HAVE BEEN ISSUED FOR THE BY ELECTIONS; NOMINATION ON JAN. 19

Will Fill Vacancies Caused by the Members Elect Accepting Portfolios
in the New Government---Seats Have Not Yet Been Found for Two
of the New Ministers---P. E. Island Minister Has Been Sworn In.

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—Writs for ten fed-
eral by-elections were issued at a late
hour tonight. Nominations will be re-
ceived on Jan. 19. Election day will
be Thursday, February 2. The con-
stituencies have been rendered vacant
in each case by the appointment of
the member-elect to a portfolio in the
new government.
The constituencies in which by-elections
have been called and the name
of the member-elect in each case are:
Nova Scotia—Cape Breton North
and Victoria; Hon. D. D. McKenzie,
seignior general.
Quebec—Chateaugay—Huntingdon:
Hon. J. A. Robb, minister
of trade and commerce.
Laurier-Outremont: Sir Lomer Gou-
lin, minister of justice.
Beauce: Hon. Dr. Beland, minister
of health and soldiers' re-establish-
ment.

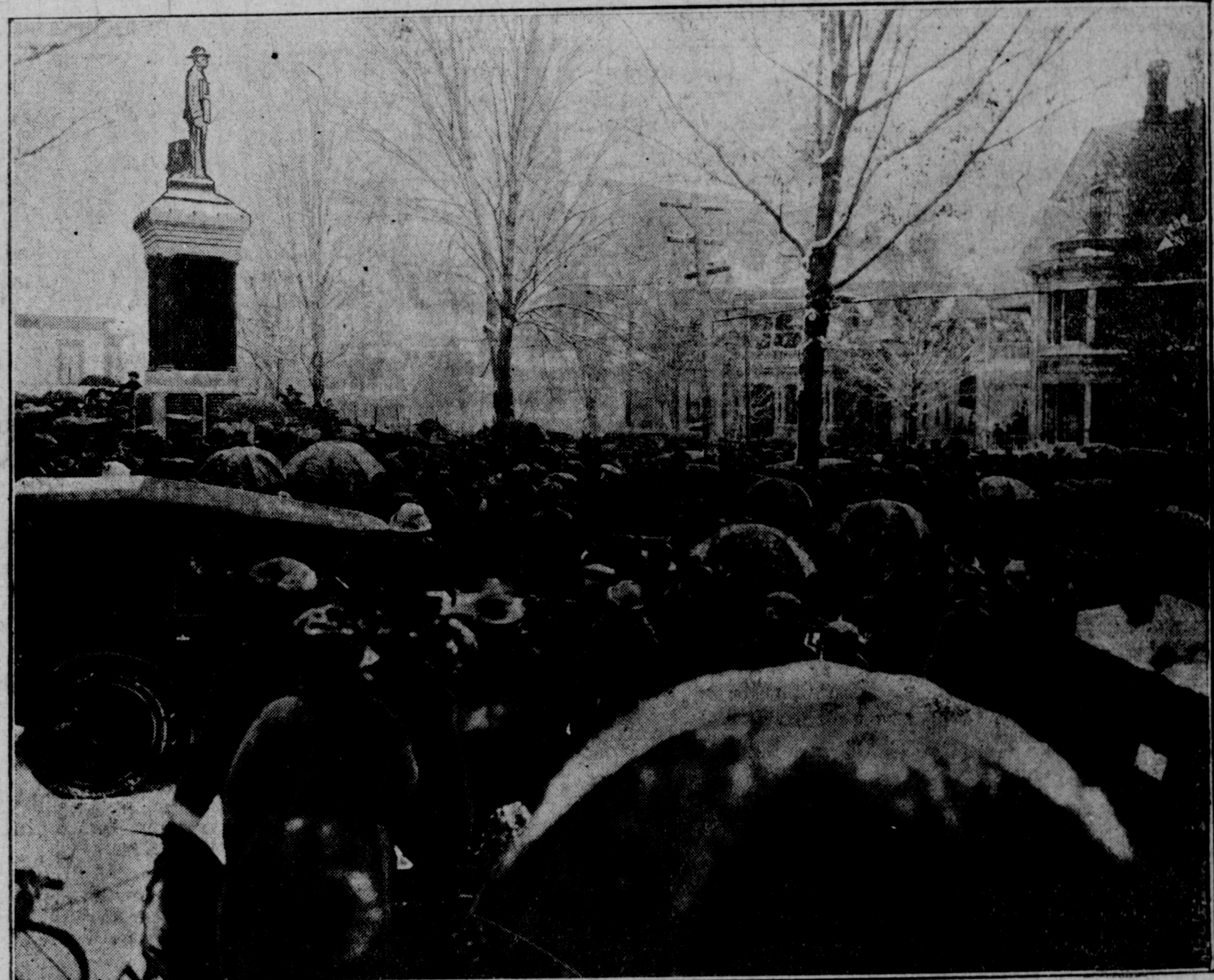
Ontario—Essex North: Hon. W. C.
Kennedy, minister of railways and
canals.
Essex South: Hon. George P. Gra-
ham, minister of militia and defence.
Russell: Hon. Charles Murphy, post-
master general.
Writs have not yet been issued for
Quebec East (Hon. E. Lapointe);
Three Rivers (Hon. J. Bureau) and Re-
gina (Hon. W. R. Motherwell), owing
to the fact that the general elections
writs from these constituencies have
not yet reached the chief electoral of-
ficer. In the cases of Hon. James Mur-
dock, minister of labor, and of Hon.
Charles Stewart, ex-premier of Alber-
ta, now minister of the interior, seats
have not yet been found. Writs in
these cases also will be issued later,
as in that of Argenteuil county, Que-
bec, rendered vacant by the death of
the member-elect.
Hon. John E. Sinclair, M. P., for
Quebec (P. E. I.) was sworn in to-
day as minister without portfolio in
the McKenzie King cabinet. Mr. Sin-
clair attended a meeting of the coun-
cil immediately afterwards.

again fed, but oats at this time.
