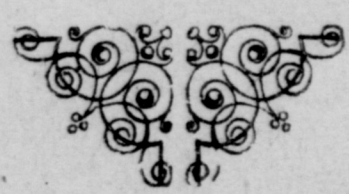

A BIG YEAR IN THE NEW BRUN- SWICK SCHOOLS

Annual Reports of Dr. W. S. Car-
ter--Extracts From Inspector
Moore's Report--Praises Teach-
ers for Excellent Work.

A total of 73,712 pupils attended the 1,978 public schools taught by 2,142 teachers in New Brunswick during the last fiscal year, according to the annual report of Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education. The largest enrollment was in the second term when 68,092 pupils were in attendance, a record number for this province. The previous high record was 66,548 in 1911. The percentage of attendance was also the highest, being 68.69. The 2,142 teachers received in provincial grants towards their salaries \$244,555.92 as compared with \$193,671.64 the previous year to 2,054 teachers. Dr. Carter repeats the following recommendations:—
Increased teachers pensions with a disability clause.
A better assessment law.
Free school books.
He adds the following new recommendations:—
One man one vote in school districts.
An act enabling women to serve upon all school boards even though they do not possess property in their own name.
In District No. 8
Inspector L. A. Moore, in his report says: "During each term about fifteen districts maintained no school. In most cases this was due to squariness of teachers. Conditions in this respect are improving somewhat, though it is still found necessary to issue a good number of local licenses."
Poor Aid
* * * The increased Poor Aid to districts of low valuation has been a most necessary and welcome relief. Yet the fact that many of these districts employ local licensees shuts them off from the advantages to be had in this respect.
Good Work
* * * Much praise can be given and has been given, to our teachers, for their excellent work in teaching the various subjects of the curriculum. Yet in some cases the teaching is too bookish, and is not practical nor original enough.
Music
Referring to subjects taught, Inspector Moore touches on music and says: "I very seldom find a school at which the pupils are accustomed to unite in song at regular hours, if at all. A teacher who has the slightest musical talent, and makes no use of it in school, is neglecting a wonderful opportunity to create an atmosphere in her school, to add to the

pleasure of her pupils both in the present and in the future, and to strengthen her position as leader of her school.

Improvements
Inspector Moore reports new buildings under construction at Bath and Le Wicklow. In Burnt Land Brook, Florenceville and East Florenceville. New buildings are now completed and in use. In each case the buildings are excellent of their type and a credit to the community. It is to be hoped that Bristol will soon decide to build.

WOODSTOCK GIRL AWARDED \$3,100

Moncton, N. B., March 17—This morning, Mr. Justice Chandler, of the Supreme Court, King's Bench division, delivered judgment in the case of Doris Clark, of Woodstock, vs. August Gavin, Moncton, assessing the damages in favor of the plaintiff at \$3,100 with costs. This action was tried last week at chambers without a jury and took three days. The action was brought for damages against the defendant for negligence in leaving open an excavation on Church street extension, Moncton, when the plaintiff, on Aug. 26th, 1920, when driving along the street, fell into the excavation and broke her left leg.

U. S. SENATORS REQUEST DUTY ON POTATOES

Say Severe Competition With N. B.
---One Senator Breaks Into Song
---The Dulcet Tones "Steals
O'er Willing Ears."

Washington, March 20—United States Senators Hale and Fernald, of Maine, have requested the senate finance committee to fix the duty on potatoes in the Fordney bill at thirty-five cents a bushel. The senators told the committee that Maine potatoes met severe competition from New Brunswick, but that if this were the only competition they would be satisfied with the present rate in the bill—twenty-five cents. Senator Fernald, however, said that the present tariff does not exclude vast shipments of potatoes from Ireland, and since that country is now to be a free state he thought production would increase, and for that reason greater safeguards are needed.

Serious attention was given to the plea of Senator Fernald, which was fortified by an able argument along the same lines advanced by Senator Hale. After they had indicated they had nothing further to say on the subject Senator Watson (Ind.), with a gleam in his eyes, said: "Senator Fernald, we were much impressed by your argument, but we understand that you have a fine voice and if you will favor us with a song say, 'Throw Out the Life Line,' it may aid in your case."

Blushing, but without much more arguing, Senator Fernald, in a strong well modulated voice, sang the song requested.

While Senator Fernald was singing Senator Watson applauded at every pause and others joined in the demonstration. The members of the committee insisted on an encore, and Senator Fernald favored them with "Lead Kindly Light," and the report is that Senator Hale joined in low tenor tones.

After the recital Senator Watson, on the part of the committee, announced: "The duty on Irish potatoes will be thirty-five cents per bushel. There is no denying such an appeal."

MR. TRACEY CONTRIBUTES TO DEBATE

Carleton County Member Gets Good Hearing—Aims of Progressives Not Selfish—Refers to Farmers Serious Condition—Congratulates Government on Steps to Find Markets—The Rule of the Road Act Should be Put in Force.

Mr. Speaker:
After listening to so many able addresses given by the different members that have spoken, it is with a great deal of timidity that I rise to take part in the debate, but I promise you Mr. Speaker that I will only trespass upon the valuable time of this House for a very short time.

I wish first of all to congratulate the Hon. members from Westmorland and Gloucester the mover and seconder of the address on the able manner in which they discharged that duty. I wish in particular to congratulate the Mover inasmuch as his experience like my own has been short and I know what it means to speak for the first time on the floors of this House. I wish also to congratulate the seconder of the address as he was under the handicap of speaking in a language other than his own, and I only wish that the English speaking members could speak the French language as well as the French speaking members can speak the English language, and I hope the time will come when our Educational system will be such that it will be possible to have both languages taught in the common schools of the Province.

I wish also to congratulate the leader of the Opposition and the leader of the Progressive Group on the excellent manner in which they have acquitted themselves in contributing to this debate.

Regrets have been expressed here for the loss we have sustained in the death of the late Mr. Vanderbeck who at the last session of this House was an Hon. member for the County of Northumberland, and I am sure that I concur in all that has been said, and join in extending a welcome to his son as the new Member.

I would like, Mr. Speaker, before proceeding with my remarks to say a few words in regard to the entering of the Progressive group in this House. It was expressed by certain speakers here last session that it was a great mistake for an independent group to enter the field, and that the two party system was the only possible way in which the affairs of the Province could be managed with success but I wish to call your attention to the fact Mr. Speaker, that the affairs of this province have been carried on under the two Party System for the past forty years and I fail to see where conditions can be made any much worse than they are at the present time by the entry of an Independent Group.

I wish to point out Mr. Speaker that our aims are not selfish by any means, neither do we wish to forward a class movement, but our ambitions are to try and improve the social conditions in the rural districts, by improving our highways and school system and making home life more attractive on the farm and in this way to build up the Agricultural Industry upon which we are depending so much for our growth and prosperity. At the same time we are willing to give our very best to the interests of the people as a whole and to help build up a better Province in which to live.

His Hon. the Lieut. Gov. has made special reference to the conditions that have severely affected two of the most important Industries of this Province, namely Agriculture and Lumbering, but I am not going to refer to the lumber industry but will leave that to the other speakers that are more familiar with the business than I am, but will refer for a few moments to the Agricultural Industry as it is today. I would like Mr. Speaker to call the attention of the House to the very serious condition of the farmers of this Province at the present time. I believe that every Government, every business firm and every farmer, are feeling very keenly the depression in business at the present time, but I believe Sir that the conditions of the farmers at the present time are worse than are generally known.
