## THE GET TOGETHER MEETING YESTERDAY

C. P. R. Employees Assembled From All Parts of the Province Discussed Working Conditions.

A large and influential meeting of C. P. R. employees from all parts of the province travelled to St. John to take part in what is termed a "Get-together" meeting, and at 2.30 p. m. when the meeting was called to order by J. M. Woodman, Gen. Supt., 150 employees of all grades of service were in attendance in the large Immigration building in West St. John. Mr. Woodman opened the proceedings by congratulating the employees on the satisfactory results of the winter port traffic, emphasizing the fact that the great safety which had characterized the movement of passengers during the past winter was the very best advertisement the C P R could have for every passenger was a good booster for the company. Mr. Woodman in conclusion gave unstinted praise to the efforts of the employees handling freight, mail and express.

On motion, A. C. Fraser, Supt. of Telegraphs, was appointed Chairman of the meeting.

The chairman spoke in praise of the passenger service during the past winter, then called on Mr. Langley of Aroostook Jct., who recited an original composition entitled "Get-together" which was heartily cheered.

Conductor Styles of Brownville, spoke on working conditions on the C. P. R.

Mr. Court spoke on efficiency and co-operation on the C. P. R.

N. R. Disbriay, District Passenger Agent, spoke on past and present methods of transporting passengers, also of the advertising methods of the C. P. R. who has at the present time some 20 men in Europe showing films of Canadian scenery.

W. S. Elliott, known as the Colonel, spoke on co-operation amongst the employees, and stated that some 4000 cars were used more than last year. Mr. Elliott caused much amusement by his genial manners and humorous remarks.

John R. Haycock, Dom. Express, expressed his great pleasure in being associated with the C. P. R., and emphasized the fact that "Service" was a strong point with the Express Company.

W. J. Pickrell, Master mechanic, spoke on the great advantage of co-operation in place of the old time system of passing responsibility on to "the other man."

C. C. Kirby, Div. Engineer, spoke on co-operation with different departments of the service.

Agent Deacon of St. Stephen, N. B. caused much amusement regarding shipments of "wet" freight across the St. Croix river at St. Stephen, claiming the C. P. R. were shipping only legitimate freight.

Mr. Woodman closed the meeting with thanks to those who had travelled from all parts of the Province to attend.

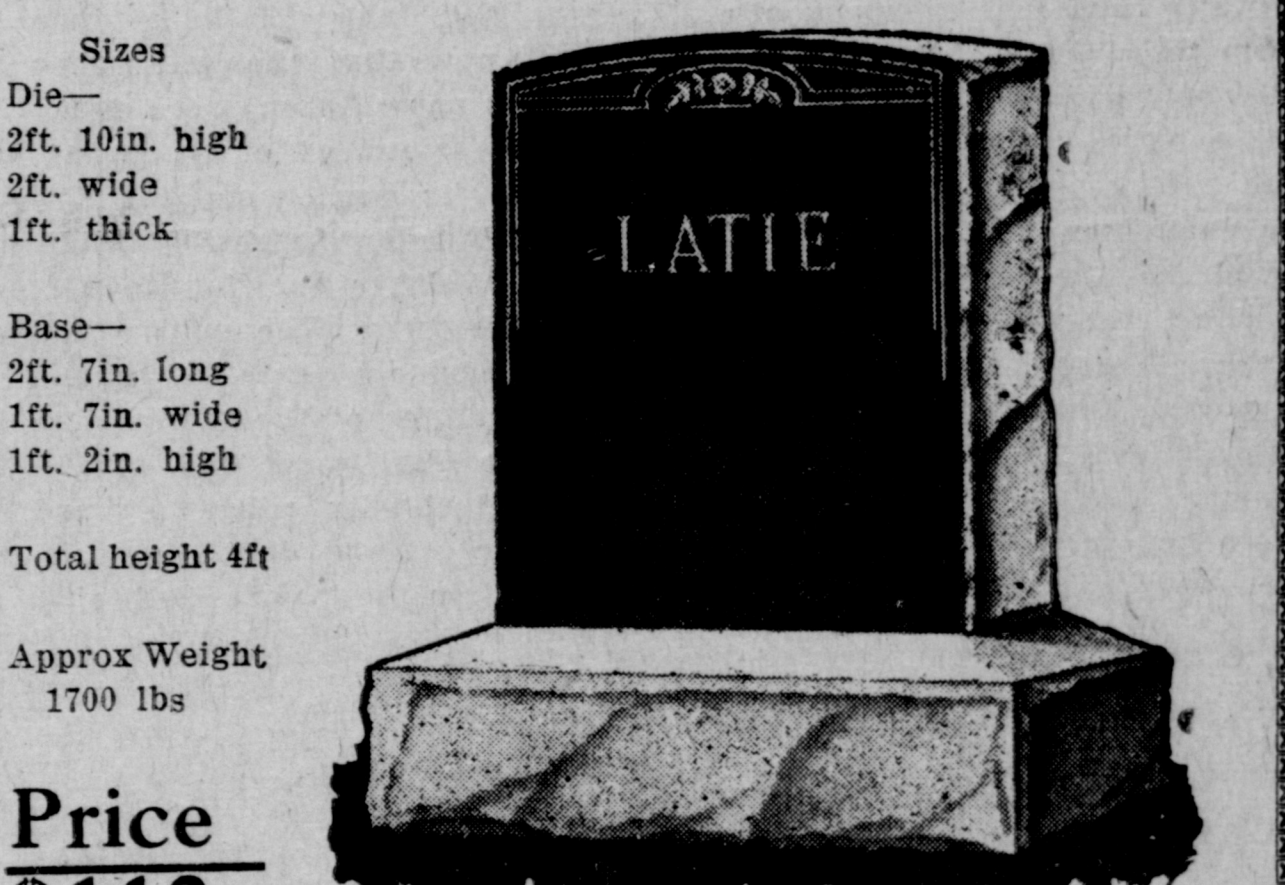
