THE AMERICAN WAY

For the past few years the banks and other institutions engaged in lending money have been educating people to pay high rates of interest, says Roger W. Babson, economic and financial expert. But already money rates have declined lately in the wholesale market. Where only a year ago banks were loaning money on call to the brokerage houses at from six to eight per cent, they are now loaning it at four per cent. Three to six months paper can be sold at from 4 1/4 to 4 1/2 per cent discount. These are tremendous changes within a short time. Mr. Babson says that all this means that the average man will be able to borrow money much cheaper during the next few years than he has been able to borrow it during the past five years. It means that borrowers should now avail themselves of long terms at high rates. It means that there will be a decline in the retail price of money, as there has been in the wholesale price of money.—Port Fairfield Review.
